Authorize the Department of Health and Human Services, Division for Children, Youth and Families, Sununu Youth Service Center to accept and expend the Title I Grants from the New Hampshire Department of Education in the amount of \$85,648 effective upon Governor and Council approval through June 30, 2020, and further authorize the allocation of these funds in the accounts below.

EXPLANATION

Summer school is an 8 week educational program offered to all residents of SYSC. Given the educational development of the youth placed at SYSC, additional educational programming has been determined to be a critical need for these youth. Majority of youth placed at SYSC have had a history of school disruption, identified gaps in education and deficient of required credits towards their high school diploma. Summer programming allows for credit recovery in addition to improvement in understanding of all subject areas below. In additional to the educational benefits, summer programming also allows for a much needed structure and

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consistency that these youth require to be successful. In order to accomplish the summer school programming, SYSC hires a number of part-time, contracted teachers to provide this service. This past summer SYSC hired 9 part-time, contracted teachers. These teachers provided instruction in the following areas: math, science, English, social studies, art and physical education.

Goals of Summer School Programming:

- 1. Enhance skills in math, English, social studies, science and physical education.
- 2. Provide remedial instruction to academically deficient students.
- 3. Provide small classroom size that will increase instruction time and access.
- 4. Provide credit recovery for students in need.
- 5. Provide Hi-set preparation for those students who will not receive their high school diploma.
- 6. Provide extended school year programming for those students identified through special education as needing that service.

Outcome measure for summer school programming;

- 1. Students showed improvement in subject matter through pre and post testing.
- 2. Student showed improvement and increased understanding in subject matters through work samples.
- 3. All students who participated and completed summer programming improved their academic standing by earning credits towards their high school diploma.
- 4. Student preparing for high school equivalency (Hi-Set) improved skills and abilities that would allow them to successfully earn this certification
- 5. At the conclusion of the summer programming and the additional credits earned, at least 2 students earned their high school diploma from their sending school district.

In addition to the information provided above, the summer school programming is a critical service necessary for a successful transition for youth returning to the community and the sending school districts. Without this much needed resource many of the youth will continue to remain at risk for school failure when returned to the community. Additionally, summer programming allows youth the opportunity to reinforce requisite skills needed to build resiliency and appropriate social behaviors.

100% of these grant funds are from Department of Education.

Area served: Statewide.

Source of Funds: 100% Other Funds.

If Other Funds become no longer available, General Funds will not be requested to support the program

expenditures.

EXPLANATION OF BLOCKS ON THIS SUB-AWARD GRANT AWARD NOTIFICATION (GAN)
