Rhode Island State House 82 Smith Street Providence, RI 02903	The State House was completed in 1904 after nine years of construction. The Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State and General Treasurer have their principal offices in the building, and it also holds the legislative chambers for Rhode Island's General Assembly. It was one of the first major public buildings to have electricity and boasts the fourth largest self-supported marble dome in the world, following St. Peter's Basilica, the Minnesota State Capitol, and the Taj Mahal.
