Dr. James Alan Fox, Northeastern University

Recent mass shootings resulting in a large number of fatalities have shocked the American public, with many believing there to be an epidemic of bloodshed and even avoiding certain places. Police can reduce gun violence if properly motivated, staffed, and guided. This presentation reviews four key areas in which the police can better position themselves to control gun violence: (1) addressing gun violence hot spots, 2) using focused deterrence to prevent gang violence, (3) strengthening shooting investigations, and (4) disrupting the underground gun markets that arm violent offenders. Police departments also need to embrace reform, redouble community policing efforts, and ensure lawful and procedurally just encounters with the public.
