

Your Excellency and Members of the Council:

REQUESTED ACTION

Authorize the Department of Justice to amend the subgrant in the amount of \$368,871 to the New Hampshire Board of Pharmacy Drug Monitor Program (PDMP) approved on October 16, 2013, item #41, from the Harold Rogers Prescription Drug Monitoring Program Grant Award, by extending the end date from March 31, 2015 to March 31, 2016. This extension request will be effective from the date of Governor and Council approval through March 31, 2016. No additional funds are being added. This is 100% Federal Funds.

Funding is available in account #02-20-20-201510-2907-072-500576, Job #20SCG13A, Department of Justice Grants Administration PDMP as follows:

EXPLANATION

This program provides physicians and other prescribers access to their patients' controlled substances prescribing history. When the federal award was made in 2013, the PDMP Advisory Council had been meeting for more than a year. Four subcommittees had been formed and had also been meeting for approximately 11 months. Those subcommittees are: Rules, Finance and Sustainability, Evaluation, and Implementation. The rules were developed and adopted in mid-2014, and the process for selecting a Vendor was completed in May, 2014. The program coordinator was also hired at that time. The program went live on October 16, 2014. The program is now fully functioning through Health Information Designs, LLC (Vendor# 262029) and the PDMP program coordinator.


Because the Vendor selection process and the rulemaking process took close to a year, which covered most of the eighteen-month grant period, we are requesting this extension in order

to fully expend the grant and to operate for at least 18 months in order to evaluate the effectiveness of the program.

Your Excellency and Members of the Council:

REQUESTED ACTION

Authorize the Department of Justice to sub grant \$368,871 to the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services, Board of Pharmacy (Vendor #177945 B006), utilizing funds from the United States Department of Justice's Bureau of Justice Assistance FFY 2013 Harold Rogers Prescription Drug Monitoring Program for the purpose of implementing a prescription drug monitoring program effective the date of Governor and Council approval through March 31, 2015. This is 100% Federal Funds.

Funding is available in account #02-20-20-201510-2907, Department of Justice, Grants Administration, and PDMP FFY 2014 as follows:

EXPLANATION

If approved, these funds will allow the Board of Pharmacy to implement a statewide prescription drug monitoring program as set forth by RSA 318-B:32 under the Controlled Drug Act (Controlled Drug Prescription Health and Safety Program).

New Hampshire is the 49th state to enact legislation to allow the implementation of a prescription drug monitoring program. The fastest-growing epidemic in New Hampshire is the non-medical use of prescription medications. Drug-related deaths in the state have increased 400% since 2000. The goal of the program is to implement a Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (PDMP) that will reduce the misuse, abuse, and diversion of prescription drugs while ensuring that patients whose

conditions require the use of controlled substances receive appropriate medical and pharmaceutical care. The Advisory Council (created by RSA 318-B) has been meeting since July, 2012, and has progressed significantly in its prescribed work toward the PDMP implementation. It is anticipated that the PDMP will be fully operational by February, 2014.


The PDMP will not be accessible by law enforcement except through court order. Additionally, strict security of the data provided by the selected vendor of the monitoring system will be required. Physicians who work in the State's emergency departments and urgent care clinics will be able to access their patients' prescribing histories to ensure that the controlled substances that are being prescribed are medically necessary. In the event that a patient is being given multiple prescriptions from multiple doctors, the PDMP will be able to alert the doctors and afford them an unprecedented opportunity for drug abuse intervention and treatment.

In the event that federal funds become unavailable, general funds will not be requested to support this program.
