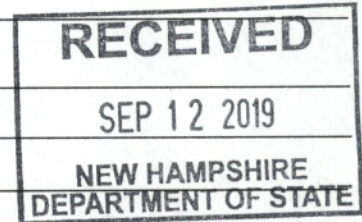

The Committee will also examine standardized testing practices, which have come under increasing scrutiny in the states, and discuss the role of these tests and how they can be used to improve student outcomes. Lastly, the Committee will discuss the growing student debt crisis. As student debt nationally exceeds \$1.5 trillion, with higher per capita debt levels in the Northeast region, the committee will discuss policy responses to address this growing crisis.

1. *Visit to an Ethylene Cracker Plant Construction Site Beaver County, Pennsylvania*

Tour the new Shell petrochemical complex under construction, driven by the abundant ethane supply in the world's largest producing natural gas field, the Marcellus Shale, which is also shaping the economy of Pennsylvania. As one of the nation's largest construction sites, it is employing thousands in construction-related jobs, with more than 600 positions anticipated post-construction. When completed, it will include an ethane cracker and three polyethylene units, as well as power and steam generation, storage, logistics, and cooling water and water treatment.

2. Visit to a Farm Market and 169-Year-Old Orchard Wexford, Pennsylvania

The group will tour Soergel Orchards, a 450-acre fully diversified fruit orchard with farm market, garden center, rack and cloth cider press, bakery and deli, gift barn, wine shop, and cider house. The state of agriculture and dairy farming in Pennsylvania will also be discussed.

The stakes for the 2020 Census are especially high for states. The census will affect not only congressional and state legislative district boundaries and the composition of congressional delegations, but state budgets for medical and nutritional programs, education, housing vouchers, Head Start, highway construction, and many other programs. Challenges for the 2020 Census include limited broadband in many parts of the country as the census moves partially online, an under-resourced federal census program, and uncertainty regarding the administration's response to last month's Supreme Court decision that a citizenship question cannot be added under current circumstances.
