





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## **Precision Medicine**

In January 2015, President Obama announced the creation of the Precision Medicine Initiative® (PMI). The NIH PMI Cohort Program is the largest part of the broader PMI initiative, which seeks to harness genetic, environmental, and lifestyle data to create better disease risk-stratification approaches, discover biomarkers that signal risk for disease, identify the causes of individual variation in treatment response, and utilize mobile health technology to correlate activity, physiological monitoring, and environmental exposure to predict health outcomes. While a cohort of 1 million participants is being sought for the formal PMI Cohort Program, the principles of the PMI Cohort Program may pertain to a wide range of CTN activities. This symposium will introduce the CTN to the PMI Cohort Program and explore opportunities to incorporate principles of precision medicine into future CTN studies.

# Research and Treatment of HIV-infected Patients with Substance Use Disorders

Substance use disorder (SUD) in HIV-infected patients is associated with poor treatment outcomes and remains a key factor that drives global HIV epidemics. Major strides have been made in hepatitis C virus (HCV) treatment, including in the HIV-coinfected population. The cure rates have markedly improved and are similar to those of monoinfected individuals. Long-acting antiretroviral medications that are currently being developed and long-acting medications approved to treat opioid use disorder present an opportunity to improve treatment adherence and outcomes. International sites with rapidly evolving HIV epidemics in patients with SUD and a potential for rapid scale-up of interventions once proven efficacious offer opportunities for projects with large public health impact beyond what is possible in the United States. Presenters will review the current knowledge base and projects in these priority areas and discuss overcoming important research gaps needed to move the field forward.
