A legislative leader needs to be ready for prime time! She/he needs to understand the power of the new media and how it can be used to either build or destroy a career. This session will take a closer look at how the new media is reshaping the political landscape and what you can do to effectively manage these powerful new communications tools.

11:00 am **Roundtable Discussions: "The Pitfalls of Power in Your Office"**

It is often said that "forewarned is forearmed." Perhaps the best way to prepare for and prevent ethical challenges is to be aware of the potential temptations that exist. In this session, program participants, gathering in small groups, will identify and discuss specific potential pitfalls of power in their own offices in order to develop specific strategies to avoid falling victim to them.

Very few, if any, public officials embark on their path to public service with the intent of deceiving others or intentionally violating the law. And most people who get caught in a scandal didn't get up one morning and decide to commit a crime or deceive the public. Instead, many scandals begin innocently enough with what was thought to be a minor or unintentional violation, or with a self-rationalization that goes something like this, "I needed to do this small thing to stay in office so I can do really good things."

In this session, we will hear from a former legislator whose insignificant mistake and his not so insignificant effort to hide it, landed him in federal prison.

Despite being constantly in the public eye, many public officials are convinced that their indiscretions will go unnoticed or undiscovered. They rationalize that their predecessor did it for years and never got caught or that no one will notice this "one little thing."

In this session we will examine real-life cases of illegal and unethical behavior and talk about what you need to do to protect yourself, your colleagues, and the public from these serious ethical lapses.
