REQUESTED ACTION

Authorize the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health Services, to amend an existing contract with Keene State College of the University System of New Hampshire (Vendor #177865), 229 Main Street, Keene, NH 03435, by increasing the price limitation by \$20,000 from \$397,200 to an amount not to exceed \$417,200 to provide physical activity consultation and to implement a statewide physical activity project focused on licensed child care programs, with no change to the completion date of June 30, 2018, effective upon the date of Governor and Executive Council approval. This agreement was originally approved by the Governor and Executive Council on March 13, 2015, item #11 and subsequently amended on June 24, 2015, item #56, amended again on March 9, 2016, item #19, and amended again on February 15, 2017 item #14. 100% Federal Funds.

Funds are available in the following account for State Fiscal Year 2018, with authority to adjust amounts within the price limitation and adjust encumbrances between State Fiscal Years through the Budget Office, without approval from the Governor and Executive Council, if needed and justified.

EXPLANATION

These funds will be utilized by the Contractor to work with the Division of Public Health Services staff to identify and solicit interest from at least seven (7) licensed child care programs to participate in a statewide physical activity project. The Contractor will assist child care programs with completing two (2) physical activity self-assessments included in the Nutrition and Physical Activity Self-Assessment for Child Care (Go NAP SACC) program. Once the self-assessments are completed, Keene State College staff will work with staff from each child care program to address any weaknesses identified by the self-assessments and then work together to determine at least three (3) improvements each program can make to their physical activity policies and/or practices to provide additional physical activity time or improve the quality of the physical activity currently offered to children in their care.

In New Hampshire, more than 53,000 children under the age of six (6) are potentially in need of child care, as one or both parents are in the workforce. With children spending a large percentage of their day at their respective child care program, the child care setting represents an ideal opportunity to help children develop and practice age-appropriate physical activity and adopt physical activity habits that can last a lifetime.

The Contractor is successfully fulfilling and achieving the performance measures of the original contract with regards to Go NAP SACC. Keene State College has helped fifty nine (59) licensed child care programs complete NAP SACC self-assessments and have made one hundred eighty five (185) nutrition or physical activity improvements at their programs. These fifty nine (59) programs care for more than four thousand (4,000) children under the age of six (6).

Keene State College of the University System of New Hampshire was selected for this project through a competitive bid process.

Should the Governor and Executive Council not authorize this request, licensed child care programs may not have access to the assistance required to complete the Go NAPP SACC Infant & Child Physical Activity and Outdoor Plan & Learning self-assessment tools and may not have the opportunity to assist in the development of physical activity practices and/or policies that children can sustain for years to come.

- A. Project Title: Physical Activity Component of the Nutrition and Physical Activity Self-Assessment for Child Care (NAP SACC) Program
- B. Project Period: Unchanged
- C. Objectives: The contract was established to improve school and child care wellness with the Go NAP SACC model (Nutritional and Physical Activity Assessment for Child Care). Healthy Eating and Sodium Reduction is one facet of NAP SACC and physical activity is another facet of the Program. The Department is looking to expand the scope to include the physical activity component of NAP SACC.

Early Care and Education (ECE) settings are ideal for promoting physical activity due to a large proportion of young children spendiing the majority of their waking hours in childcare. Early childhood is an excellent time to build physical activity skills and establish life-long habits of physical activity, both of which are crucial to obesity prevention efforts.

D. Scope of Work:

The Contractor will work with Department staff to identify and subcontract with at least seven (7) licensed child care programs that will participate in the project and provide qualified staff to assist the Licensed Child Care Programs in completing two physical activity assessments included in the Nutrition and Physical Activity Self-Assessment for Child Care (Go NAP SACC) program.

The Go NAP SACC program is child care health consultation and training designed specifically for use in child care settings. The NAP SACC program promotes healthy weight development in preschool children by helping child care programs improve the amount and the quality of physical activity provided to children.

E. Deliverables Schedule:

- F. Budget and Invoicing Instructions: Campus will submit invoices to State on regular Campus invoice forms no more frequently than monthly and no less frequently than quarterly. Invoices will be based on actual project expenses incurred during the invoicing period and shall show current and cumulative expenses by major cost categories, billed separately by State Fiscal Year. State will pay Campus within thirty (30) days of receipt of each invoice. Campus will submit its final invoice not later than (sixty) 60 days after the Project Period end date. Carryforward of unexpended funds from one SFY to the next will require prior State approval.

EXPLANATION

The purpose of this amendment is to exercise the renewal option in the original contract and increase the number of licensed Child Care Programs and New Hampshire Public School Administrative Units improving local school wellness policies and the nutritional quality of foods and beverages served to children.

Funds in this agreement will be used for nutrition consultation and implementing a statewide Healthy Eating and Sodium Reduction pilot project for a total of 65 child care programs and New Hampshire Public School Administrative Units. This extended agreement term will allow an additional 15 child care programs and 10 New Hampshire Public School Administrative Units to complete nutrition and sodium reduction improvement projects.

In New Hampshire, approximately 47,000 children attend licensed child care programs. The potential for addressing childhood obesity in the child care setting is significant. Nationally 41% of preschool-aged children are in child care for 35 or more hours per week. The child care setting presents an ideal opportunity to help children develop and practice appropriate nutrition and physical activity behaviors. Compared to a control group, child care centers who have participated in the Nutrition and Physical Activity Self-Assessment for Child Care intervention are more likely to make significant changes in nutrition policies and practices. Preliminary data from a research study indicate that Nutrition and Physical Activity Self-Assessment for Child Care may also have a modest impact on behavior of children while in child care.

The original contract was competitively bid. There were two applications submitted. Keene State College was selected.

Should the Governor and Executive Council not authorize this request, the Child Care programs and New Hampshire Public School Administrative Unit may not have access to appropriate nutrition consultation necessary to implement a Healthy Eating and Sodium Reduced Diet which may have a significant impact on childhood obesity.

Nationally 41% of preschool-aged children are in child care for 35 or more hours per week. The child care setting presents an ideal opportunity to help children develop and practice appropriate nutrition and physical activity behaviors. Compared to a control group, child care centers who have participated in the Nutrition and Physical Activity Self-Assessment for Child Care intervention are more likely to make significant changes in nutrition policies and practices. Preliminary data from a research study indicate that Nutrition and Physical Activity Self-Assessment for Child Care may also have a modest impact on behavior of children while in child care.

The original contract was competitively bid. There were two applications submitted. Keene State College was selected.

EXPLANATION

The purpose of this amendment is to exercise the renewal option in the original contract and increase the number of licensed Child Care Programs and New Hampshire Public School Administrative Units improving local school wellness policies and the nutritional quality of foods and beverages served to children.

Funds in this agreement will be used for nutrition consultation and implementing a statewide Healthy Eating and Sodium Reduction pilot project for a total of 50 child care programs and New Hampshire Public School Administrative Units. This extended agreement term will allow an additional 15 child care programs and 10 New Hampshire Public School Administrative Units to complete nutrition and sodium reduction improvement projects.

Compared to a control group, child care centers who have participated in the Nutrition and Physical Activity Self-Assessment for Child Care intervention are more likely to make significant changes in nutrition policies and practices. Preliminary data from a research study indicate that Nutrition and Physical Activity Self-Assessment for Child Care may also have a modest impact on behavior of children while in child care.²

Schools play a critical role in promoting student health, preventing childhood obesity, and combating problems associated with poor nutrition and physical inactivity. In 2004, Congress passed the Child Nutrition and Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) Reauthorization Act (Sec. 204 of Public Law 108-205). This act required by law that all school districts participating in the National School Lunch Program or other child nutrition programs create local school wellness policies by School Year 2006. The legislation places the responsibility of developing a wellness policy at the local level so the individual needs of each school district can be addressed.

The original contract was competitively bid. On November 10, 2014 the Department issued a Request for Application to solicit applications to provide nutrition consultation and implement a statewide Healthy Eating and Sodium Reduction pilot project. The request for applications was available on the Department of Health and Human Services' web site from November 10, 2014 through November 21, 2014. In addition an email was sent to 29 New Hampshire non-profit organizations notifying them that a Request for Application was posted. There were two applications submitted. Keene State College was selected. The bid summary is attached.

Should Governor and Council not authorize this request, the Child Care programs and New Hampshire Public School Administrative Unit are not likely to have the capacity to assess current nutrition and sodium reduction policies and then improve the nutritional quality of foods and beverages served to children.

Nationally 41% of preschool-aged children are in child care for 35 or more hours per week¹. The child care setting presents an ideal opportunity to help children develop and practice appropriate nutrition and physical activity behaviors. Compared to a control group, child care centers who have participated in the Nutrition and Physical Activity Self-Assessment for Child Care intervention are more likely to make significant changes in nutrition policies and practices. Preliminary data from a research study indicate that Nutrition and Physical Activity Self-Assessment for Child Care may also have a modest impact on behavior of children while in child care.²

Schools play a critical role in promoting student health, preventing childhood obesity, and combating problems associated with poor nutrition and physical inactivity. In 2004, Congress passed the Child Nutrition and Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) Reauthorization Act (Sec. 204 of Public Law 108-205). This act required by law that all school districts participating in the National School Lunch Program or other child nutrition programs create local school wellness policies by School Year 2006. The legislation places the responsibility of developing a wellness policy at the local level so the individual needs of each school district can be addressed.

Should Governor and Council not authorize this request, improvements to nutrition practices in child care policies and in school wellness policies would not be made. Young children would not be exposed to healthy nutritious foods early in life and have a higher risk of becoming obese later in life.

Keene State Gollege was selected for this project through a competitive bid process. A Request for Application was posted on the Department of Health and Human Services' web site from November 10, 2014 through November 21, 2014. In addition an email was sent to 29 New Hampshire non-profit organizations notifying them that a Request for Application was posted. These 29 organizations are located throughout the state and have an organizational focus around nutrition, consultation, and/or healthy eating.

Two applications were received in response to the Request for Application. Three reviewers, one who works internal and two who work external to the Department reviewed the proposals. The reviewers represent a seasoned public health advisor, a NH Department of Education administrator, and a young child wellness advisor who have from five to ten years' experience in public health. Each reviewer was selected for the specific skill set they possess and for their experience in their respective fields. Their decision followed a thorough discussion of the strengths and weaknesses to the proposals. The final decision was made through consensus scoring. The Score Summary is attached.

As referenced in the Request for Application and in the Master Agreement for Cooperative Projects between the State of New Hampshire and Keene State College, this Agreement has the option to extend for three (3) additional years, contingent upon satisfactory delivery of services, available funding, agreement of the parties, and approval of the Governor and Executive Council.

The following performance measures will be used to measure the effectiveness of the agreement:

- 100% of the selected SAUs will improve or add at least one nutrition component to their current local school wellness policy that will improve the healthy eating environment, outside of the federal school lunch program, at their SAU.
- 100% of the selected SAUs will improve or add at least one nutrition component to their current local school wellness policy that specifically addresses reducing the amount of sodium in foods/beverages available to students, outside of the federal school lunch program, at their SAU.

- 4) The Campus agrees to provide up to six hundred and eight 608 hours of service at a rate of \$50.00 per hour and provide mini grants of up to \$1,000 each, not to exceed \$15,000, to participating SAUs, for a maximum total contract value of \$45,400 per year.
- 5) This is a cost-reimbursement contract. Reimbursement shall be made monthly based on actual costs incurred during the previous month. Funds available per State Fiscal Year (SFY), must be expended within that SFY term unless a carryforward request of unexpended funds is made to, and approved by, the NH DHHS.
- 6) Payment will be made by the State agency subsequent to approval of the submitted invoice and if sufficient funds are available in the Service category budget line items submitted by the Campus to cover the costs and expenses incurred upon compliance with reporting requirements and performance and utilization review. Campus will keep detailed records of their activities related to DHHS-funded programs and services.
