**REQUESTED ACTION**

Authorize the NH Department of Corrections to accept and expend a sub grant from the NH Department of Justice in the amount of \$30,000.00 to support the Project Safe Neighborhoods initiative by providing certified Probation/Parole Officer(s) as part of a multi-agency approach for probation/parole checks in crime hotspots in the City of Manchester for the period beginning upon Governor and Executive Council approval, through September 30, 2019. 100% Agency Income. (Federal at origin).

Funds are to be budgeted in an account, Project Safe Neighborhoods, Accounting Unit 02-46-46-460510-08570000 as follows:

**EXPLANATION**

The purpose of the Project Safe Neighborhoods (PSN) sub grant from the New Hampshire Department of Justice awarded to the New Hampshire Department of Corrections is to provide financial assistance to offset the overtime expenses incurred by the Manchester Probation /Parole Officer(s) participating in the Project Safe Neighborhoods initiative. The PSN initiative is a collaborative effort among federal, state, and local law enforcement partnerships for increased visibility in Manchester's crime hotspots to deter illegal weapon and gang activity, sequentially combating the current Opioid crisis.

The NH Department of Corrections Manchester Probation/Parole Officers will be partnered with Manchester Police Officers to conduct increased home visit checks of those individuals on probation and parole who reside within problematic areas known for illegal gun and gang activity hotspots in the City of Manchester, increasing

law enforcement presence. The Manchester Police Officer will serve as the Probation/Parole Officer's backup to enhance officer safety and project the collaborative efforts of both agencies.

The Project Safe Neighborhoods will allow the Manchester Police Department and the NH Department of Corrections Probation/Parole Manchester District Office to form a strong partnership to provide needed community services to address and combat weapon and gang violence, to ensure offender accountability and provide a safer environment for the residents and visitors to the City of Manchester.

The Project Safe Neighborhoods budget does not include Indirect Costs as these costs are not part of the award.

In the event that these funds no longer become available State general funds will not be requested to support this program.

### **Interagency Memorandum of Understanding**

Whereas, the New Hampshire Department of Justice ("Agency 1") is a duly constituted agency of the State of New Hampshire;

Whereas, the New Hampshire Department of Corrections ("Agency 2") is a duly constituted agency of the State of New Hampshire;

Whereas, Agency 1 is responsible for providing funding through a subgrant to Agency 2 as herein described in the application submitted to the Bureau of Justice Assistance on March 24, 2017.

Whereas, Agency 1 desires to enter into a subgrant with Agency 2 for a term from Governor and Council approval through September 30, 2019 in an amount to not exceed \$30,000;

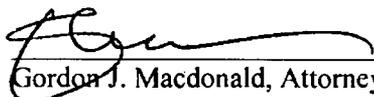
Whereas, Agency 2 is responsible for adhering to all conditions as set forth in their Application, federal financial rules and all applicable state rules and regulations of procurement;

Whereas, Agency 2 desires to fund overtime probation and parole hotspot checks beyond the performance of their regular duties for a total not to exceed \$30,000.

NOW THEREFORE, the parties enter into this Memorandum of Understanding to their mutual benefit, the benefit of the State and in furtherance of constitutional or statutory authority and objectives.

1. Agency 1 agrees to pay Agency 2 the amount of \$30,000.00 for the services described in the attached MOU Exhibit A, which is hereby incorporated by reference. Payment shall be provided from 02-20-20-201510-4469.
2. Agency 2 agrees to perform the services described in the attached MOU Exhibit A which is hereby incorporated by reference.
3. The method of payment and payment amount for the above-referenced services, if any is required, is described in the attached MOU Exhibit B, such exhibit being hereby incorporated by reference.
4. All obligations hereunder are contingent upon the availability and continued appropriation of funds. The agencies shall not be required to transfer funds from any other account in the event that funds are reduced or unavailable.
5. The Memorandum of Understanding is effective until September 30, 2019

6. This memorandum of Understanding may be amended by an instrument in writing signed by both parties. Either party may terminate this agreement by providing written notice to the other party at least 30 days prior to termination.
7. The parties agree that the obligations, agreements and promises made under this Memorandum of Understanding are not intended to be legally binding on the parties and are not legally enforceable.
8. Disputes arising under this Memorandum of Understanding which cannot be resolved between the agencies shall be referred to the Department of Justice, Civil Bureau, for review and resolution.
9. This agreement shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire.
10. The parties hereto do not intend to benefit any third parties and this Memorandum of Understanding shall not be construed to confer any such benefit.
11. In the event any of the provisions of this Memorandum of Understanding are held to be contrary to any state or federal law, the remaining provisions of this Memorandum of Understanding will remain in full force and effect.
12. This Memorandum of Understanding, which may be executed in a number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, constitutes the entire Memorandum of Understanding and understandings between the parties, and supersedes all prior Memoranda of Understanding and understandings related hereto.
13. Nothing herein shall be construed as a waiver of sovereign immunity, such immunity being hereby specifically preserved.

**EXHIBIT A**

-SCOPE OF SERVICES-

1. The Department of Corrections as Subrecipient shall receive a grant from the New Hampshire Department of Justice (DOJ) for expenses incurred for services provided in collaboration with the Project Safe Neighborhoods team outlined in the application submitted to the Bureau of Justice Assistance on March 24, 2017.
2. The Subrecipient shall be reimbursed by the DOJ based on budgeted expenditures described in Exhibit B. The Subrecipient shall submit incurred expenses for reimbursement on the state approved expenditure reporting form as provided. Expenditure reports shall be submitted on a quarterly basis, within fifteen (15) days following the end of the current quarterly activities. Expenditure reports submitted later than thirty (30) days following the end of the quarter will be considered late and out of compliance. *For example, with an award that begins on January 1, the first quarterly report is due on April 15<sup>th</sup> or 15 days after the close of the first quarter ending on March 31.*
3. Subrecipient is required to maintain supporting documentation for all grant expenses both state funds and match if provided and to produce those documents upon request of this office or any other state or federal audit authority. Grant project supporting documentation should be maintained for at least 5 years after the close of the project.
4. Subrecipient shall be subject to periodic desk audits and program reviews by DOJ. Such desk audits and program reviews shall be scheduled with Subrecipient and every attempt shall be made by Subrecipient to accommodate the schedule.

**EXHIBIT B**

**-SCHEDULE/TERMS OF PAYMENT-**

1. The Subrecipient shall receive reimbursement in exchange for approved expenditure reports as described in EXHIBIT A.
2. The Subrecipient shall be reimbursed within thirty (30) days following the DOJ's approval of expenditures. Said payment shall be made to the Sub-Recipient's account receivables address per the Financial System of the State of New Hampshire.
3. The State's obligation to compensate the Subrecipient under this Agreement shall not exceed the price limitation set in the Interagency Memorandum of Understanding.

3a. The Subrecipient shall be awarded an amount not to exceed at total of \$30,000.00 of the total Grant Limitation from approval of PSN Strategic Action Plan to 9/30/2019 with approved expenditure reports. This shall be contingent on continued federal funding and program performance, to include:

- \$30,000 for overtime costs for adult probation and parole hotspot checks in the Manchester area to be facilitated with the PSN Project Coordinator.

**EXHIBIT C**

**-SPECIAL PROVISIONS-**

1. Subrecipients shall also be compliant at all times with the terms, conditions and specifications detailed in the Special Conditions as Appendix 1 which is subject to annual review.



**3. Compliance with DOJ Grants Financial Guide**

The recipient agrees to comply with the DOJ Grants Financial Guide as posted on the OJP website (currently, the "2015 DOJ Grants Financial Guide" available at <https://ojp.gov/financialguide/DOJ/index.htm>), including any updated version that may be posted during the period of performance.

**4. All subawards ("subgrants") must have specific federal authorization**

The recipient, and any subrecipient ("subgrantee") at any tier, must comply with all applicable requirements for authorization of any subaward. The subgrantee assures that in the event a Federal or State court or Federal or State administrative agency makes a finding of discrimination within the three years prior to the receipt of the federal financial assistance and after a due process hearing against the subgrantee on the grounds of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, age, or disability, a copy of the finding will be submitted to the New Hampshire Department of Justice, Grants Management Unit and to the U.S. Department of Justice, Office for Civil Rights, Office of Justice Programs, 810 7th Street, NW, Washington, D.C. 20531. For additional information regarding your obligations under civil rights please reference the state website at [http://doj.nh.gov/grants/civil\\_rights.html](http://doj.nh.gov/grants/civil_rights.html) and understand if you are awarded funding from this office, civil rights compliance will be monitored by this office, and the Office for Civil Rights, Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice.

14. If required, within 30 days from the date of the award, the subgrantee will submit for approval, an acceptable Equal Employment Opportunity Plan (EEOP) as required by 28 CFR 42.301 et seq. or a Certification Form to both the NH DOJ and the Office of Civil Rights, Office of Justice Programs, US DOJ at 810 7th Street, NW, Washington, DC 20531.
