Fiscal Forecast for the States FY 2021

According to the National Association of State Budget Officers, state fiscal conditions continue to show signs of improvement and greater stability. According to enacted budgets, state general fund spending is expected to grow 4.3% in fiscal 2019 compared to fiscal 2018 levels. With states enjoying surpluses and finding opportunities to smartly grow, there are economic and cultural variables that state leaders should be mindful of as they plan budgets. And yet, recent economic indicators that previously were accurate harbingers of a recession, fears that the U.S. and China trade war will slow global economic growth, and the dissipation of the economic stimulus effect of the 2017 tax cuts have many wondering when the longest expansion of the economy in U.S. history will come to an end. Following presentations from the panel, participants will engage in a conversation to share perspectives on the future of the economy in their states and the nation.

U.S. health spending increased at an average rate of 2.8% annually between 2000 and 2016. During the same period, U.S. gross domestic product increased by only 0.9% annually, which means that health care continues to represent a larger share of GDP. Health care expenditures are one of the top drivers of state appropriations. To address this challenge, many states have taken innovative approaches to contain costs by making investments in new processes and technologies. States are also focusing on the social determinants of health—the conditions in which people are born, grow, live, work and age that shape health—and not just health care. This session will examine how state officials can make and are making healthy choices for their citizens.

Justice for All

The U.S. is a world leader in incarceration rates and keeps nearly 7 million people under criminal justice custody or supervision, which means 1 in every 37 adults in the U.S. is under some form of correctional supervision. Today, the U.S. makes up 5% of the world's population and has 21% of the world's prisoners. African Americans are incarcerated at more than five times the rate of whites. Of those incarcerated, 90% will exit the criminal justice system and return to society. This session will share state efforts to keep youth from entering the criminal justice system and how states are reducing the barriers for previously incarcerated persons to be successful post release. This session will also highlight recent legislation in Florida designed to collect and analyze criminal justice data to help achieve better public safety outcomes.

States Place Their Bets

States may now officially legalize sports betting, after the U.S. Supreme Court struck down the federal ban. There are 11 states with legal, active sports betting industries, with more on the way. Illinois, Indiana, Montana, New Hampshire, North Carolina and Tennessee all legalized wagering in 2019. As many as 30 states could act to legalize sports betting by the end of 2020. Americans gamble more than \$150 billion illegally on sports in a year and about another \$5 billion comes in legally. Regulating and licensing sports betting operations is a big undertaking and each state has approached that obligation differently. This session will survey the field of play for states new to the game and predict what the odds are for states yet to wager on sports betting.

Schooled on Safety

On Feb. 14, 2018, a gunman opened fire at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, killing 17 students and staff members and injuring 17 others. In the wake of the shooting, 21 states initiated a task force to study school safety and then Florida Gov. Rick Scott signed legislation enacted in response to the shooting. Following the shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Connecticut, at least 12 states created task forces and are now working on implementing proposed recommendations. Panelists will share how state officials, advocates, educators and stakeholders successfully built a bipartisan coalition during a time of crisis.
