Your Excellency and Honorable Councilors:

REQUESTED ACTION

The New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission requests **RETROACTIVE** authority to continue its membership and participation in the National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners (NARUC), Vendor # 170718, for the period of July 1, 2013 through June 30, 2014, for an amount of \$9,484.00. Funding is 100% Other Funds (Utilities Assessments).

Funding is available in account, Organizational Dues, as follows:

EXPLANATION

The National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners (NARUC) is a non-profit organization founded in 1889. Its members include the governmental agencies that are engaged in the regulation of utilities and carriers in the fifty states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. NARUC's member agencies regulate the activities of telecommunications, energy and water utilities. NARUC's mission is to serve the public interest by improving the quality and effectiveness of public utility regulation. RSA 374-F:8¹ requires that the Commission participate "in the activities of ...the National Association of Regulatory Commissioners..." which requires membership in NARUC. Membership in this organization provides the Commission with valuable support and assistance in keeping abreast of developments at the federal level that impact upon residential and business customers in New Hampshire. Commissioners and staff participate on national committees which

promote coordinated action by state commissions to protect the common interests of the people with respect to the regulation of public utilities and carriers. NARUC makes stipends available for travel to committee and annual meetings. Membership in NARUC has been especially helpful to the Commission in the fast-paced telecommunications sector where important decisions continually emanate from the FCC, Federal Courts and Congress as well as the energy sector where decisions made by Federal Agencies such as the FERC and the EPA have a profound effect on energy costs in New Hampshire.

Listed below are answers to standard questions required for Governor and Council organization dues and membership approval submissions:

1. **How long has this organization been in existence and how long has this agency been a member of this organization?** NARUC has been in existence since 1889. The New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission became a member following its establishment in 1911 and Commissioners from New Hampshire participated in NARUC's 1911 Annual Convention.
2. **Is there any other organization which provides the same or similar benefits which your agency belongs to?** The New England Conference of Public Utilities Commissioners, Inc. (NECPUC) does from time to time and on a limited basis coordinate advocacy efforts of the New England State Commissions before the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. However, NECPUC has very limited staff (one person) and no Washington D.C. presence.
3. **How many other states belong to this organization and is your agency the sole New Hampshire state agency that is a member?** All 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the US Virgin Islands are members of NARUC. The Public Utilities Commission is the sole New Hampshire agency that is a NARUC member.
4. **How is the dues structure established? (Standard fee for all states, based on population, based on other criteria, etc)** Dues are based on population. The annual assessment fees of NARUC member agencies are determined through the application of a formula that was adopted by NARUC membership at the convention in 1986 and reaffirmed in 1992. The formula specifies the following concerning the method by which NARUC's dues revenue is allocated among its State commission members: "50%...shall be divided equally and 50% ... shall be divided in a pro-rata manner in accordance with the most recent decennial census data". The annual adjustment is determined by the previous year's CPI adjustment.
5. **What benefit does the state receive from participating in this membership?** NARUC actively advocates various regulatory causes before the Federal courts and agencies. It keeps track of Congressional bills of regulatory interest and presents the views of the Association on those of particular interest. The officers of NARUC have testified in front of Congress numerous times on numerous issues that have a direct impact on New Hampshire ratepayers. NARUC keeps its members apprised of current developments of regulatory interest by furnishing the NARUC Bulletin to the key personnel of each member agency and by special mailings of material. NARUC and its affiliates, through the holding of national and regional conventions, seminars and committee meetings and the work of the Washington staff, seek to improve cooperation among the members, promote uniformity of regulation and intensify regulatory expertise. NARUC has also endorsed the continuing educational programs for utility regulatory offered by the Michigan State University and the New Mexico State University.
6. **Are training or educational/ research materials included in the membership? If so, is the cost included? Explain in detail.** NARUC provides an array of training and educational materials to its members, both directly through its meetings, and through its affiliated training organizations, which include the National Regulatory Research Institute, the Institute for Public Utilities at Michigan State University, the Center for Public Utilities at New Mexico State University, and the Public Utility Research Center at the University of Florida. Some training programs are offered without charge, such as NARUC's New Commissioners training program, an array of webinars, and workshops and training activities supported by Federal government grants. Other training activities, such as the

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university-based programs, require additional registration or tuition fees.

7. **Is the membership required to receive any federal grants or required in order to receive or participate in licensing or certification exams? Explain.** No, membership in NARUC is not required in order to receive federal grants or participate in licensing or certification exams.
8. **Is there any travel included with this membership fee? Explain in detail any travel to include the number of employees involved, the number of trips, destination if known and purposes of membership supported trips.** There is no travel specifically tied to the payment of NARUC's membership fee/dues. However, NARUC does pay travel costs for members of its Board of Directors and the chairs of its committees to attend its three yearly meetings, and travel stipends for members attending grant-supported workshops held at the three meetings and on a stand-alone basis. In FY 2013, the Commission received \$5,676 in travel stipends for the commissioner and staff.
9. **Which state agency employees are directly involved with this organization? (Indicate if they are members, voting members, committee members, and/or officers of the organization.** Chairman Amy L. Ignatius – voting member of NARUC. She also serves on the Committee on Telecommunications; Commissioner Michael Harrington – voting member of NARUC. He also serves on the Committee on Electricity and Subcommittee on Nuclear Issues-Waste Disposal; Commissioner Robert Scott – voting member of NARUC. He also serves on the Committees on Critical Infrastructure and Energy Resources and the Environment; Debra A. Howland – serves on the Staff Subcommittees on Executive Management; Randy Knepper – serves as the Chair of the Staff Subcommittee on Pipeline Safety; Mark Naylor – serves on the Staff Subcommittee on Accounting and Finance; Amanda Noonan – serves on the Staff Subcommittee on Consumer Affairs; Michael Ladam – serves on the Staff Subcommittee on Telecommunications; Marcia Brown – serves on the Staff Subcommittee on Water. Due to the press of Commission work, participation on committees by Commissioners and staff is more often done remotely via teleconferencing rather than attending committee meetings in person.
10. **Explain in detail any negative impact to the State if the Agency did not belong to this organization.** If the New Hampshire commission were not a member of NARUC, it would be limited in its ability to represent the interests of New Hampshire ratepayers and influence federal legislation and federal energy and communications regulation through NARUC's development of national policy positions and advocacy in Washington. Congress and the various federal agencies would assume that NARUC's policy positions would be representative of all the states including New Hampshire but New Hampshire would have no input into these positions. Additionally, not being able to advocate for our positions through NARUC would mean we would have to do this on our own at a much greater cost. We would also be unable to take advantage of the portfolio of training programs NARUC and its affiliates offer throughout the year. We would also be unable to take advantage of the federal funding NARUC secures to support its members training and advocacy on issues before the Department of Energy, the Department of Homeland Security, the U.S. Agency for International Development, and the Environmental Protection Agency.

This request is **RETROACTIVE** because the invoice was received after the submission deadline for the July 10, 2013 G&C meeting and therefore could not be approved before July 1, 2013. A copy of the July 2013 invoice is attached for your review.
