#### **EXPLANATION**

The scope being removed and rebid is for a part-time Family Support Coordinator who provides numerous assistive services as part of the State Youth Treatment-Planning (SYT-P) program for youth with substance use disorders, for recovery coach trainings, and for associated reporting. This scope of service was added to the contract in September 2016 because it was the same or a similar service already being provided by this Contractor in this contract. The Department participated in a Request for Proposals process to obtain a qualified new vendor for SFY 2018 for these services.

The remaining scope of service and funding in this contract for the SYT-P program is the original scope approved in SFY 2015 for the purposes of compliance with a federal grant. This grant ends on September 30, 2017, unless an extension is granted by the federal office of the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration. The remaining scope requests that the vendor be the convening body of the interagency council that is developing a statewide plan for enhancing the substance abuse treatment services system with youth and young adult approaches and practices.

This 3rd Amendment to the Family and Community Support Networks for Families with Serious Emotional Disturbance (SED) and Substance Use Disorder (SUD) contract (hereinafter referred to as "Amendment #3") dated this May 8, 2017, is by and between the State of New Hampshire, Department of Health and Human Services (hereinafter referred to as the "State" or "Department") and New Futures, Inc., (hereinafter referred to as "the Contractor"), a nonprofit company with a place of business at 10 Ferry Street, Suite 307, Concord, NH 03301.

WHEREAS, pursuant to an agreement (the "Contract") approved by the Governor and Executive Council on July 22, 2015 (Item #21), and amended by an agreement (Amendment #1 to the Contract) approved by the Governor and Executive Council on December 16, 2015 (Item #18), and amended by an agreement (Amendment #2 to the Contract) approved by Governor and Executive Council on September 21, 2016 (Item #LIA) the Contractor agreed to perform certain services based upon the terms and conditions specified in the Contract as amended and in consideration of certain sums specified; and

WHEREAS, the State and the Contractor have agreed to make changes to the scope of service, payment schedules, and price limitations; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Form P-37, General Provisions, Paragraph 18, the State may, at its sole discretion, amend the contract by written agreement of the parties and Governor and Executive Council approval; and

WHEREAS, the parties agree to reduce the Scope of Service;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and the mutual covenants and conditions contained in the Contract and set forth herein, the parties hereto agree to amend the agreement as follows:

Delete Exhibit A-2 – Amendment #2 and replace with Exhibit A-2 – Amendment #3.

#### Exhibit A-2, Amendment #3 Scope of Services State Youth Treatment Planning

#### 1. Provisions Applicable to All Services

- The Contractor agrees that, to the extent future legislative action by the New Hampshire General Court or federal or state court orders may have an impact on the Services described herein, the State Agency has the right to modify Service priorities and expenditure requirements under this Agreement so as to achieve compliance therewith.
- Notwithstanding any other provision of the Contract to the contrary, no services shall continue after June 30, 2017, and the Department shall not be liable for any payments for services provided after June 30, 2017, unless and until an appropriation for these services has been received from the state legislature and funds encumbered for the SFY 2018-2019 and SFY 2020-2021 biennia.

#### 2. Scope of Work

- The Contractor shall work in collaboration with the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) and the State Youth Treatment-Planning (SYT-P) program manager to create an in-depth plan that addresses substance use treatment for youth in New Hampshire (NH) including adolescents (ages 12-17) and transitional-aged youth (ages 18-25).
- 2.2. The Contractor shall work in collaboration with all other grant partners and contractors to ensure compliance with all deliverables and evaluation activities.
- 2.3. The Contractor shall convene and facilitate a subgroup of the Children's Behavioral Health Collaborative (CBHC) in order to:
  - Engage groups or organizations that are critical to the writing of a plan for 2.3.1. the youth in NH that are not currently engaged with the CBHC.
  - 2.3.2. Ensure connections and collaboration with the NH Governor's Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention, Treatment, and Recovery.
  - 2.3.3. Identify goals and strategies in the CBHC plan and other community-based assessment plans that address substance use issues for children and young adults.
  - 2.3.4. Identify gaps in the plans.
  - 2.3.5. Identify best practices in screening, assessment, treatment, and recovery services for the target population (identified in paragraph 1).
  - 2.3.6. Create a plan that outlines how NH will implement strategies on all levels, that addresses the need for treatment for the target population.
  - 2.3.7. Coordinate the expansion of family and youth stakeholder involvement.
  - 2.3.8. Create a cross-agency, statewide financial map and financial strategy recommendations. The Contractor shall ensure:
    - The financial map identifies the full range of integrated continuum of services and supports for youth ages twelve (12) to twenty-five (25) with substance use and/or co-occurring mental health disorders (SUD/COD), with federal and state expenditures for these services within a baseline fiscal year.

- 2.3.8.2. Mapping includes sources such as Medicaid/CHIP, NH Health Protection Program (Medicaid expansion), SAPT Block Grant, Private insurance, Corrections, Juvenile Justice, child welfare, education, labor, housing, and other relevant funding streams.
- 2.3.8.3. Mapping includes tables and narratives.
- 2.4. The Contractor shall create a complimentary social marketing and strategic communications plan for the work in Section 2.3. The Contractor shall:
  - 2.4.1. Ensure the plan is culturally and linguistically competent.
  - 2.4.2. Ensure families and youth are involved in the development of the communication plan.
  - 2.4.3. Ensure social marketing focuses on promoting the importance of providing evidence-based services to youth with SUD/COD.
- 2.5. The Contractor shall collaborate with other SYT-P partners and/or contractors to identify technology and other systems needs, for the collection of accurate data.
- 2.6. The Contractor shall develop and write the comprehensive plan and attachments.

#### 3. Reporting

- 3.1. The Contractor shall submit quarterly progress reports to the SYT-P Coordinator, that include but are not limited to:
  - 3.1.1. A progress report that includes, but is not limited to:
    - 3.1.1.1. Identification of subgroup participants.
    - 3.1.1.2. Identification of the goals that have been met.
    - 3.1.1.3. Identification of the best practices and the area (example: screening, assessment etc.).
    - 3.1.1.4. Progress on marketing strategies with estimated number of people that will be reached.
    - 3.1.1.5. Progress on communication plan.
    - 3.1.1.6. Identification of gaps and possible solutions.
    - 3.1.1.7. Identification of technology and other systems needed to collect data, and how it will be processed.
    - 3.1.1.8. Progress with estimated timeframes for the written comprehensive plan and attachments.

#### NOTE 1--SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Nature of Activities

New Futures, Inc. (the "Entity") is a non-profit entity that was organized on July 1, 2001. The mission statement is to advocate, educate and collaborate to prevent and reduce alcohol and other drug problems in New Hampshire. Current programs to support this mission include the advocacy program, the Children's Behavioral Health Collaborative, community engagement, the Advocacy Hub, and the policy program.

#### Accounting Policies

The accounting policies of the Entity conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as applicable to non-profit entities except as indicated hereafter. The following is a summary of significant accounting policies.

#### Basis of Presentation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the reporting pronouncements pertaining to Not-for-Profit Entities included within the FASB Accounting Standards Codification (FASB ASC 958-205). Under FASB ASC 958-205, the Entity is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets, based upon the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

#### Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Revenues from program services are recorded when earned. Other miscellaneous revenues are recorded upon receipt.

#### **Contributions**

The Entity accounts for contributions received in accordance with FASB ASC 958-605, Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made. Contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions.

#### Recognition of Donor Restrictions

Contributions are recognized when the donor makes a promise to give to the Entity that is, in substance, unconditional. Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets if the restriction expires in the reporting period in which the support is recognized. All other donor restricted support is reported as an increase in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets

depending on the nature of the restriction. When a restriction expires, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

#### Cash

For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash consists solely of demand deposits.

#### Investments

Investments, which consist principally of money market accounts, mutual funds, and exchange traded funds, are carried at their market value at December 31, 2016. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are reflected in the statement of activities.

#### Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost. Donated property and equipment is recorded at fair value determined as of the date of the donation. The Entity's policy is to capitalize equipment with an expected useful life greater than one year and valued at \$500 or more, and to charge to operations the expenditures which do not extend the lives of related assets in the period incurred. Subsequent to year end the capitalization policy was modified to include only values greater than \$1,000 and to exclude all computers and computer equipment. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method at rates intended to amortize the cost of related assets over their estimated useful lives as follows:

#### Compensated Absences

Employees of the Entity working full-time and part-time employees working at least 20 hours per week are entitled to paid time off. Vacation time accrues based on years of employment and begins accruing from the first day of employment. A maximum of 15 days, or 112.5 hours, may be carried over from the preceding year. Upon separation from employment, all accrued vacation time is paid to the employee. The Entity accrues accumulated vacation wages accordingly.

#### Donated Services, Materials and Facilities

The Entity receives significant volunteer time and efforts. The value of these volunteer efforts, while critical to the success of its mission, is not reflected in the financial statements since it does not meet the criteria necessary for recognition according to generally accepted accounting principles. Donated goods and professional services are recorded as both revenue and expense at estimated fair value.

#### Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing the various programs and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated on the statement of functional expenses among the programs and supporting services based on percentage allocations determined by the Entity's management.

#### **Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### Income Taxes

The Entity has received a determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service stating that it qualifies for tax-exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code for any exempt function income. In addition, the Entity is not subject to state income taxes. Accordingly, no provision has been made for Federal or State income taxes.

The FASB adopted Accounting Standards Codification Topic 740 entitled Accounting for Income Taxes which requires the Entity to report uncertain tax positions for financial reporting purposes. FASB ASC 740 prescribes rules regarding how the Entity should recognize, measure and disclose in its financial statements, tax positions that were taken or will be taken on the Entity's tax returns that are reflected in measuring current or deferred income tax assets and liabilities. Differences between tax positions taken in a tax return and amounts recognized in the financial statements will generally result in an increase in a liability for income tax payable or a reduction in a deferred tax asset or an increase in a deferred tax liability. The Entity does not have any material unrecognized tax benefits. As of December 31, 2016, the tax years December 31, 2015, 2014 and 2013 remain subject to possible examination by major tax jurisdictions.

#### Fair Value of Financial Instruments

Cash, accounts receivable, accounts payable and accrued expenses are carried in the financial statements at amounts which approximate fair value due to the inherently short-term nature of the transactions. The fair values determined for financial instruments are estimates, which for certain accounts may differ significantly from the amounts that could be realized upon immediate liquidation.

#### NOTE 2--CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

The Entity maintains bank deposits at local financial institutions located in New Hampshire. The Entity's demand deposits are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to a total of \$250,000 per bank. The balances in excess of federally insured limits for the Entity were \$561,347 at December 31, 2016.

#### **NOTE 3--INVESTMENTS**

#### Fair Value Measurements

The Entity reports under the Fair Value Measurements pronouncements of the FASB Accounting Standards Codification (FASB ASC 820) which establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs of valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurement) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below.

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted, quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities at the measurement date.

#### Level 2 – Inputs to the valuation include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities that are not active;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value.

Cash or cash equivalent money market mutual funds: Valued at acquisition cost.

Common stocks, unit investment equities, and fixed income securities: Valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Entity believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

#### Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Entity's investments as of December 31, 2016 are stated at fair value. Shares of the separate investment accounts are valued at quoted market prices, which represent the net value of shares held by the Entity at year-end.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date.

Investments consist of money market investments, mutual funds, and exchange traded funds which are carried at market value (adjusted monthly). Realized and unrealized gains and losses are reflected in the Statement of Activities. Assets held in the investment accounts were as follows at December 31, 2016:

#### NOTE 6--CONCENTRATION OF REVENUE RISK

The Entity's primary source of revenues is charitable donations from the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation and the various funds it holds. During the year ended December 31, 2016, the Entity recognized revenue of \$1,105,508 (53.2%) from these donors. Revenue is recognized as earned under the terms of the awards. Other support originates from miscellaneous grants and donations, interest, and other income.

#### NOTE 7--LEASE COMMITMENTS

The Entity has entered into a lease for several units of office space located in Concord, NH with monthly lease payments of \$9,648. Lease terms expire in 2019, with base rent expected to increase each year. Lease expense for the year ended December 31, 2016 was \$94,846.

The Entity also has a copier lease. This lease is for a period of 5 years with monthly payments of \$631. Lease expense for copiers the year ended December 31, 2016 was \$5,568.

#### **NOTE 8--SHARED SERVICES**

The Entity has signed agreements with the New Hampshire Council on Problem Gambling, Granite Pathways, the New Hampshire Alcohol and Other Drug Service Providers Association, Partnership for a Drug Free NH and NH Juvenile Court Diversion Network. These New Hampshire non-profit entities share a similar mission, and an agreement has been entered into for shared services in the Concord location. The Entity has recognized revenue for a portion of the rent and utilities as part of the agreement. The revenue is recognized as other income and amounted to \$33,340 for the year ended December 31, 2016.

#### **NOTE 9-BENEFICIAL INTEREST IN TRUST**

The Entity is a beneficiary of a designated fund at The New Hampshire Charitable Foundation. Pursuant to the terms of the resolution establishing this fund, property contributed to The New Hampshire Charitable Foundation is held as a separate fund designated for the benefit of New Futures, Inc. In accordance with its spending policy the Foundation makes distributions from the fund to New Futures, Inc. The distributions are approximately 4.2% of the market value of the fund per year. The fund is not included in these financial statements, since all property in the fund was contributed to The New Hampshire Charitable Foundation to be held and administered for the benefit of New Futures, Inc.

\$448,762 was received from the fund for the year ended December 31, 2016. The market value of the fund assets was approximately \$11,072,943 on December 31, 2016.

#### **NOTE 10--PENSION PLAN**

The Entity has a deferred compensation pension plan under Section 403(b) of the Internal Revenue Code. Under the terms of the plan, employee contributions are made through a salary reduction plan. During the year ended December 31, 2016, the Entity's contribution to the plan was equal to 5.0% of each eligible employee's annual salary. The Entity contributed \$23,022 for the year ended December 31, 2016.

#### **NOTE 11--SUBSEQUENT EVENTS**

Subsequent events have been evaluated through March 8, 2017 which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

#### NOTE 12--RESTATEMENT OF NET ASSETS

#### **EXPLANATION**

This request is **sole source** because the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration mandated that states applying for the System of Care Implementation Grant identify specific participating organizations at the time of the grant application. Each year's grant award is then predicated on the vendor's continued partnership and participation. The partnership we have established with this vendor is critical to continue this work as well as ensuring the work can continue and be effective beyond the grant period. The grant was awarded based on New Futures, Inc. being an organization and key partner that has previously worked in concert with the State's Community Based Care System and their ability to develop family support and leadership activities for families experiencing issues with co-occurrences of substance use and mental health disorders.

The purpose of this amendment is two-fold. First the amendment renews the contract with New Futures, Inc. who is collaborating with the Department of Health and Human Services, the State Youth Treatment- Planning (SYT-P) program manager, and all other grant partners to provide a strategic communications plan for increasing access to integrated evidence-based assessment and treatment for adolescents (ages 12-17) and transitional aged youth (ages 18-25) with substance use and/or co-occurring substance use and mental health disorders (SUD/COD) throughout New Hampshire. As part of the Family and Community Support Networks for Families of Children with Serious Emotional Disturbances and

Substance Use Disorders contract, New Futures, Inc. provides social media outreach related to children with serious emotional disturbances and/or substance use disorders in order to enhance access to treatment for the children and their families.

Second, with the approval of Senate Bill 533 by the NH Legislature, additional funding is being provided to continue support for a part time Family Support Coordinator who will work to expand existing family and community support groups for families of individuals struggling with substance use disorders (SUD). There are currently 18 groups offered through this network: 12 Families Advocating Substance Treatment, Education and Recovery (FASTER) Parent Support Groups and six independent groups. These family support groups provide critical support and education to families of individuals with substance use disorders, which allows them to grow and strengthen so that they can more effectively respond to their loved one with a substance use disorder and better address other responsibilities in their life, such as: a partner, other children, their job, extended family, social connections and involvement in their community.

Should the Governor and Executive Council not authorize this request, the momentum to transform our children's mental health service delivery system may be impaired and the family support groups would not have the funding and support to continue their work. The progress and collaborative work to date of the public systems, family organizations and community providers may likely dissipate and the opportunity to improve outcomes for New Hampshire's children and youth, and their families may be lost.

The Contractor agrees that, to the extent future legislative action by the New Hampshire General Court or federal or state court orders may have an impact on the Services described herein, the State Agency has the right to modify Service priorities and expenditure requirements under this Agreement so as to achieve compliance therewith.

  - 2.3.1. Engage groups or organizations that are critical to the writing of a plan for the youth in NH that are not currently engaged with the CBHC.
  - 2.3.2. Ensure connections and collaboration with the NH Governor's Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention, Treatment, and Recovery.
  - 2.3.3. Identify goals and strategies in the CBHC plan and other community-based assessment plans that address substance use issues for children and young adults.
  - 2.3.4. Identify gaps in the plans.
  - 2.3.5. Identify best practices in screening, assessment, treatment, and recovery services for the target population (identified in paragraph 1).
  - 2.3.6. Create a plan that outlines how NH will implement strategies on all levels, that addresses the need for treatment for the target population.
  - 2.3.7. Coordinate the expansion of family and youth stakeholder involvement.
  - 2.3.8. Create a cross-agency, statewide financial map and financial strategy recommendations. The Contractor shall ensure:
    - 2.3.8.1. The financial map identifies the full range of integrated continuum of services and supports for youth ages twelve (12) to twenty-five (25) with substance use and/or co-occurring mental health disorders (SUD/COD), with federal and state expenditures for these services within a baseline fiscal year.
    - 2.3.8.2. Mapping includes sources such as Medicaid/CHIP, NH Health Protection Program (Medicaid expansion), SAPT Block Grant, Private insurance, Corrections, Juvenile Justice, child welfare, education, labor, housing, and other relevant funding streams.
    - 2.3.8.3. Mapping includes tables and narratives.

- 2.4. The Contractor shall create a complimentary social marketing and strategic communications plan for the work in Section 2.3. The Contractor shall:

  - 2.4.3. Ensure social marketing focuses on promoting the importance of providing evidence-based services to youth with SUD/COD.

- 2.6. The Contractor shall develop and write the comprehensive plan and attachments.

The vendor will promote family leadership by building an infrastructure that consists of professional and volunteer development in order to enhance access to treatment for children with Serious Emotional Disturbances and Substance Use Disorders and their families. Additionally, the vendor will develop education and social marketing materials related to children with Serious Emotional Disturbances and Substance Use Disorders as well as improve communication among stakeholders.

This agreement includes language that reserves the Division's right to renew the contract for up to four additional years subject to the continued availability of funds, satisfactory performance of services and approval by the Governor and Executive Council

Should the Governor and Executive Council not authorize this request; the momentum to transform our children's mental health service delivery system will be significantly impaired. The progress and collaborative work to date of the public systems, family organizations and community providers will likely dissipate and the opportunity to improve outcomes for New Hampshire's children and youth, and their families will be lost.

2. EMPLOYMENT OF CONTRACTOR/SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED. The State of New Hampshire, acting through the agency identified in block 1.1 ("State"), engages contractor identified in block 1.3 ("Contractor") to perform, and the Contractor shall perform, the work or sale of goods, or both, identified and more particularly described in the attached EXHIBIT A which is incorporated herein by reference ("Services").

#### 3. EFFECTIVE DATE/COMPLETION OF SERVICES.

3.1 Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, and subject to the approval of the Governor and Executive Council of the State of New Hampshire, this Agreement, and all obligations of the parties hereunder, shall not become effective until the date the Governor and Executive Council approve this Agreement ("Effective Date").

3.2 If the Contractor commences the Services prior to the Effective Date, all Services performed by the Contractor prior to the Effective Date shall be performed at the sole risk of the Contractor, and in the event that this Agreement does not become effective, the State shall have no liability to the Contractor, including without limitation, any obligation to pay the Contractor for any costs incurred or Services performed. Contractor must complete all Services by the Completion Date specified in block 1.7.

#### 4. CONDITIONAL NATURE OF AGREEMENT.

Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, all obligations of the State hereunder, including, without limitation, the continuance of payments hereunder, are contingent upon the availability and continued appropriation of funds, and in no event shall the State be liable for any payments hereunder in excess of such available appropriated funds. In the event of a reduction or termination of appropriated funds, the State shall have the right to withhold payment until such funds become available, if ever, and shall have the right to terminate this Agreement immediately upon giving the Contractor notice of such termination. The State shall not be required to transfer funds from any other account to the Account identified in block 1.6 in the event funds in that Account are reduced or unavailable.

### 5. CONTRACT PRICE/PRICE LIMITATION/PAYMENT.

5.1 The contract price, method of payment, and terms of payment are identified and more particularly described in EXHIBIT B which is incorporated herein by reference.

- 5.2 The payment by the State of the contract price shall be the only and the complete reimbursement to the Contractor for all expenses, of whatever nature incurred by the Contractor in the performance hereof, and shall be the only and the complete compensation to the Contractor for the Services. The State shall have no liability to the Contractor other than the contract price.
- 5.3 The State reserves the right to offset from any amounts otherwise payable to the Contractor under this Agreement those liquidated amounts required or permitted by N.H. RSA 80:7 through RSA 80:7-c or any other provision of law.

5.4 Notwithstanding any provision in this Agreement to the contrary, and notwithstanding unexpected circumstances, in no event shall the total of all payments authorized, or actually made hereunder, exceed the Price Limitation set forth in block 1.8.

### 6. COMPLIANCE BY CONTRACTOR WITH LAWS AND REGULATIONS/ EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY.

- 6.1 In connection with the performance of the Services, the Contractor shall comply with all statutes, laws, regulations, and orders of federal, state, county or municipal authorities which impose any obligation or duty upon the Contractor, including, but not limited to, civil rights and equal opportunity laws. In addition, the Contractor shall comply with all applicable copyright laws.
- 6.2 During the term of this Agreement, the Contractor shall not discriminate against employees or applicants for employment because of race, color, religion, creed, age, sex, handicap, sexual orientation, or national origin and will take affirmative action to prevent such discrimination. 6.3 If this Agreement is funded in any part by monies of the United States, the Contractor shall comply with all the provisions of Executive Order No. 11246 ("Equal Employment Opportunity"), as supplemented by the regulations of the United States Department of Labor (41 C.F.R. Part 60), and with any rules, regulations and guidelines as the State of New Hampshire or the United States issue to implement these regulations. The Contractor further agrees to permit the State or United States access to any of the Contractor's books, records and accounts for the purpose of ascertaining compliance with all rules, regulations and orders, and the covenants, terms and conditions of this Agreement.

#### 7. PERSONNEL.

- 7.1 The Contractor shall at its own expense provide all personnel necessary to perform the Services. The Contractor warrants that all personnel engaged in the Services shall be qualified to perform the Services, and shall be properly licensed and otherwise authorized to do so under all applicable laws.
- 7.2 Unless otherwise authorized in writing, during the term of this Agreement, and for a period of six (6) months after the Completion Date in block 1.7, the Contractor shall not hire, and shall not permit any subcontractor or other person, firm or corporation with whom it is engaged in a combined effort to perform the Services to hire, any person who is a State employee or official, who is materially involved in the procurement, administration or performance of this Agreement. This provision shall survive termination of this Agreement.
- 7.3 The Contracting Officer specified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, shall be the State's representative. In the event of any dispute concerning the interpretation of this Agreement, the Contracting Officer's decision shall be final for the State.

- 8.1 Any one or more of the following acts or omissions of the Contractor shall constitute an event of default hereunder ("Event of Default"):
- 8.1.1 failure to perform the Services satisfactorily or on schedule;
- 8.1.2 failure to submit any report required hereunder; and/or 8.1.3 failure to perform any other covenant, term or condition of this Agreement.
- 8.2 Upon the occurrence of any Event of Default, the State may take any one, or more, or all, of the following actions: 8.2.1 give the Contractor a written notice specifying the Event of Default and requiring it to be remedied within, in the absence of a greater or lesser specification of time, thirty (30) days from the date of the notice; and if the Event of Default is not timely remedied, terminate this Agreement, effective two (2) days after giving the Contractor notice of termination; 8.2.2 give the Contractor a written notice specifying the Event of Default and suspending all payments to be made under this Agreement and ordering that the portion of the contract price which would otherwise accrue to the Contractor during the period from the date of such notice until such time as the State determines that the Contractor has cured the Event of Default
- 8.2.3 set off against any other obligations the State may owe to the Contractor any damages the State suffers by reason of any Event of Default; and/or
- 8.2.4 treat the Agreement as breached and pursue any of its remedies at law or in equity, or both.

#### 9. DATA/ACCESS/CONFIDENTIALITY/ PRESERVATION.

shall never be paid to the Contractor;

- 9.1 As used in this Agreement, the word "data" shall mean all information and things developed or obtained during the performance of, or acquired or developed by reason of, this Agreement, including, but not limited to, all studies, reports, files, formulae, surveys, maps, charts, sound recordings, video recordings, pictorial reproductions, drawings, analyses, graphic representations, computer programs, computer printouts, notes, letters, memoranda, papers, and documents, all whether finished or unfinished.
- 9.2 All data and any property which has been received from the State or purchased with funds provided for that purpose under this Agreement, shall be the property of the State, and shall be returned to the State upon demand or upon termination of this Agreement for any reason. 9.3 Confidentiality of data shall be governed by N.H. RSA chapter 91-A or other existing law. Disclosure of data requires prior written approval of the State.
- 10. TERMINATION. In the event of an early termination of this Agreement for any reason other than the completion of the Services, the Contractor shall deliver to the Contracting Officer, not later than fifteen (15) days after the date of termination, a report ("Termination Report") describing in detail all Services performed, and the contract price earned, to and including the date of termination. The form, subject matter, content, and number of copies of the Termination

Report shall be identical to those of any Final Report described in the attached EXHIBIT A.

#### 11. CONTRACTOR'S RELATION TO THE STATE. In the performance of this Agreement the Contractor is in all respects an independent contractor, and is neither an agent nor an employee of the State. Neither the Contractor nor any of its officers, employees, agents or members shall have authority to bind the State or receive any benefits, workers' compensation or other emoluments provided by the State to its employees.

#### 12. ASSIGNMENT/DELEGATION/SUBCONTRACTS. The Contractor shall not assign, or otherwise transfer any interest in this Agreement without the prior written consent of the N.H. Department of Administrative Services. None of the Services shall be subcontracted by the Contractor without the prior written consent of the State.

13. INDEMNIFICATION. The Contractor shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the State, its officers and employees, from and against any and all losses suffered by the State, its officers and employees, and any and all claims, liabilities or penalties asserted against the State, its officers and employees, by or on behalf of any person, on account of, based or resulting from, arising out of (or which may be claimed to arise out of) the acts or omissions of the Contractor. Notwithstanding the foregoing, nothing herein contained shall be deemed to constitute a waiver of the sovereign immunity of the State, which immunity is hereby reserved to the State. This covenant in paragraph 13 shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

#### 14. INSURANCE.

- 14.1 The Contractor shall, at its sole expense, obtain and maintain in force, and shall require any subcontractor or assignee to obtain and maintain in force, the following insurance:
- 14.1.1 comprehensive general liability insurance against all claims of bodily injury, death or property damage, in amounts of not less than \$250,000 per claim and \$2,000,000 per occurrence; and
- 14.1.2 fire and extended coverage insurance covering all property subject to subparagraph 9.2 herein, in an amount not less than 80% of the whole replacement value of the property. 14.2 The policies described in subparagraph 14.1 herein shall be on policy forms and endorsements approved for use in the State of New Hampshire by the N.H. Department of Insurance, and issued by insurers licensed in the State of New Hamoshire.
- 14.3 The Contractor shall furnish to the Contracting Officer identified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, a certificate(s) of insurance for all insurance required under this Agreement. Contractor shall also furnish to the Contracting Officer identified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, certificate(s) of insurance for all renewal(s) of insurance required under this Agreement no later than fifteen (15) days prior to the expiration date of each of the insurance policies. The certificate(s) of insurance and any renewals thereof shall be attached and are incorporated herein by reference. Each

certificate(s) of insurance shall contain a clause requiring the insurer to endeavor to provide the Contracting Officer identified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, no less than ten (10) days prior written notice of cancellation or modification of the policy.

#### 15. WORKERS' COMPENSATION.

- 15.1 By signing this agreement, the Contractor agrees, certifies and warrants that the Contractor is in compliance with or exempt from, the requirements of N.H. RSA chapter 281-A ("Workers' Compensation").
- 15.2 To the extent the Contractor is subject to the requirements of N.H. RSA chapter 281-A, Contractor shall maintain, and require any subcontractor or assignee to secure and maintain, payment of Workers' Compensation in connection with activities which the person proposes to undertake pursuant to this Agreement. Contractor shall furnish the Contracting Officer identified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, proof of Workers' Compensation in the manner described in N.H. RSA chapter 281-A and any applicable renewal(s) thereof, which shall be attached and are incorporated herein by reference. The State shall not be responsible for payment of any Workers' Compensation premiums or for any other claim or benefit for Contractor, or any subcontractor or employee of Contractor, which might arise under applicable State of New Hampshire Workers' Compensation laws in connection with the performance of the Services under this Agreement.
- 16. WAIVER OF BREACH. No failure by the State to enforce any provisions hereof after any Event of Default shall be deemed a waiver of its rights with regard to that Event of Default, or any subsequent Event of Default. No express failure to enforce any Event of Default shall be deemed a waiver of the right of the State to enforce each and all of the provisions hereof upon any further or other Event of Default on the part of the Contractor.
- 17. NOTICE. Any notice by a party hereto to the other party shall be deemed to have been duly delivered or given at the time of mailing by certified mail, postage prepaid, in a United States Post Office addressed to the parties at the addresses given in blocks 1.2 and 1.4, herein.
- 18. AMENDMENT. This Agreement may be amended, waived or discharged only by an instrument in writing signed by the parties hereto and only after approval of such amendment, waiver or discharge by the Governor and Executive Council of the State of New Hampshire.
- 19. CONSTRUCTION OF AGREEMENT AND TERMS. This Agreement shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire, and is binding upon and inures to the benefit of the parties and their respective successors and assigns. The wording used in this Agreement is the wording chosen by the parties to express their mutual intent, and no rule of construction shall be applied against or in favor of any party.

- 20. THIRD PARTIES. The parties hereto do not intend to benefit any third parties and this Agreement shall not be construed to confer any such benefit.
- 21. HEADINGS. The headings throughout the Agreement are for reference purposes only, and the words contained therein shall in no way be held to explain, modify, amplify or aid in the interpretation, construction or meaning of the provisions of this Agreement.
- 22. SPECIAL PROVISIONS. Additional provisions set forth in the attached EXHIBIT C are incorporated herein by reference.
- 23. SEVERABILITY. In the event any of the provisions of this Agreement are held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be contrary to any state or federal law, the remaining provisions of this Agreement will remain in full force and effect
- 24. ENTIRE AGREEMENT. This Agreement, which may be executed in a number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, constitutes the entire Agreement and understanding between the parties, and supersedes all prior Agreements and understandings relating hereto.

#### **Scope of Services**

#### 1. PROVISIONS APPLICABLE TO ALL SERVICES

The Contractor agrees that, to the extent future legislative action by the New Hampshire General Court or federal or state court orders may have an impact on the Services described herein, the State Agency has the right to modify Service priorities and expenditure requirements under this Agreement so as to achieve compliance therewith.
- 1.2. The Contractor shall pursue any and all appropriate public sources of funds that are applicable to the funding of the Services, operations prevention, acquisition, or rehabilitation. Appropriate records shall be maintained by the Contractor to document actual funds received or denials of funding from such public sources of funds.
- 1.3. The Contractor shall submit a detailed description of the language assistance service they will provide to persons with limited English proficiency to ensure meaningful access to their programs and/or services within ten (10) days of the contract effective date.

#### 2. SCOPE OF SERVICES

- 2.1. The Contractor shall expand existing family and community support networks for families of children with a Serious Emotional Disturbance (SED) and Substance Use Disorder (SUD).
- 2.2. The Contractor shall provide one (1) part-time Family Support Coordinators, who will perform, but not be limited to, the following services/duties/responsibilities:
  - Serving on work groups, advisory councils and committees associated with the System of Care Grant (FAST Forward) as necessary;
  - Supervising the family support group facilitators for the two new groups below;
     and
  - 2.2.3. Reporting on the above activities to the Executive Director, of New Futures or his/her designee.
- 2.3. The Contractor shall promote family leadership by recruiting, training and supporting four (4) family leadership candidates (Family Facilitators).
  - 2.3.1. The Contractor shall enroll the Family Facilitators in the National Alliance for the Mentally III (NAMI) Family Leadership Training Program.
  - 2.3.2. The Contractor shall ensure that family facilitators will be prepared to provide peer to peer support to families being served by the System of Care project by ensuring that the family facilitators are trained in System of care modules and in FAST Forward program.
- The Contractor shall develop and support two (2) new regional support groups for families of children with SED and/or SUD.







Notwithstanding anything to the contrary herein, the Contractor agrees that funding under this Contract may be withheld, in whole or in part, in the event of noncompliance with any State or Federal law, rule or regulation applicable to the services provided, or if the said services have not been completed in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- 6. When the contract price limitation is reached, the program shall continue to operate at full capacity at no charge to the State of New Hampshire for the duration of the contract period.
- 7. Notwithstanding paragraph 18 of Form P-37, General Provisions, an amendment limited to transfer the funds within the budget and within the price limitation, can be made by written agreement of both parties and may be made without obtaining approval of the Governor and Executive Council.

### **SPECIAL PROVISIONS**

- 1. Compliance with Federal and State Laws: If the Contractor is permitted to determine the eligibility of individuals such eligibility determination shall be made in accordance with applicable federal and state laws, regulations, orders, guidelines, policies and procedures.
- 2. Time and Manner of Determination: Eligibility determinations shall be made on forms provided by the Department for that purpose and shall be made and remade at such times as are prescribed by the Department.
- 3. Documentation: In addition to the determination forms required by the Department, the Contractor shall maintain a data file on each recipient of services hereunder, which file shall include all information necessary to support an eligibility determination and such other information as the Department requests. The Contractor shall furnish the Department with all forms and documentation regarding eligibility determinations that the Department may request or require.
- 4. Fair Hearings: The Contractor understands that all applicants for services hereunder, as well as individuals declared ineligible have a right to a fair hearing regarding that determination. The Contractor hereby covenants and agrees that all applicants for services shall be permitted to fill out an application form and that each applicant or re-applicant shall be informed of his/her right to a fair hearing in accordance with Department regulations.
- 5. Gratuities or Kickbacks: The Contractor agrees that it is a breach of this Contract to accept or make a payment, gratuity or offer of employment on behalf of the Contractor, any Sub-Contractor or the State in order to influence the performance of the Scope of Work detailed in Exhibit A of this Contract. The State may terminate this Contract and any sub-contract or sub-agreement if it is determined that payments, gratuities or offers of employment of any kind were offered or received by any officials, officers, employees or agents of the Contractor or Sub-Contractor.
- 6. Retroactive Payments: Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the Contract or in any other document, contract or understanding, it is expressly understood and agreed by the parties hereto, that no payments will be made hereunder to reimburse the Contractor for costs incurred for any purpose or for any services provided to any individual prior to the Effective Date of the Contract and no payments shall be made for expenses incurred by the Contractor for any services provided prior to the date on which the individual applies for services or (except as otherwise provided by the federal regulations) prior to a determination that the individual is eligible for such services.
- 7. Conditions of Purchase: Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the Contract, nothing herein contained shall be deemed to obligate or require the Department to purchase services hereunder at a rate which reimburses the Contractor in excess of the Contractors costs, at a rate which exceeds the amounts reasonable and necessary to assure the quality of such service, or at a rate which exceeds the rate charged by the Contractor to ineligible individuals or other third party funders for such service. If at any time during the term of this Contract or after receipt of the Final Expenditure Report hereunder, the Department shall determine that the Contractor has used payments hereunder to reimburse items of expense other than such costs, or has received payment in excess of such costs or in excess of such rates charged by the Contractor to ineligible individuals or other third party funders, the Department may elect to:

  - 7.1. Renegotiate the rates for payment hereunder, in which event new rates shall be established;7.2. Deduct from any future payment to the Contractor the amount of any prior reimbursement in excess of costs;



Fiscal Records: books, records, documents and other data evidencing and reflecting all costs and other expenses incurred by the Contractor in the performance of the Contract, and all income received or collected by the Contractor during the Contract Period, said records to be maintained in accordance with accounting procedures and practices which sufficiently and properly reflect all such costs and expenses, and which are acceptable to the Department, and to include, without limitation, all ledgers, books, records, and original evidence of costs such as purchase requisitions and orders, vouchers, requisitions for materials, inventories, valuations of in-kind contributions, labor time cards, payrolls, and other records requested or required by the Department.
  - 8.2. Statistical Records: Statistical, enrollment, attendance or visit records for each recipient of services during the Contract Period, which records shall include all records of application and eligibility (including all forms required to determine eligibility for each such recipient), records regarding the provision of services and all invoices submitted to the Department to obtain payment for such services.
  - Medical Records: Where appropriate and as prescribed by the Department regulations, the Contractor shall retain medical records on each patient/recipient of services.
- 9. Audit: Contractor shall submit an annual audit to the Department within 60 days after the close of the agency fiscal year. It is recommended that the report be prepared in accordance with the provision of Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, "Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non Profit Organizations" and the provisions of Standards for Audit of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions, issued by the US General Accounting Office (GAO standards) as they pertain to financial compliance audits.
  - 9.1. Audit and Review: During the term of this Contract and the period for retention hereunder, the Department, the United States Department of Health and Human Services, and any of their designated representatives shall have access to all reports and records maintained pursuant to the Contract for purposes of audit, examination, excerpts and transcripts.
  - 9.2. Audit Liabilities: In addition to and not in any way in limitation of obligations of the Contract, it is understood and agreed by the Contractor that the Contractor shall be held liable for any state or federal audit exceptions and shall return to the Department, all payments made under the Contract to which exception has been taken or which have been disallowed because of such an exception.
- 10. Confidentiality of Records: All information, reports, and records maintained hereunder or collected in connection with the performance of the services and the Contract shall be confidential and shall not be disclosed by the Contractor, provided however, that pursuant to state laws and the regulations of the Department regarding the use and disclosure of such information, disclosure may be made to public officials requiring such information in connection with their official duties and for purposes directly connected to the administration of the services and the Contract; and provided further, that the use or disclosure by any party of any information concerning a recipient for any purpose not directly connected with the administration of the Department or the Contractor's responsibilities with respect to purchased services hereunder is prohibited except on written consent of the recipient, his attorney or guardian.

- 11. Reports: Fiscal and Statistical: The Contractor agrees to submit the following reports at the following times if requested by the Department.
  - Interim Financial Reports: Written interim financial reports containing a detailed description of all costs and non-allowable expenses incurred by the Contractor to the date of the report and containing such other information as shall be deemed satisfactory by the Department to justify the rate of payment hereunder. Such Financial Reports shall be submitted on the form designated by the Department or deemed satisfactory by the Department.
  - Final Report: A final report shall be submitted within thirty (30) days after the end of the term of this Contract. The Final Report shall be in a form satisfactory to the Department and shall contain a summary statement of progress toward goals and objectives stated in the Proposal and other information required by the Department.
- 12. Completion of Services: Disallowance of Costs: Upon the purchase by the Department of the maximum number of units provided for in the Contract and upon payment of the price limitation hereunder, the Contract and all the obligations of the parties hereunder (except such obligations as, by the terms of the Contract are to be performed after the end of the term of this Contract and/or survive the termination of the Contract) shall terminate, provided however, that if, upon review of the Final Expenditure Report the Department shall disallow any expenses claimed by the Contractor as costs hereunder the Department shall retain the right, at its discretion, to deduct the amount of such expenses as are disallowed or to recover such sums from the Contractor.
- 13. Credits: All documents, notices, press releases, research reports and other materials prepared during or resulting from the performance of the services of the Contract shall include the following statement:

Contractor shall not reproduce any materials produced under the contract without prior written approval from DHHS.
- 15. Operation of Facilities: Compliance with Laws and Regulations; In the operation of any facilities for providing services, the Contractor shall comply with all laws, orders and regulations of federal, state, county and municipal authorities and with any direction of any Public Officer or officers pursuant to laws which shall impose an order or duty upon the contractor with respect to the operation of the facility or the provision of the services at such facility. This is accomplished through a written agreement that specifies activities and reporting responsibilities of the subcontractor and provides for revoking the delegation or imposing sanctions if the subcontractor's performance is not adequate. Subcontractors are subject to the same contractual conditions as the Contractor and the Contractor is responsible to ensure subcontractor compliance with those conditions.

When the Contractor delegates a function to a subcontractor, the Contractor shall do the following:

- 19.1. Evaluate the prospective subcontractor's ability to perform the activities, before delegating the function
- 19.2. Have a written agreement with the subcontractor that specifies activities and reporting responsibilities and how sanctions/revocation will be managed if the subcontractor's performance is not adequate
- 19.3. Monitor the subcontractor's performance on an ongoing basis

- 19.4. Provide to DHHS an annual schedule identifying all subcontractors, delegated functions and responsibilities, and when the subcontractor's performance will be reviewed

If the Contractor identifies deficiencies or areas for improvement are identified, the Contractor shall take corrective action.

### **DEFINITIONS**

As used in the Contract, the following terms shall have the following meanings:

COSTS: Shall mean those direct and indirect items of expense determined by the Department to be allowable and reimbursable in accordance with cost and accounting principles established in accordance with state and federal laws, regulations, rules and orders.

DEPARTMENT: NH Department of Health and Human Services.

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT GUIDELINES: Shall mean that section of the Contractor Manual which is entitled "Financial Management Guidelines" and which contains the regulations governing the financial activities of contractor agencies which have contracted with the State of NH to receive funds.

PROPOSAL: If applicable, shall mean the document submitted by the Contractor on a form or forms required by the Department and containing a description of the Services to be provided to eligible individuals by the Contractor in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Contract and setting forth the total cost and sources of revenue for each service to be provided under the Contract.

UNIT: For each service that the Contractor is to provide to eligible individuals hereunder, shall mean that period of time or that specified activity determined by the Department and specified in Exhibit B of the Contract.

FEDERAL/STATE LAW: Wherever federal or state laws, regulations, rules, orders, and policies, etc. are referred to in the Contract, the said reference shall be deemed to mean all such laws, regulations, etc. as they may be amended or revised from the time to time.

CONTRACTOR MANUAL: Shall mean that document prepared by the NH Department of Administrative Services containing a compilation of all regulations promulgated pursuant to the New Hampshire Administrative Procedures Act. NH RSA Ch 541-A, for the purpose of implementing State of NH and federal regulations promulgated thereunder.

SUPPLANTING OTHER FEDERAL FUNDS: The Contractor guarantees that funds provided under this Contract will not supplant any existing federal funds available for these services.

### **REVISIONS TO GENERAL PROVISIONS**

- Subparagraph 4 of the General Provisions of this contract, Conditional Nature of Agreement, is replaced as follows:
  - 4. CONDITIONAL NATURE OF AGREEMENT. Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, all obligations of the State hereunder, including without limitation, the continuance of payments, in whole or in part, under this Agreement are contingent upon continued appropriation or availability of funds, including any subsequent changes to the appropriation or availability of funds affected by any state or federal legislative or executive action that reduces, eliminates, or otherwise modifies the appropriation or availability of funding for this Agreement and the Scope of Services provided in Exhibit A, Scope of Services, in whole or in part. In no event shall the State be liable for any payments hereunder in excess of appropriated or available funds. In the event of a reduction, termination or modification of appropriated or available funds, the State shall have the right to withhold payment until such funds become available, if ever. The State shall have the right to reduce, terminate or modify services under this Agreement immediately upon giving the Contractor notice of such reduction, termination or modification. The State shall not be required to transfer funds from any other source or account into the Account(s) identified in block 1.6 of the General Provisions, Account Number, or any other

account, in the event funds are reduced or unavailable.

- 10.1 The State may terminate the Agreement at any time for any reason, at the sole discretion of the State, 30 days after giving the Contractor written notice that the State is exercising its option to terminate the Agreement.
- 10.2 In the event of early termination, the Contractor shall, within 15 days of notice of early termination, develop and submit to the State a Transition Plan for services under the Agreement, including but not limited to, identifying the present and future needs of clients receiving services under the Agreement and establishes a process to meet those needs.
- 10.3 The Contractor shall fully cooperate with the State and shall promptly provide detailed information to support the Transition Plan including, but not limited to, any information or data requested by the State related to the termination of the Agreement and Transition Plan and shall provide ongoing communication and revisions of the Transition Plan to the State as requested.
- 10.4 In the event that services under the Agreement, including but not limited to clients receiving services under the Agreement are transitioned to having services delivered by another entity including contracted providers or the State, the Contractor shall provide a process for uninterrupted delivery of services in the Transition Plan.
- 10.5 The Contractor shall establish a method of notifying clients and other affected individuals about the transition. The Contractor shall include the proposed communications in its Transition Plan submitted to the State as described above.
- 3. Subparagraph 14.1.1 of the General Provisions of this contract, is deleted and the following subparagraph is added:
  - 14.1.1 comprehensive general liability insurance against all claims of bodily injury, death or property damage, in amounts of not less than \$250,000 per claim and \$1,000,000 per occurrence with additional general liability umbrella coverage of not less than \$1,000,000; and



### CERTIFICATION REGARDING ENVIRONMENTAL TOBACCO SMOKE



- g. "HITECH Act" means the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act, TitleXIII, Subtitle D, Part 1 & 2 of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.
- h. "HIPAA" means the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, Public Law 104-191 and the Standards for Privacy and Security of Individually Identifiable Health Information, 45 CFR Parts 160, 162 and 164 and amendments thereto.
- i. "Individual" shall have the same meaning as the term "individual" in 45 CFR Section 160.103 and shall include a person who qualifies as a personal representative in accordance with 45 CFR Section 164.501(g).
- j. "Privacy Rule" shall mean the Standards for Privacy of Individually Identifiable Health Information at 45 CFR Parts 160 and 164, promulgated under HIPAA by the United States Department of Health and Human Services.
- k. "Protected Health Information" shall have the same meaning as the term "protected health information" in 45 CFR Section 160.103, limited to the information created or received by Business Associate from or on behalf of Covered Entity.

- "Required by Law" shall have the same meaning as the term "required by law" in 45 CFR Section 164.103.
- m. "Secretary" shall mean the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services or his/her designee.
- n. "Security Rule" shall mean the Security Standards for the Protection of Electronic Protected Health Information at 45 CFR Part 164, Subpart C, and amendments thereto.
- o. "Unsecured Protected Health Information" means protected health information that is not secured by a technology standard that renders protected health information unusable, unreadable, or indecipherable to unauthorized individuals and is developed or endorsed by a standards developing organization that is accredited by the American National Standards Institute.
- p. Other Definitions All terms not otherwise defined herein shall have the meaning established under 45 C.F.R. Parts 160, 162 and 164, as amended from time to time, and the HITECH Act.

### (2) Business Associate Use and Disclosure of Protected Health Information.

- a. Business Associate shall not use, disclose, maintain or transmit Protected Health Information (PHI) except as reasonably necessary to provide the services outlined under Exhibit A of the Agreement. Further, Business Associate, including but not limited to all its directors, officers, employees and agents, shall not use, disclose, maintain or transmit PHI in any manner that would constitute a violation of the Privacy and Security Rule.
- b. Business Associate may use or disclose PHI:
  - 1. For the proper management and administration of the Business Associate;
  - II. As required by law, pursuant to the terms set forth in paragraph d. below; or
  - III. For data aggregation purposes for the health care operations of Covered Entity.
- c. To the extent Business Associate is permitted under the Agreement to disclose PHI to a third party, Business Associate must obtain, prior to making any such disclosure, (i) reasonable assurances from the third party that such PHI will be held confidentially and used or further disclosed only as required by law or for the purpose for which it was disclosed to the third party; and (ii) an agreement from such third party to notify Business Associate, in accordance with the HIPAA Privacy, Security, and Breach Notification Rules of any breaches of the confidentiality of the PHI, to the extent it has obtained knowledge of such breach.
- d. The Business Associate shall not, unless such disclosure is reasonably necessary to provide services under Exhibit A of the Agreement, disclose any PHI in response to a request for disclosure on the basis that it is required by law, without first notifying Covered Entity so that Covered Entity has an opportunity to object to the disclosure and to seek appropriate relief. If Covered Entity objects to such disclosure, the Business

Associate shall refrain from disclosing the PHI until Covered Entity has exhausted all remedies.

- e. If the Covered Entity notifies the Business Associate that Covered Entity has agreed to be bound by additional restrictions over and above those uses or disclosures or security safeguards of PHI pursuant to the Privacy and Security Rule, the Business Associate shall be bound by such additional restrictions and shall not disclose PHI in violation of such additional restrictions and shall abide by any additional security safeguards.
- (3) Obligations and Activities of Business Associate.
- a. The Business Associate shall notify the Covered Entity's Privacy Officer immediately after the Business Associate becomes aware of any use or disclosure of protected health information not provided for by the Agreement including breaches of unsecured protected health information and/or any security incident that may have an impact on the protected health information of the Covered Entity.
- b. The Business Associate shall immediately perform a risk assessment when it becomes aware of any of the above situations. The risk assessment shall include, but not be limited to:
  - o The nature and extent of the protected health information involved, including the types of identifiers and the likelihood of re-identification;
  - o The unauthorized person used the protected health information or to whom the disclosure was made:
  - Whether the protected health information was actually acquired or viewed
  - The extent to which the risk to the protected health information has been mitigated.



- Within ten (10) business days of receiving a written request from Covered Entity for a j. request for an accounting of disclosures of PHI, Business Associate shall make available to Covered Entity such information as Covered Entity may require to fulfill its obligations to provide an accounting of disclosures with respect to PHI in accordance with 45 CFR Section 164.528.
- In the event any individual requests access to, amendment of, or accounting of PHI k. directly from the Business Associate, the Business Associate shall within two (2) business days forward such request to Covered Entity. Associate maintains such PHI. If Covered Entity, in its sole discretion, requires that the Business Associate destroy any or all PHI, the Business Associate shall certify to Covered Entity that the PHI has been destroyed.

### (4) Obligations of Covered Entity

- a. Covered Entity shall notify Business Associate of any changes or limitation(s) in its Notice of Privacy Practices provided to individuals in accordance with 45 CFR Section 164.520, to the extent that such change or limitation may affect Business Associate's use or disclosure of PHI.
- b. Covered Entity shall promptly notify Business Associate of any changes in, or revocation of permission provided to Covered Entity by individuals whose PHI may be used or disclosed by Business Associate under this Agreement, pursuant to 45 CFR Section 164.506 or 45 CFR Section 164.508.

### (5) Termination for Cause

In addition to Paragraph 10 of the standard terms and conditions (P-37) of this Agreement the Covered Entity may immediately terminate the Agreement upon Covered Entity's knowledge of a breach by Business Associate of the Business Associate Agreement set forth herein as Exhibit I. The Covered Entity may either immediately terminate the Agreement or provide an opportunity for Business Associate to cure the alleged breach within a timeframe specified by Covered Entity. If Covered Entity determines that neither termination nor cure is feasible, Covered Entity shall report the violation to the Secretary.

### (6) Miscellaneous

- a. <u>Definitions and Regulatory References</u>. All terms used, but not otherwise defined herein, shall have the same meaning as those terms in the Privacy and Security Rule, amended from time to time. A reference in the Agreement, as amended to include this Exhibit I, to a Section in the Privacy and Security Rule means the Section as in effect or as amended.
- b. <u>Amendment</u>. Covered Entity and Business Associate agree to take such action as is necessary to amend the Agreement, from time to time as is necessary for Covered Entity to comply with the changes in the requirements of HIPAA, the Privacy and Security Rule, and applicable federal and state law.
- c. <u>Data Ownership</u>. The Business Associate acknowledges that it has no ownership rights with respect to the PHI provided by or created on behalf of Covered Entity.


