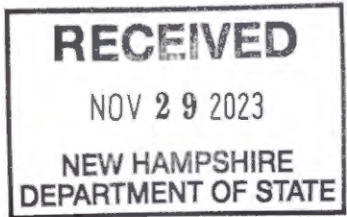

Description: Public approval of Congress is near an all-time low. So, too, is comity in Congress and bipartisan friendships. Pundits, politicians, and political scientists too frequently discuss these trends under the broad rubric of party polarization. In this presentation, I attempt to tease out a dimension different from ideology that begins to develop a measure of the Senate's social fabric to see if it could be an elixir for what ails Congress. I speculate on the consequences of the social fabric on both lawmaking and the institution.
