On behalf of the Reforming States Group (RSG), we would like to invite you to the fall RSG meeting in Atlanta, Georgia, on November 13–15, 2014.

The RSG is a bipartisan, voluntary group of state health policy leaders from both the executive and legislative branches who, with a small group of international colleagues, convene regularly to share information, develop professional networks, and work on practical solutions to pressing problems in health care.

Since its inception in 1992, the RSG has been supported by the Milbank Memorial Fund—the nation's oldest endowed foundation dedicated to improving population health by connecting leaders and decision makers with the best available evidence and experience. To this end, the Fund will arrange and pay for your travel, meals, and lodging, and reimburse incidental expenses according to its policies.

Fall Meetings

The fall meeting provides a trusted forum for health care policymakers in states and other jurisdictions to candidly share experiences and to discuss common challenges. Participants at RSG meetings say that they attend because of the unequalled opportunity to learn from legislative and administrative colleagues from across the country in a bipartisan setting. We expect that approximately 40 senior-level officials will participate in this invitation-only meeting.

RSG meetings are unique in several ways:

- Focus on State Policymakers - the health of our communities depends upon state leadership to balance competing priorities and advance health policy.
- Nonpartisanship – the group's strict adherence to principles of nonpartisanship enhance its credibility as a source of good information.
- "Milbank Rules" – during RSG gatherings, state leaders discuss policy ideas and learn how their peers address challenges, all while adhering to the idea that "what's said here, stays here."

Meeting Agenda

Improved population health depends in part on enlightened, evidence-based state policies. The RSG believes that leadership is essential to making this happen and works to develop leadership among participants for the benefit of the states. We are inviting a delegation from New Hampshire, and our expectation is that a shared RSG experience will inform and inspire your work when you return home.

The meeting itself reflects this ambition. One of the highlights is the state updates, during which participants share information about health care successes, challenges, and significant legislation in their states. Past RSG participants have said that these confidential, collegial exchanges are a primary reason they attend the meeting. The meeting will also feature other topics of interest to states, including:


- Primary care transformation—the evidence shows that primary care is essential to a well-performing health care delivery system and that payment reform works best when it is consistent across payers. What lessons have been learned from state-convened provider payment initiatives as they align across multiple payers?
- The future of sofosbuvir (brand name Sovaldi™) and other high priced drugs—public and private payers alike are grappling with the impact of sofosbuvir, a treatment for chronic hepatitis C virus infection (HCV). How are states dealing with it? What does the evidence say about the treatment's effectiveness?

In addition to the RSG meeting, we will be convening a pre-meeting session on the state of the evidence and practice of community health workers and community paramedicine. Community health workers and paramedicine may both offer ways to improve population health and reduce costs for burdened state governments. The pre-meeting session will explore the evidence and provide an opportunity to look at promising state-based programs with national experts and committed colleagues.




