REQUESTED ACTION

Authorize the Department of Transportation to enter into an Agreement with the firm of Cambridge Systematics, Inc., Medford, MA, Vendor #210195; for an amount not to exceed \$1,500,000.00, for on-call asset management related consulting services, effective upon Governor and Council approval through October 31, 2022. 100% Federal Funds.

Funding to support this request is available in the following accounts in State FY 2020 and State FY 2021 and is contingent upon the availability and continued appropriation of funds in FY 2022 and FY 2023, with the ability to adjust encumbrances between State Fiscal Years through the Budget Office if needed and justified:

The Consolidated Federal Fund, AU 3054, is utilized at this time to encumber funds for this request. Actual funding sources will be determined by each particular project incurring expenses as a result of this request.

EXPLANATION

The Department requires on-call engineering and technical services to support on-going asset management initiatives within the Department and will complement the work being performed by the staff of the Office of Asset Management, Performance, and Strategy (AMPS) and the overall Department. The types of services required under the terms of this agreement will generally include assisting with the implementation of new or expanded asset-related systems, providing guidance, best practices, and tools for the collection and maintenance of asset data, developing tools, processes, and analytics for the evaluation, prioritization, and comparison of assets, providing enterprise level guidance for applications and system architecture, and providing support for the development of reports, including an update of asset management plans and related documents/processes. Transportation assets are physical infrastructure including all components that support the operation of the transportation network.

The consultant selection process employed by the Department for this qualifications-based contract is in accordance with RSAs 21-I:22, 21-I:22-c and 21-I:22-d, all applicable Federal laws and the Department's "Consultant Selection and Service Agreement Procedures" dated December 1999. The Department's Consultant Selection Committee is a standing committee that meets regularly to administer the process and make determinations. The Committee is comprised of the Assistant Director of Project Development (Chair), the Chief Project Manager, the Administrators of the Bureaus of Highway Design, Bridge Design, Environment, and Materials and Research, and the Municipal Highways Engineer.

The consultant selection process for this qualifications-based contract was initiated by a solicitation for consultant services for a Statewide On-Call Asset Management Services contracts. The assignment was listed as a "Project Soliciting for Interest" on the Department's website on January 25, 2019, asking for letters of interest from qualified firms. From the list of firms that submitted letters of interest, the Committee prepared a long and then short list of Consultants on February 28, 2019 for consideration and approval by the Assistant Commissioner. Upon receipt of that approval, three (3) shortlisted firms were notified on March 11, 2019 through a technical

"Request for Proposal" (RFP). Committee members individually rated the firms' technical proposals on April 11, 2019 using a written ballot to score each firm on the basis of comprehension of the assignment, clarity of the proposal, capacity to perform in a timely manner, quality and experience of the project manager and the team, and overall suitability for the assignment. (A compilation of the completed individual rating ballots and the ranking summary form is attached.) The individual rankings were then totaled to provide an overall ranking of the three firms, and the Committee's ranking was submitted to the Assistant Commissioner for consideration and approval. Upon receipt of the Assistant Commissioner's approval, the shortlisted firms were notified of the results and the highest-ranking firm was asked to submit a fee proposal for negotiations.


The firm of Cambridge Systematics, Inc. has been recommended for this contract. This firm has an excellent reputation and has demonstrated their capability to perform the required services in a previous similar contract with the Department. Background information on this firm is attached.

Cambridge Systematics, Inc. has agreed to furnish the on-call services for an amount not to exceed \$1,500,000.00. The cost for individual Task Orders assigned under this contract will be negotiated and use of a modified cost plus fixed fee or lump sum method of compensation will be determined based on the complexity and scope of engineering and technical services required. No new tasks may be assigned after the above-noted completion date, however, completion of previously assigned work begun prior to the completion date shall be allowed, subject to the written mutual agreement of both parties, which shall include a revised date of completion.

This Agreement (Statewide On-Call Asset Management Services 42503) has been approved by the Attorney General as to form and execution. The Department has verified that the necessary funds are available. Copies of the fully-executed Agreement are on file at the Secretary of State's Office and the Department of Administrative Services, and subsequent to Governor and Council approval will be on file at the Department of Transportation.

It is respectfully requested that authority be given to enter into an Agreement for consulting services as outlined above.

PROJECT: Statewide On-Call Asset Management & System Implementation Services 42503

DESCRIPTION: One (1) Statewide On-Call Asset Management & System Implementation Services Agreement, anticipated to have a maximum value of \$1,500,000 over a 3-year term, is needed to provide technical, economic, planning, engineering, system, data governance, and technical writing skills. Anticipated assignments include, but are not limited to, providing services for: System implementation support. Providing guidance regarding best practices to DOT staff during the implementation of a Fleet, Work Order, and Inventory System as well as the review of work products of the implementation vendor; Evaluating methods/approaches for the collection and maintenance of asset data as well as modeling and forecasting of assets; Development of tools, methodologies, and processes for the prioritization of asset investment; Data governance for assets and related data; Application rationalization; Life-cycle cost analysis tools/methodologies for assets; Asset data warehouse and system architecture; Cross asset analysis and allocation; Risk evaluation and quantification; and Technical writing tasks that could include preparation of reports, specifications, procedures, etc. This work will require Professional Engineer licensure in the State of New Hampshire.

The effort addressed the issue for pavement and bridge assets, leveraging existing tools and data to facilitate the analysis.

NCHRP 20-24 Task 124 Performance Measure Reporting Peer Exchange | For NCHRP, as the Principal Investigator, Mr. Higgins is leading an effort to facilitate a peer exchange and develop communication materials to help State DOTs communicate the difference between Federal and State pavement performance measures and targets.

Alaska Transportation Asset Management Information System (TAMIS) | Mr. Higgins designed and mapped a strategy for asset management systems integration to support decision-making. He reviewed current systems used for asset management, considered key business processes necessary for decision-making, and recommended an approach to take advantage of existing systems to support decision-making.

NCHRP 8-36 Task 128 Guide for Data Visualization for Transportation Agencies | Mr. Higgins developed an interactive website that guides users through a process to develop beautiful and informative data visualizations using the right data visualization technique and the right data visualization tool. **AGREEMENT
FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES**

PREAMBLE

THIS AGREEMENT made this _____ day of _____ in the year 2019 by and between the STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE, hereinafter referred to as the STATE, acting by and through its COMMISSIONER OF THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, hereinafter referred to as the COMMISSIONER, acting under Chapter 228 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, and Cambridge Systematics, Inc., with principal place of business at 100 Station Landing, Suite 410, in the City of Medford State of Massachusetts, hereinafter referred to as the CONSULTANT, witnesses that:

The Department of Transportation, State of New Hampshire, hereinafter referred to as the DEPARTMENT, requires on-call engineering and technical services to support on-going asset management initiatives within the DEPARTMENT. These services are outlined in the CONSULTANT'S technical proposal dated April 14, 2019.

This AGREEMENT becomes effective upon approval by the Governor and Council.

ARTICLE I

ARTICLE I - DESCRIPTION OF PROFESSIONAL SERVICES TO BE RENDERED

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the undertakings of the parties hereinafter set forth, the DEPARTMENT hereby engages the CONSULTANT, who agrees to render services to the DEPARTMENT which shall include, but not be restricted to, the following items, in accordance with conditions and terms hereinafter set forth:

A. DESCRIPTION OF SERVICES

The types of services required under the terms of this AGREEMENT shall generally include, but are not limited to, the following: 1) assisting with the implementation of new or expanded asset-related systems, 2) providing guidance, best practices, and tools for the collection and maintenance of asset data, 3) developing tools, processes, and analytics for the evaluation, prioritization, and comparison of assets, 4) providing enterprise level guidance for applications and system architecture, and 5) providing support for the development of reports, including an update of asset management plans and related documents/processes.

B. SCOPE OF WORK

The DEPARTMENT requires consulting services that will complement the work being performed by the Office of Asset Management, Performance, and Strategy (AMPS) and the overall DEPARTMENT. The CONSULTANT may be required to provide any of the services described below. For each task, these services may be performed for a single asset class, a range of asset classes, or for one or more systems.

1. Implementation & Expansion/Enhancement of Asset Systems

The DEPARTMENT utilizes a number of systems for the collection, management, and analysis of asset-related data. Those systems include, but are not limited to, fleet management, work order management, consumable inventory management, durable inventory management, geographic information systems, bridge management, pavement management, other fixed-asset inventories, and related financial systems. The CONSULTANT shall provide support to the DEPARTMENT through the development and use of gap analyses, business requirements, change management, strategic planning and visioning, best practices, research, development, configuration, review of work products and deliverables, and other relevant practices.

2. Data Management

The DEPARTMENT collects and utilizes a large amount of asset-related data in many different formats and from a variety of systems. Much of the data is aggregated and managed as part of a data warehouse in Oracle while other data is managed in spatial systems (GIS-Oracle) or other separate databases in local and cloud environments. The CONSULTANT shall provide support to the DEPARTMENT through the development and use of tools for data collection, the alignment of data to a linear referencing system, data reduction, data governance, data architecture, and data archiving.

ARTICLE I

3. Asset Analytics

The DEPARTMENT relies on a combination of systems, spreadsheets, databases, and processes to conduct asset analytics. The CONSULTANT shall provide support to the DEPARTMENT through the development and refinement of asset analytics, including, but not limited to, condition forecasting, deterioration modeling, prioritization, needs analyses, life-cycle cost analyses, valuation, risk analyses, multi-object decision analyses, and optimization.

4. Enterprise Support

The DEPARTMENT utilizes a number of asset systems, data, and analytics that are integrated in various ways and to different degrees at the enterprise level. The CONSULTANT shall provide support to the DEPARTMENT through the development and use of application rationalization, system integration, system interfacing, data warehousing, enterprise architecture, and best practices.

5. Reports, Plans, and Visualizations

The DEPARTMENT develops an Asset Management Plan along with many other reports and plans relating to asset management. The CONSULTANT shall provide support to the DEPARTMENT through the development of reports, plans, and visualizations for both print and electronic access, including technical briefs, memorandums, technical and non-technical reports, dashboards, online mapping, and other related products. The CONSULTANT shall provide support to the DEPARTMENT for any aspect of the Asset Management Plan to maintain compliance with 23 CFR Part 515 and Part 667.

C. STAFFING

The CONSULTANT shall submit the Salary Rate Calculation Form (furnished to the CONSULTANT by the DEPARTMENT) which contains the average salary rates for the personnel anticipated to be assigned to the Task Order. This form will be used for Task Order cost development independently by the CONSULTANT and the DEPARTMENT prior to entering into negotiations for Task Orders under this AGREEMENT.

D. QUALITY CONTROL

The CONSULTANT is expected to perform in a professional manner and all work shall be neat, well organized, fully comply with the requirements of this AGREEMENT and Task Orders, and meet the specified accuracy requirements. The DEPARTMENT will reject any data that does not comply with the above. The DEPARTMENT will decide when the data and services have fully met the project requirements. The CONSULTANT will not be paid for insufficient work.

E. TASK ORDERS

As needs develop, the DEPARTMENT will issue specific Task Orders to the CONSULTANT. A Task Order is an individually funded order with its own unique scope of work issued against the basic contract

ARTICLE I

scope of work, terms and conditions, to carry out a specific project for the DEPARTMENT. These Task Orders will be initiated by a Request for Proposal (RFP) letter that may include a detailed description of the project or elements of work, an outline of the services required, responsibilities of the parties, materials to be supplied by the DEPARTMENT, specified accuracy requirements, and other information necessary to complete the work for the Task Order. The CONSULTANT shall then submit to the DEPARTMENT for approval a scope of work and fee proposal and a tentative work schedule and completion date for each Task Order assigned. The DEPARTMENT will review the CONSULTANT'S proposal and schedule negotiations, if necessary, to clarify the proposed scope of work, the number of work hours needed, and any other associated proposed costs in order to establish the final not-to-exceed or lump-sum amount for the Task Order. Upon approval of the CONSULTANT'S proposal by the DEPARTMENT and the appropriate Federal agency (if applicable), the DEPARTMENT will issue a Task Order Authorization to Proceed Letter. The CONSULTANT shall sign the Authorization to Proceed Letter and return it to the DEPARTMENT. A conference may be required to turn over a Task Order to the CONSULTANT. Costs associated with the CONSULTANT'S preparation of a scope of work and fee for a Task Order are non-reimbursable.

F. MATERIAL FURNISHED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

The DEPARTMENT will furnish the CONSULTANT with the appropriate materials, in electronic and/or hardcopy format, as needed to perform the assigned work.

G. WORK SCHEDULE AND PROGRESS REPORTS

The CONSULTANT shall be aware that the services to be performed under this AGREEMENT will be on an as-needed basis. In addition, the CONSULTANT shall realize that emergency situations may arise that will require immediate response/action.

Following approval of the contract by the Governor and Council, the CONSULTANT shall be available to begin performance of the services designated in the Contract promptly upon receipt from the DEPARTMENT of a Notice to Proceed Letter. Upon receipt of a Task Order Authorization to Proceed Letter, the CONSULTANT shall complete the services required for each Task Order without delay unless unable to do so for causes not under the CONSULTANT'S control.

It is imperative that close coordination between the CONSULTANT and the DEPARTMENT be maintained at all times so as to ensure compliance with the DEPARTMENT'S requirements for specific Task Orders.

The CONSULTANT'S sequence of operation and performance of the work under the terms of this AGREEMENT shall be varied at the direction of the DEPARTMENT to give priority in critical areas so that schedules and other STATE commitments, either present or future, can be met.

ARTICLE I

The CONSULTANT shall report progress monthly for each active Task Order with activity during the billing period, in accordance with the DEPARTMENT'S Standardized Invoicing.

H. SUBMISSION OF REPORTS, PLANS AND DOCUMENTS

Each submission shall be supplemented with such drawings, illustrations and descriptive matter as are necessary to facilitate a comprehensive review of proposed concepts. Any and all CAD/D-related work during the course of this project shall be performed in conformance with the DEPARTMENT'S CAD/D Procedures and Requirements in effect at the time of execution of this AGREEMENT, which will be coordinated on each assignment.

Upon completion of the AGREEMENT, the CONSULTANT shall turn over all documentation, including, but not limited to, all reports, test results, drawings, plans, and all financial supporting documentation in their original format and in the format submitted to the DEPARTMENT.

I. DELIVERABLES

All work and supporting documents for Task Orders completed under this AGREEMENT shall be developed by the CONSULTANT and delivered to the DEPARTMENT according to the following formats:

Electronic Transfer of Data: The DEPARTMENT requires the following to ensure compatibility with software used by the DEPARTMENT and to ensure the efficient and timely exchange of computer files between the DEPARTMENT and the CONSULTANT.

All files submitted must be fully compatible with the formats listed in this document without any conversion or editing by the DEPARTMENT. Any files requiring conversion and/or editing by the DEPARTMENT will not be accepted. All files shall be virus free. All files shall use the DEPARTMENT'S file naming convention.

Computer Aided Design/Drafting (CAD/D) files: All CAD/D files shall be in accordance with the Deliverable Requirements described in the DEPARTMENT'S CAD/D Procedures and Requirements in effect at the time this AGREEMENT was executed, or any later version. All files submitted must be fully compatible with the current version of MicroStation being used by the DEPARTMENT. (The DEPARTMENT'S CAD/D Procedures and Requirements document can be found on the CAD/D website by following the "Downloads" link at www.nh.gov/dot/cadd/.)

Word Processing, Spreadsheet, and Database Files: For each Phase, all relevant files shall be provided in a format fully compatible, as appropriate, with the following:

- Word Processing: Microsoft Word 2010 or NHDOT compatible version
- Spreadsheets: Microsoft Excel 2010 or NHDOT compatible version
- Databases: Microsoft Access 2010 or NHDOT compatible version

ARTICLE I

These specifications will be updated as necessary to reflect changes in DEPARTMENT software such as adding new software or updating to new versions of existing software. In such instances, the CONSULTANT will be promptly notified.

Computer File Exchange Media: Electronic files shall be exchanged between the DEPARTMENT and the CONSULTANT using the following media as appropriate for Windows Operating Systems:

Secure electronic file transfer

External hard drive

Compact Disc (CD): Files on CD(s) should be actual size, not compressed.

DVD: Files on DVD(s) should be actual size, not compressed.

Email: Files 10 MB or smaller may be transferred via Email. If compressed, the files should be self-extracting and encrypted based on content.

Copies: The CONSULTANT shall provide hard (paper) and electronic copies of the deliverables for each Phase of Work. For all deliverables, provide electronic copies in two electronic versions; an electronic version in the original electronic file format (i.e., MicroStation (*.DGN), Microsoft Word (*.DOCX), Microsoft Excel (*.XLSX), etc.) and an electronic version in Adobe Acrobat (*.PDF) file format.

Website Information:

- a. Website Content: All external NHDOT websites created for Task Orders under this AGREEMENT shall meet the ADA Section 508 requirements as stated in the NH DoIT Website Standards. Those standards are outlined in <https://www.nh.gov/doit/vendor/documents/nh-website-standards.pdf>.
- b. Website Documents: All documents posted to a website created for Task Orders under this AGREEMENT, or that are submitted to be posted to a NHDOT website, shall meet ADA Section 508 accessibility requirements. A checklist for document compliance is provided in <https://www.section508.gov/content/build/create-accessible-documents> (go to second link down under "Checklists").

Upon completion of the AGREEMENT, the CONSULTANT shall turn over all documentation, including, but not limited to, all reports, test results, drawings, plans, and all financial supporting documentation in the formats described above.

ARTICLE I

J. DATE OF COMPLETION

The date of completion for the professional services rendered under this AGREEMENT is October 31, 2022 unless terminated earlier upon the depletion of the total amount payable under this AGREEMENT, or extended as allowed by the following provision:

No new tasks may be assigned after the above noted completion date, however, the CONSULTANT shall complete any tasks begun prior to the completion date, but not yet completed, in accordance with the methods of compensation specified in Article II and all other applicable portions and contractual requirements of this AGREEMENT. This shall be subject to the written mutual agreement of both parties, which shall include a revised Date of Completion to allow completion of the previously assigned work.

ARTICLE II

ARTICLE II - COMPENSATION OF CONSULTANT FOR ON-CALL SERVICES

A. AGREEMENT GENERAL FEE

In consideration of the terms and obligations of this AGREEMENT, the STATE, through the DEPARTMENT, hereby agrees to pay and the CONSULTANT agrees to accept as full compensation for the combined total cost of all work, expenses, and profit for Task Orders issued under this AGREEMENT, an amount not to exceed \$1,500,000.00. (The CONSULTANT shall note that no payments will be made for work, expenses, or profit, whether authorized or not, exceeding the \$1,500,000.00 total amount.)

B. METHOD OF COMPENSATION FOR TASK ORDERS

The method of compensation for Task Orders issued under this agreement will either be a **Cost-Plus-Fixed-Fee** format with method of payment as described in Section C, or a **Lump-Sum** format with method of payment as described in Section D. A **Task Order Fee Summary** will be included in the DEPARTMENT-issued Authorization to Proceed for a Task Order.

C. COST-PLUS-FIXED-FEE FORMAT

1. **Task Order Cost Development** - The negotiated not-to-exceed cost of each cost-plus-fixed-fee format Task Order will be computed as follows:

- * The average rates are the Average NHDOT Allowed Rates from the most-current version of the **Salary Rate Table** (see Article I Section C - Staffing).
2. **Task Order Cost Reimbursement** - In consideration of the terms and obligations of this AGREEMENT, the STATE, through the DEPARTMENT, hereby agrees to pay and the CONSULTANT agrees to accept as full compensation for all services rendered to the satisfaction of the DEPARTMENT for each Task Order an amount equal to the sum of the following costs (a)+(b)+(c)+(d)+(e):
 - a. Actual salaries* approved by the DEPARTMENT paid to technical and other employees by the CONSULTANT, including salaries to principals, for the time such employees are directly utilized on work necessary to fulfill the terms of this AGREEMENT.
- * In accordance with DEPARTMENT policy, the maximum direct-labor rate allowed for all positions under this AGREEMENT, including subconsultants, shall be \$60.00 per hour unless a waiver to the salary cap has been specifically approved for specialty services.

ARTICLE II

- b. Overhead costs applicable to the direct salary costs. The audited indirect cost rate of 233.27%, as submitted to and approved by the DEPARTMENT, will be applied to the direct salary costs. The CONSULTANT agrees that the indirect cost rate shall be extended at that rate for the duration of the Contract in accordance with 23 CFR 172.11 (b)(1)(vi). An overtime premium of one and one half times the direct labor rate for non-exempt employees working beyond the standard 40 hours per workweek may be allowed for special circumstances when approved by the DEPARTMENT in writing in advance. The overhead portion of non-exempt employees' salary rates shall not be adjusted. Engineers are not eligible for overtime premium rates.
- c. A fixed fee amount based on the estimated risk to be borne by the CONSULTANT [maximum 10.00% of Labor Costs (including overhead costs)] for profit and non-reimbursed costs.
- d. Reimbursement for direct expenses, including, but not limited to, subconsultants with a subcontract value of less than \$100,000, printing, reproductions and travel not included in normal overhead expenses. The reimbursable costs for mileage and for per diem (lodging and meals) shall be that allowed by the CONSULTANT'S established policy but shall not exceed that allowed in the Federal Acquisition Regulation (Subpart 31.205-46) and in the Federal Travel Regulation. Mileage and per diem costs shall be subject to approval by the DEPARTMENT. Subconsultants with a subcontract value of less than \$100,000 shall be invoiced as direct expenses and do not require individual invoices.
- e. Reimbursement for actual cost of subconsultants.

The amount payable under categories (a), (b), (d), and (e) may be reallocated within the not-to-exceed Task Order amount upon mutual agreement of the DEPARTMENT and CONSULTANT. The fixed fee (c) shall only change when there has been a significant increase or decrease in the scope of work. The estimated amounts for (a), (b), (d), and (e) and the actual amount for (c) are listed in the Fee Summary section of the Authorization to Proceed for each Task Order.

- 3. **Task Order Limitation of Costs** – The total amount to be paid for any Task Order shall not exceed the sum of the amounts shown in the Task Order Fee Summary limits contained in the Authorization to Proceed Letter. It is expected that the CONSULTANT agrees to use best efforts to perform the work specified in the Task Order Scope of Work and all obligations under this contract within such limiting amount.
- 4. **Task Order Payments** - Monthly payments on account may be made upon submission of invoices by the CONSULTANT to the DEPARTMENT. The CONSULTANT shall follow the

ARTICLE II

DEPARTMENT'S Standardized Invoicing format. The fixed fee shall be invoiced during the billing period based upon the overall percent complete calculated within the approved progress report found in the DEPARTMENT'S Standardized Invoicing.

D. LUMP-SUM FORMAT

Task Order Cost Reimbursement - The negotiated total amount of each lump-sum format Task Order will be considered full compensation for all services for the Task Order performed to the satisfaction of the DEPARTMENT. Said lump-sum amount includes all labor, overhead, profit (maximum 15.00% of total labor + total overhead; based on the estimated risk to be borne by the CONSULTANT), direct expenses, and subconsultant costs. The CONSULTANT shall follow the DEPARTMENT'S Standardized Invoicing format. The lump-sum amount may only be adjusted (increased or decreased) if there is a significant change in the scope or character of the work, as determined by the DEPARTMENT. Any change to the lump-sum amount shall be documented in writing by a DEPARTMENT Bureau-level amendment. For a substantial lump-sum Task Order, the DEPARTMENT'S Lump Sum Article II for standalone agreements will be furnished to the CONSULTANT for additional reference information.

E. SUBCONSULTANT SUPPORTING SERVICES

The subconsultant firms included in the CONSULTANT'S Technical Proposal are:

- Wood Environment and Infrastructure Solutions, Inc. - (Pavement management)
- Dye Management Group, Inc. - (Maintenance & fleet management, etc.)

Note: Subconsultants can be engaged at any time if needed for a Task Order, whether they were included in the CONSULTANT'S Technical Proposal or not. Subconsultant costs may be either negotiated as a not-to-exceed amount for each Task Order and reimbursed at actual cost or negotiated as a lump-sum amount. See Article IV.G – SUBLETTING for subconsultant Professional Liability Insurance information.

F. TASK ORDER AMENDMENTS

If revisions to a Task Order scope of work, and/or the fee summary or completion date included in the Task Order Authorization to Proceed is/are required, it shall be documented in writing by a DEPARTMENT Bureau-level amendment. The amendment will be filed with the Authorization to Proceed in the AGREEMENT.

ARTICLE II

G. RECORDS, REPORTS, AND FINAL AUDIT

The CONSULTANT shall maintain adequate cost records for all work performed under this AGREEMENT and all items charged on this project. All records and other evidence pertaining to cost incurred shall be made available at all reasonable times during the AGREEMENT period, and for three (3) years from the date final payment is made and all other pending matters are closed, for examination by the STATE, Federal Highway Administration, or other authorized representatives of the Federal Government, and copies thereof shall be furnished if requested. Applicable cost principles are contained in the Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) in Title 48 of the Code of Federal Regulations (Subpart 31.2 and Subpart 31.105).

For Cost-Plus-Fixed-Fee Task Orders only: All costs are to be determined by actual records kept during the term of the AGREEMENT, which are subject to Final Audit by the STATE and Federal Governments. The final payment, and all partial payments made, may be adjusted to conform to this Final Audit. In no case will any adjustments exceed the negotiated amount for any Task Order. All Subconsultant costs may also be subject to Final Audit by the STATE and Federal Governments.

ARTICLE III

ARTICLE III - GENERAL PROVISIONS

ARTICLE IV

ARTICLE IV - STANDARD PROVISIONS

A. STANDARD SPECIFICATIONS

The CONSULTANT agrees to follow the provisions of the Design Manuals, Standard Specifications for Road and Bridge Construction, and Standard Plans for Road and Bridge Construction of the DEPARTMENT; A Policy on Geometric Design of Highways and Streets and LRFD Bridge Design Specifications of the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO), and amendments thereto, and/or other professional codes or standards applicable to the services to be performed under this AGREEMENT. When a publication (including interim publications) is specified, it refers to the most recent date of issue in effect at the time of execution of this AGREEMENT.

B. REVIEW BY STATE AND FHWA - CONFERENCES - INSPECTIONS

It is mutually agreed that all portions of the work covered by this AGREEMENT shall be subject to the inspection of duly-authorized representatives of the STATE and Federal agency of the United States Department of Transportation, at such time or times as the STATE or Federal agency deems appropriate.

The location of the office where the work will be available for inspection by STATE and Federal agency representatives is 101 Station Landing, Suite 410, Medford, MA.

It is further mutually agreed that any party, including the duly-authorized representatives of the Federal agency, may request and obtain conferences, visits to the site, and inspection of the work at any reasonable time.

C. EXTENT OF CONTRACT

1. Contingent Nature of AGREEMENT

Notwithstanding anything in this AGREEMENT to the contrary, all obligations of the STATE, including, without limitation, the continuance of payments, are contingent upon the availability and continued appropriation of funds, and in no event shall the STATE be liable for any payments in excess of such available appropriated funds. In the event of a reduction or termination of those funds, the STATE shall have the right to terminate this AGREEMENT.

2. Termination

The DEPARTMENT shall have the right at any time, and for any cause, to terminate the work required of the CONSULTANT by this AGREEMENT, by written notice of such termination provided to the CONSULTANT by the DEPARTMENT, and, in the event of such a termination of this AGREEMENT, without fault on the part of the CONSULTANT, the CONSULTANT shall be entitled to compensation for all work theretofore satisfactorily performed, pursuant to this AGREEMENT, such compensation to be fixed, insofar as possible, based upon the work

ARTICLE IV

performed prior to termination. If no contract or contracts for construction of the project contemplated by this AGREEMENT is (are) entered into within two (2) years after satisfactory completion of the services outlined in Article I, all of the services contemplated by this AGREEMENT shall be deemed to have been completed. It shall be a breach of this AGREEMENT if the CONSULTANT shall fail to render timely the services required under this AGREEMENT, in accordance with sound professional principles and practices, to the reasonable satisfaction of the DEPARTMENT, or shall be in such financial condition as to be unable to pay its just debts as they accrue, or shall make an assignment for the benefit of creditors, or shall be involved in any proceeding, voluntary or involuntary, resulting in the appointment of a receiver or trustee over its affairs, or shall become dissolved for any cause. In the event of the happening of any one or more of the foregoing contingencies, or upon the substantial breach of any other provisions of this AGREEMENT by the CONSULTANT, its officers, agents, employee, and subconsultants, the DEPARTMENT shall have the absolute right and option to terminate this AGREEMENT forthwith, and, in addition, may have and maintain any legal or equitable remedy against the CONSULTANT for its loss and damages resulting from such breach or breaches of this AGREEMENT; provided, however, that as to all plans, drawings, tracings, estimates, specifications, reports, proposals, sketches, diagrams and calculations, together with all material and data theretofore furnished to the DEPARTMENT by the CONSULTANT, of a satisfactory nature in accordance with this AGREEMENT, which plans, drawings, tracings, etc., are of use to the DEPARTMENT, the CONSULTANT shall be entitled to a credit, based on the contract rate for the work so performed in a satisfactory manner and of use and benefit to the DEPARTMENT.

D. REVISIONS TO REPORTS, PLANS OR DOCUMENTS

The CONSULTANT shall perform such additional work as may be necessary to correct errors in the work required under the AGREEMENT, caused by errors and omissions by the CONSULTANT, without undue delays and without additional cost to the DEPARTMENT.

Furthermore, prior to final approval of plans, specifications, estimates, reports or documents by the DEPARTMENT, the CONSULTANT shall make such revisions of them as directed by the DEPARTMENT, without additional compensation therefor except as hereinafter provided:

1. If, after its written approval thereof, the DEPARTMENT shall require changes to the plans or documents that revise engineering or other factors specifically approved, thereby necessitating revisions of the contract plans or documents, or;
2. When applicable, if during the term of this AGREEMENT, a revision of the alignment is ordered to the extent that the revised alignment will lie completely or partially outside the limit

ARTICLE IV

of the survey data plotted by the CONSULTANT (this does not apply to those adjustments and refinements to the alignments anticipated under the scope of work), or,

3. If, after approval by the DEPARTMENT of the final contract plans or documents, the CONSULTANT shall be ordered in writing by the DEPARTMENT to make revisions, or to perform services other than those necessary in order to adapt said plans, reports or documents to conditions observed during field inspections and encountered during construction; the CONSULTANT shall be entitled to compensation therefor in accordance with Article II, Section B, such compensation to be in addition to the fee specified in Article II, Section A, for its original work on the plans, reports or documents.

E. ADDITIONAL SERVICES

If, during the term of this AGREEMENT, additional professional services are required due to a revision in the limits of the project, or it becomes necessary to perform services not anticipated during negotiation, the DEPARTMENT may, in writing, order the CONSULTANT to perform such services, and the CONSULTANT shall be paid a fee in accordance with the provisions of Article II, Section B.

If, during the term of this AGREEMENT, additional professional services are performed by the CONSULTANT due to the fact that data furnished by the DEPARTMENT are not usable or applicable, the STATE will, upon written approval of the DEPARTMENT, reimburse the CONSULTANT for such additional design services in accordance with the provisions of Article II, Section B.

If additional services are performed by the CONSULTANT through its own acts, which are not usable or applicable to this project, the cost of such additional services shall not be reimbursable.

F. OWNERSHIP OF PLANS

All data, plans, drawings, tracings, estimates, specifications, proposals, sketches, diagrams, calculations, reports or other documents collected, prepared, or undertaken either manually or electronically by the CONSULTANT, under the provisions of this AGREEMENT, immediately shall become the property of the DEPARTMENT, and, when completed, shall bear the CONSULTANT'S endorsement. The CONSULTANT shall surrender to the DEPARTMENT, upon demand at any time, or submit to its inspection, any data, plan, drawing, tracing, estimate, specification, proposal, sketch, diagram, calculation, report or document which shall have been collected, prepared, or undertaken by the CONSULTANT, pursuant to this AGREEMENT, or shall have been hitherto furnished to the CONSULTANT by the DEPARTMENT. The CONSULTANT shall have the right, with the written approval of the DEPARTMENT, to use any of the data prepared by it and hitherto delivered to the DEPARTMENT at any later stage of the project contemplated by this AGREEMENT.

ARTICLE IV

G. SUBLETTING

The CONSULTANT shall not sublet, assign or transfer any part of the CONSULTANT'S services or obligations under this AGREEMENT without the prior approval and written consent of the DEPARTMENT.

All subcontracts shall be in writing and those exceeding \$10,000 shall contain all provisions of this AGREEMENT, including "Certification of CONSULTANT/Subconsultant". For subconsultants working on design, hazardous materials, geotechnical services, etc., the minimum limits of their professional liability (errors and omissions) insurance coverage shall be not less than \$2,000,000 in the aggregate, with a deductible of not more than \$75,000. For subconsultant contracts with less risk, e.g., wetland evaluations, materials inspection and testing, structural steel fabrication inspection, underwater bridge inspection, research, bridge deck condition surveys, land surveying, mapping, noise studies, air-quality studies, etc., the minimum limits of their professional liability (errors and omissions) insurance coverage shall be not less than \$1,500,000 in the aggregate, with a deductible of not more than \$50,000. For subconsultant contracts with no risk, e.g., archaeology, cultural resources, data gathering, traffic counting etc., professional liability insurance shall not be required. Subconsultants completing field exploration for geotechnical, hazardous materials/environmental, and subsurface exploration shall also have pollution liability insurance coverage not less than \$2,000,000 in the aggregate, with a deductible of not more than \$75,000. If coverage is claims made, the period to report claims shall extend for not less than three years from the date of substantial completion of the construction contract. A copy of each subcontract shall be submitted for the DEPARTMENT'S files.

H. GENERAL COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS, ETC.

The CONSULTANT shall comply with all Federal, STATE and local laws, and ordinances applicable to any of the work involved in this AGREEMENT and shall conform to the requirements and standards of STATE, municipal, railroad and utility agencies whose facilities and services may be affected by the construction of this project. The services shall be performed so as to cause minimum interruption to said facilities and services.

I. BROKERAGE

The CONSULTANT warrants that it has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the CONSULTANT, to solicit or secure this Contract, and that it has not paid or agreed to pay any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the CONSULTANT, any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift or any other consideration, contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this Contract. For breach or violation of this warranty, the STATE shall have the right to annul this Contract without liability, or,

ARTICLE IV

at its discretion, to deduct from the contract price or consideration, or otherwise recover, the full amount of such fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift or contingent fee.

J. CONTRACTUAL RELATIONS

1. Independent Contractor

The CONSULTANT agrees that its relation to the STATE is as an independent contractor and not as an agent or employee of the STATE.

2. Claims and Indemnification

a. Non-Professional Liability Indemnification

The CONSULTANT agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the STATE and all of its officers, agents and employees from and against any and all claims, liabilities or suits arising from (or which may be claimed to arise from) any (i) acts or omissions of the CONSULTANT or its subconsultants in the performance of this AGREEMENT allegedly resulting in property damage or bodily injury and/or (ii) misconduct or wrongdoing of the CONSULTANT or its subconsultants in the performance of this AGREEMENT.

b. Professional Liability Indemnification

The CONSULTANT agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the STATE and all of its officers, agents and employees from and against any and all claims, liabilities or suits arising from (or which may be claimed to arise from) any negligent acts or omissions of the CONSULTANT or its subconsultants in the performance of professional services covered by this AGREEMENT.

c. These covenants shall survive the termination of the AGREEMENT. Notwithstanding the foregoing, nothing herein contained shall be deemed to constitute a waiver of the sovereign immunity of the STATE, which immunity is hereby reserved by the STATE.

3. Insurance

a. Required Coverage

The CONSULTANT shall, at its sole expense, obtain and maintain in force the following insurance:

1. Commercial or comprehensive general liability insurance including contractual coverage, for all claims of bodily injury, death or property damage, in policy amounts of not less than \$250,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 in the aggregate (STATE to be named as an additional insured); and
2. comprehensive automobile liability insurance covering all motor vehicles, including owned, hired, borrowed and non-owned vehicles, for all claims of bodily injury, death

ARTICLE IV

or property damage, in policy amounts of not less than \$500,000 combined single limit; and

3. professional liability (errors and omissions) insurance coverage of not less than \$10,000,000 in the aggregate. If coverage is claims made, the period to report claims shall extend for not less than three years from the date of substantial completion of the construction contract. No retention (deductible) shall be more than \$100,000; and
4. workers' compensation and employer's liability insurance as required by law.

b. Proof of Insurance

The policies described in paragraph (a) of this section and Section G shall be in the standard form employed in the STATE, issued by underwriters licensed or approved by the Department of Insurance of the STATE. Each policy shall contain a clause prohibiting cancellation or modifications of the policy earlier than 30 days, or 10 days in cases of non-payment of premium, after written notice thereof has been received by the STATE. The CONSULTANT shall provide to the STATE a certificate of insurance evidencing the required coverages, retention (deductible) and cancellation clause prior to submittal of the AGREEMENT to Governor and Council for approval and shall have a continuing duty to provide new certificates of insurance as the policies are amended or renewed.

4. No Third-Party Rights

It is not intended by any of the provisions of the AGREEMENT to make the public or any member thereof a third-party beneficiary of the AGREEMENT, or to authorize anyone not a party to this AGREEMENT to maintain a suit for personal injuries or property damage pursuant to the terms or provisions of this Contract. The duties, obligations and responsibilities of the parties to this AGREEMENT with respect to third parties shall remain as imposed by law. No portion of this AGREEMENT shall be understood to be a waiver of the STATE'S sovereign immunity.

5. Construction of AGREEMENT

This AGREEMENT is executed in a number of counterparts, each of which is an original and constitutes the entire AGREEMENT between the parties. This AGREEMENT shall be construed according to the laws of the STATE.

K. AGREEMENT MODIFICATION

The assignment of the CONSULTANT, generally established by the scope of work in this AGREEMENT, shall not be modified in any way without prior approval of the Governor and Council.

ARTICLE IV

L. EXTENSION OF COMPLETION DATE(S)

If, during the course of the work, the CONSULTANT anticipates that he cannot comply with one or more of the completion dates specified in this AGREEMENT, it shall be the CONSULTANT'S responsibility to notify the DEPARTMENT in writing at least ninety (90) days prior to the completion date(s) in question. The CONSULTANT shall state the reasons that a completion date(s) cannot be met and request a revised date(s) for consideration by the DEPARTMENT.

M. TITLE VI (NONDISCRIMINATION OF FEDERALLY-ASSISTED PROGRAMS) COMPLIANCE

During the performance of this AGREEMENT, the CONSULTANT, for itself, its assignees and successors in interest agrees as follows:

- (1) Compliance with Regulations: The CONSULTANT shall comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 regulations relative to nondiscrimination in federally-assisted programs of the DEPARTMENT, such regulations entitled Title 49 Code of Federal Regulations, Part 21, as they may be amended from time to time (hereinafter referred to as the REGULATIONS), and which are herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this AGREEMENT.
- (2) Nondiscrimination: The CONSULTANT, with regard to the work performed by it during the AGREEMENT, shall not discriminate on the grounds of race, color, religion, age, sex, handicap, sexual orientation, or national origin in the selection and retention of subconsultants, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment specific to this project. The CONSULTANT shall not participate either directly or indirectly in the discrimination prohibited by Section 21.5 of the REGULATIONS, including employment practices when the AGREEMENT covers a program set forth in Appendix B of the REGULATIONS.
- (3) Solicitations for Subcontracts, Including Procurements of Materials and Equipment: In all solicitations either by competitive bidding or negotiation made by the CONSULTANT for work to be performed under a subcontract, including procurements of materials or leases of equipment specific to the project, each potential subconsultant or supplier shall be notified by the CONSULTANT of the CONSULTANT'S obligations under this AGREEMENT and the REGULATIONS relative to nondiscrimination on the grounds of race, color, religion, age, sex, handicap, sexual orientation, or national origin.
- (4) Information and Reports: The CONSULTANT shall provide all information and reports required by the REGULATIONS or directives issued pursuant thereto, and shall permit access to its books, records, accounts, other sources of information and its facilities as may be determined by the DEPARTMENT or the Federal Highway Administration to be pertinent to ascertain compliance with such REGULATIONS, orders and instructions. Where any

information required of a CONSULTANT is in the exclusive possession of another who fails or refuses to furnish this information, the CONSULTANT shall so certify to the DEPARTMENT or the Federal Highway Administration, as appropriate, and shall set forth what efforts it has made to obtain the information.

- (5) Sanctions for Noncompliance: In the event of the CONSULTANT'S noncompliance with nondiscrimination provisions of this AGREEMENT, the DEPARTMENT shall impose sanctions as it or the Federal Highway Administration may determine to be appropriate, including, but not limited to:
 - (a) withholding of payments to the CONSULTANT under the AGREEMENT until the CONSULTANT complies; and/or
 - (b) cancellation, termination or suspension of the AGREEMENT, in whole or in part.
- (6) The CONSULTANT shall take such action with respect to any subcontract or procurement as the DEPARTMENT or the Federal Highway Administration may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions, including sanctions for noncompliance, provided, however, that in the event a CONSULTANT becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subconsultant or supplier as a result of such direction, the CONSULTANT may request the DEPARTMENT to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the STATE, and, in addition, the CONSULTANT may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.
- (7) 23 CFR 710.405(b) and Executive Order 11246 entitled "Equal Employment Opportunity," as amended by Executive Order 11375 and as supplemented in Department of Labor REGULATIONS (41 CFR Part 60), shall be applicable to this AGREEMENT and any subagreements hereunder.
- (8) Incorporation of Provisions: The CONSULTANT shall include the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (7) in every subcontract, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment specific to the project, unless exempt by the REGULATIONS, or directives issued pursuant thereto.

In accordance with EXECUTIVE ORDER 11246, the DEPARTMENT has the authority and responsibility to notify the Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs of the United States Department of Labor if they become aware of any possible violations of Executive Order 11246 and 41 CFR Part 60. The Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs is solely responsible for determining compliance with Executive Order 11246 and 41 CFR Part 60 and the CONSULTANT should contact them regarding related compliance issues.

ARTICLE IV

N. DISADVANTAGED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE POLICY AGREEMENT REQUIREMENTS

1. **Policy.** It is the policy of the United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) to ensure nondiscriminatory opportunity for Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBE's), as defined in 49 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 26, to participate in the performance of agreements and any subagreements financed in whole or in part with Federal funds. Consequently, the DBE requirements of 49 CFR Part 26 apply to this AGREEMENT.

The STATE and its Consultants shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, age, sex, handicap, sexual orientation, or national origin in the award and performance of agreements financed in whole or in part with Federal funds.
3. **Sanctions for Non-Compliance.** The CONSULTANT is hereby advised that failure of the CONSULTANT, or any Subconsultant performing work under this AGREEMENT, to carry out the requirements set forth in paragraphs 1 and 2 above shall constitute a breach of agreement and, after the notification of the United States Department of Transportation, may result in termination of this AGREEMENT by the STATE or such remedy as the STATE deems appropriate.

O. DOCUMENTATION

The CONSULTANT shall document the results of the work to the satisfaction of the DEPARTMENT and the Federal Highway Administration. This shall include preparation of progress reports, plans, specifications and estimates and similar evidences of attainment of objectives called for in this AGREEMENT.

P. CLEAN AIR AND WATER ACTS

If the amount of the AGREEMENT or subcontract thereunder exceeds \$100,000, the CONSULTANT or subconsultant shall comply with applicable standards, orders or requirements issued under Section 306 of the Federal Clean Air Act (43 U.S.C. 1857(h)), Section 508 of the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C. 1368), Executive Order 11738, and Environmental Protection Agency regulations (40 CFR Part 15), which prohibit the use under non-exempt Federal contracts, grants or loans of facilities included on the EPA List of Violating Facilities. The CONSULTANT or






