Authorize the Department of Health and Human Services, Division for Children, Youth and Families to pay the Council of Juvenile Correctional Administrators, 638 Granite Street, Suite 112, Braintree, MA 02184 (Vendor 162101 B001) the amount of \$3,992 for annual membership dues effective upon Governor and Executive Council approval for the **retroactive** period of July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020. 100% Federal Funds.

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EXPLANATION

The request is retroactive due to a lack of available funds resulting from the State's continuing budget resolution that began on July 1, 2019.

Approval of this request will enable the State to have access to educational activities, research and data that will enable the State to increase safety and decrease violence within the John H. Sununu Youth Services Center.

Listed below are answers to standard questions required for Governor and Executive Council organization dues and membership approval submissions:

1. How long has this organization been in existence and how long has this agency been a member of this organization.

The Council of Juvenile Correctional Administrators is a national non-profit organization formed in 1994. This will be the third year of membership in this organization for the John H. Sununu Youth Services Center.

2. Is there any other organization which provides the same or similar benefits, which your agency belongs to?

Joseph E. Ribsam, Jr Director The Sununu Youth Services Center does not belong to any other organization that provides either the same or similar benefits.

3. How many other states belong to this organization and is your agency the sole New Hampshire state agency that is a member?

The Council of Juvenile Correctional Administrators is comprised of youth correctional chief executive officers in all fifty states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico. The Sununu Youth Services Center is the sole agency member in New Hampshire.

- 4. How is the dues structure established? (Standard fee for all states, based on population, based on other criteria, etc.)
 - Council of Juvenile Correctional Administrators membership fees are calculated using a sliding scale structure and are based upon agency budget size. With an annual agency budget of less than \$100,000,000, the Sununu Youth Services Center is deemed by the Council as a "Level 1" member with commensurate fees.
- 5. What benefit does the state receive from participating in this membership?

Membership in the Council of Juvenile Correctional Administrators provides educational activities and programs, as well as research and technical assistance projects. Membership includes up to three annual meetings at no cost for all directors, offering sessions on best practices and evidence-based approaches. The Council meetings enable leaders from each state and several large counties to share information; identify current issues and devise strategies to address them; and to form a national voice for youth corrections.

Additionally, membership offers access to research and data outlining effective methodologies to increase safety and decrease violence within juvenile correctional facilities, provides information on suicide prevention, and provides the ability to participate in workgroups to address The Prison Rape Elimination Act.

6. Are training or educational and research materials included in the membership? If so, is the cost included? Explain in detail.

The membership offers educational activities, which include presentations at conferences hosted by other national organizations and written materials regarding issues in youth corrections. Information addresses defining and measuring recidivism rates as well as information on the issues in youth corrections, which include describing the youth, their needs, and the systems' successes and shortcomings.

Members have access to the Council's Resource Network, which includes an online center for information; library and links for training and research; forum discussions with technical assistance providers; bi-monthly webinar trainings; and publications and guidebooks for Juvenile Justice and Child Welfare System Coordination and Integration.

7. Is the membership required to receive any federal grants or required in order to receive or participate in licensing or certification exams? Explain.

Membership in the Council of Juvenile Correctional Administrators is required to receive technical assistance support from this association.

8. Is there any travel included with this membership fee? Explain in detail any travel to include the number of employees involved, the number of trips, destination if known, and purposes of membership-supported trips.

Travel for one representative, which includes airfare, lodging, ground transportation, and meals, to two (2) meetings is included with this membership fee. The purpose of the Council's annual meetings is to facilitate interaction between juvenile corrections administrators to discuss current issues, and develop a voice for juvenile corrections. Meeting presentations include topics on best practices and evidence based treatments.

Also included is an all-inclusive Leadership Institute in Chicago. The purpose of the Leadership Institute is to gather and educate juvenile corrections administrators at a more in-depth level. Presenters include Models for Change National Resource Bank, National Center for Mental Health and Juvenile Justice, The Juvenile Law Center, The National Youth Screening Assistance Project, RFK Children's Action Corps Models for Change Initiative, and Performance Based Standards (PbS) National data comparisons, trends, themes, and action items to address areas for improvement.

Additionally, there is travel for a special training for new Directors/Administrators, which includes assigning a mentor for a year.

9. Which state agency employees are directly involved with this organization? (Indicate if they are members, voting members, committee members, and/or officers of the organization).

Rhonda Henault, Director of Operations, Sununu Youth Services Center, is a voting member in this organization.

10. Explain in detail any negative impact to the State if the Agency did not belong to this organization.

Should the Governor and Executive Council not approve this request, the Department may be unable to access the valuable resources and data provided through this membership to facilitate youth development in correctional settings. Additionally, the Department would not have access to the training, technical assistance and mentoring services-offered to all fifty states. The Department would also be unable to participate in and share information regarding best practices in the most effective and innovative ways.
