REQUESTED ACTION

Authorize the Department of Environmental Services to pay membership dues to the Coastal States Organization (VC #170810), Washington, DC in the amount of \$8,544.00, for the period July 1, 2013 though June 30, 2014, upon Governor and Council approval. 100% Federal Funds.

EXPLANATION

The New Hampshire Coastal Program in the Department of Environmental Services (DES) has been a member of the Coastal States Organization (CSO) for over 25 years. CSO is a professional organization formed in 1970 to address a growing need for state coastal program managers to have national representation. Membership provides New Hampshire with an avenue to receive timely information on new developments and to have a voice in the discussion of important issues affecting the State's coastal waters, especially federal funding issues. This request will pay for the annual dues as assessed for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2013.

Listed below are answers to standard questions required for Governor and Council organization dues and membership approval submissions:

- 1. How long has this organization been in existence and how long has this agency been a member of this organization?**
The CSO was established in 1970 and the New Hampshire Coastal Program in the Department of Environmental Services has been a member of CSO for over 25 years.
- 2. Is there any other organization that provides the same or similar benefits which your agency belongs to?**
No, CSO is unique in that it represents the coastal states, commonwealths and territories on legislative and policy issues relating to the sound management of coastal, Great Lakes and ocean resources.
- 3. How many other states belong to this organization and is your agency the sole New Hampshire state agency that is a member?**

CSO represents the interests of the Governors of the 35 coastal states, commonwealths and territories of the United States. DES is the sole New Hampshire state agency that is a member.

4. How is the dues structure established?

CSO dues structure is based on the same formula used by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) to determine annual federal funding for New Hampshire's implementation of the Coastal Zone Management Act. Shoreline mileage and population are the primary criteria in the NOAA formula.

5. What benefit does the state receive from participating in this membership?

CSO serves as an advocate to assure that the authority and role of the states is recognized and preserved in federal legislation, regulation and policy. CSO's principal activities include:

- a. Keeping Congress informed on key issues related to the coast, including appropriations;
- b. Representing states on the upcoming reauthorization of the Coastal Zone Management Act;
- c. Publications and technical documents on coastal related issues;
- d. Providing expertise in coastal and estuarine law and policy.

6. Are training or educational/research materials included in the membership? If so, is the cost included?

CSO provides technical training opportunities to the states. The majority of the opportunities are made available as part of regularly scheduled meetings. The cost of these training opportunities is included in the membership.

7. Is the membership required to receive any federal grants or required in order to receive or participate in licensing or certification exams? No.

8. Is there any travel included with this membership fee? No.


9. Which state agency employees are directly involved with this organization?

As designated by the Governor, DES Commissioner Thomas S. Burack is a voting Delegate member and Ted Diers, Watershed Management Bureau Administrator is an Alternate to the CSO. Either the delegate or alternate has voting privileges, though each state is allocated one vote.

10. Explain in detail any negative impact to the state if the agency did not belong to this organization.

Membership in the past has been of great benefit to New Hampshire. These dues are a small investment for the value received from this organization in terms of our ability to both stay abreast of important coastal issues and enable us to provide the New Hampshire perspective on national environmental issues and policy. The Coastal Program often discovers funding opportunities through its interaction with CSO staff and other state members.
