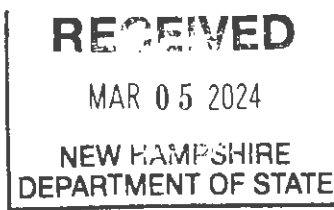



Background

The Commercial Law Development Program (CLDP) provides technical assistance and capacity building to developing countries focused on promoting economic growth and a legal environment conducive to business, trade, and investment. CLDP has nearly thirty years of experience working closely with host-country governments in North Africa, with support from the U.S. Department of State's Middle East Partnership Initiative (MEPI), on a variety of commercial law areas, including insolvency, contract enforcement, government procurement, handicraft exports, and intellectual property.

In Tunisia, CLDP is currently working with Tunisia's Competition Council and Ministry of Commerce and Exports to support ongoing efforts to promote a more efficient, transparent, and inclusive procurement system as a tool for economic growth.

CLDP, in partnership with the Tunisian agencies mentioned above, is organizing a workshop on the Prevention of Anti-Competitive Practices in Public Procurement. The workshop will bring together procurement experts from the U.S. with the following objectives:

- a) Discuss the legal framework and promotion of ethical practices in public procurement and the role of information technology (IT);
- b) Promote an exchange of experiences between the U.S. and Tunisia and lessons learned in the fight against anti-competitive activities; and
- c) Share the U.S. experience regarding anti-corruption techniques in public procurement.
