REQUESTED ACTION

Authorize the Department of Education to grant funds to Southern New Hampshire Services, Inc., Manchester, NH (vendor code 177198) not to exceed the amount of \$294,844.72 upon Governor and Council approval for the period effective September 1, 2013 through June 30, 2014 and authorize unencumbered payment of said grant with internal accounting control within the Department of Education. The funds granted by this action will be used to provide English as a Second Language classes at the Latin American Center, 521 Maple Street, Manchester, NH, English for New Americans at the First Congregational Church, 508 Union Street, Manchester, NH, will provide Adult Basic Education and English as a Second Language classes in the Seacoast area. Also provide counseling services for ABE students, advanced ESOL students, and high school equivalency graduates transitioning to community colleges, 4-year colleges and universities. EXPLANATION

The funds granted by this action will be used to provide English as a Second Language classes at the Latin American Center, 521 Maple Street, Manchester, NH and English for New Americans at the First Congregational Church, 508 Union Street, Manchester, NH. Approximately 145 adults will be served by this program.

The Adult Basic Education Program is a classroom based instructional program for adults with reading and math levels between the 1st and 8th grades. Educational services will be provided at the Community Campus, 100 Campus Drive, Portsmouth, NH. Students receiving services will be from the city of Portsmouth and the surrounding communities of New Castle, Greenland, Rye and Newington. Upon completion of this program students go into review courses for the high school equivalency test. Approximately 100 adults will be served by the program.

The Adult Ed/Postsecondary Transitions Program will provide counseling services for ABE students, advanced ESOL students, and high school equivalency graduates transitioning to community colleges, 4-year colleges and universities.

All federal and state adult education grants are awarded through a competitive application process that is open to school districts, private not for profit and governmental agencies. The criteria for evaluating the applications are contained in the Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (Workforce Investment Act-Title II).

Funding for these grants comes from the Adult Education and Family Literacy Act and state funding for adult basic education. All grants are approved by the staff of the Bureau of Adult Education, NH Department of Education after a competitive application process open to all interested agencies. Agencies eligible for grants from the Bureau of Adult Education include school districts and private not for profit organizations. Applications are evaluated and funds granted based upon criteria ranging from per pupil cost to the quality of instruction provided.

The actual amount of the grants may reflect changes incorporated into the projects after the OBM Form 1-Project Applications were filed with the Bureau of Adult Education.

The Bureau of Adult Education provides educational services to approximately 8,000 adults each year. The New Hampshire Department of Education Centralized Federal Funding System will be utilized to grant funds to Southern New Hampshire Services, Inc.

NEEDS ASSESSMENT

The need for English classes for adult speakers of other languages in Manchester and the surrounding area is well known. For many years Southern New Hampshire Services (SNHS) has endeavored to meet this need through ESOL classes held at the Latin American Center. Students in these classes over the years have been almost exclusively Spanish speaking. Immigration and refugee arrival patterns have changed over the last 10-15 years and the number of non-English speaking individuals from a variety of countries in Manchester has increased dramatically.

The Latin American Center has been expanded into a multi-cultural center, housing a Somali self-help program as well as an agricultural program for African refugees, along with the services still being offered to Latino families. This has led to a dramatic increase in attendance at ESOL classes at the site by individuals from a variety of countries. Many of these students are involved in the New Hampshire Employment Program, for which participation in ESOL is a requirement.

SNHS saw an opportunity to have a larger impact on assistance to this growing population by expanding our ESOL program to include classes addressing this larger population. The English for New Americans program (ENA) was lacking funding to continue, so SNHS stepped in and administered the program, providing one-time discretionary funding to sustain it through the summer of 2009 and this past school year. With no prospects for continued funding through any other sources operating as a separate entity, we have made the classes part of SNHS' ESOL program, along with the classes held at the multi-cultural center. It is now one program with 2 separate sites to accommodate the number of students involved, and is a much stronger program overall.

This dovetails perfectly in with the direction SNHS' program needs to take in light of the self-evaluation program. One of the most important improvements noted on the teacher's self evaluation forms was the need for classes of different levels. The single classroom, multi-level approach used at the Latin American Center in the past is not adequate to meet the needs of the students currently making use of the multi-cultural center classes. Dividing students into classes by ability level will enhance the learning process, reduce teacher and student frustration, and will also match the process already being used in the ENA classes. With the influx of students at the multi-cultural center, and the need to adequately address the different levels of English proficiency in classes, classes at the multi-cultural center as well as the First Congregational Church site will be structured based on ability level. This will enable us, with the 2 sites, to serve more students in a particular level because multiple classes can be held at the same time.

This approach also addresses the need for significant hours of instruction allowing students to make significant learning gains, an issue raised in the self-evaluation. The total class time in one week of classes at the multi-cultural center was 21 or 23 hours, which included all levels in the same classes. This new format and program expansion allows us to provide 17 hours of beginning literacy classes alone each week. Beginning literacy level students have historically made up the largest percentage of ESOL students. With classes focused on specific ability levels, teachers are not dividing time between addressing the learning needs of students with varying English proficiency, or

struggling to balance the different needs by "teaching to the middle" and frustrating more or less advanced students.

Another change based on the self-evaluation is use of technology. At ENA there are 8 computers in one of the classrooms. Students from SNHU and Saint Anselm College provide individualized instruction in using them, about 1 hour a week for 5 weeks. We would like to develop our use of computers for more general ESOL instruction but use of space is an issue we need to address to make that more of a reality.

Southern New Hampshire's ESOL program (the combined Latin American Center ESOL and English for New Americans ESOL at First Congregational Church) proposes to offer 8 daytime and 7 evening classes for the school year 2010-2011. The daytime classes will meet from 9:00-12:00 noon, two days a week, for a total of 6 hours/week. The 8th daytime class, a continuation of Beginning Literacy for newly arrived Bhutanese refugees, will meet from 12:30-2:30PM, 3 days a week, for a total of 6 hours. The evening classes will meet from 6:00-8:30PM, two days a week, for a total of 5 hours/week. Students in the morning and evening classes will have the option of attending Conversation Cafés led by Teachers' Aids and volunteers one day a week. The 12:30-2:30 class will continue with monthly Conversation Teas organized by volunteers from First Congregational Church.

The RCA-Portsmouth Adult Basic Education Program, as administered by Rockingham Community Action, was established in 1996 to meet the educational needs of the least educated, the non-English speaking, and the economically disadvantaged older adolescents and adults in Portsmouth and the greater Seacoast community. In the fourteen years of operating this program, over 796 students have accessed adult basic education classes, (ABE, ESL and GED preparation) through the services provided by the RCA-Portsmouth Adult Basic Education Program.

Each year, the scope of adult basic education services has reflected the unique composition of the student population. Consistent dedication and commitment of the staff and administration combine to produce quality programming which is flexible and focused on providing a comprehensive, learner-based approach.

The Adult Education/College Transitions Program will provide counseling services for ABE students, advanced ESOL students, and GED graduates transitioning to community colleges and 4-year colleges and universities.
