#### REQUESTED ACTION

Authorize the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Economic & Housing Stability, to exercise a renewal option to a sole source agreement with Early Learning New Hampshire (Vendor #159000-B001), 2 Delta Drive, Concord, NH 03301, in order to continue oversight, management, administrative and project support for New Hampshire's Early Childhood Advisory Council, known as Spark NH, by increasing the price limitation by \$75,000 from \$300,000 to \$375,000 and by extending the contract completion date from December 31, 2019 to December 31, 2020, effective upon Governor and Executive Council approval. 100% Federal Funds.

The agreement was originally approved by Governor and Executive Council on December 2, 2015, Item #17 and subsequently amended on December 7, 2016, (Item #8A) and December 20, 2017 (Item #11).

Funds are available in the following account in State Fiscal Years 2020 and 2021, with the authority to adjust amounts within the price limitation and adjust encumbrances between State Fiscal Years through the Budget Office, if needed and justified.

#### **EXPLANATION**

The request is **sole source** because New Hampshire's Early Childhood Advisory Council, now known as Spark NH, was created by executive order September 7, 2011, by Governor John Lynch pursuant to federal mandate (Section 642B (b) (1) (A) stating, "The Governor of the State shall designate or establish a council to serve as the State Advisory Council on Early Childhood Education and Care for children".

The purpose for this request is to continue oversight, management, administrative and project support for Spark NH. In addition, Spark NH will maintain focus on the following goals:

- Promote access to, and build commitment for quality early childhood programs and services.
- Foster public awareness of the importance of early childhood.
- Coordinate the development of a system for the integration and use of meaningful information about young children and their families.
- Coordinate the implementation of an integrated and comprehensive strategic plan for early childhood in New Hampshire.

Approximately 848 early child hood programs, with 8,000+ providers across the state along with the families they serve and other stakeholders, will be served between January 1, 2020 and December 31, 2020.

The original agreement, included language in Exhibit C-1, Revisions to Standard Contract Language, that allows the Department to renew the contract for up to four (4) years, subject to the continued availability of funding, satisfactory performance of service, parties' written authorization and approval from the Governor and Executive Council. The Department is in agreement with renewing services for the remaining one (1) year. Following this renewal a new procurement will be issued for these services.

The contractor is currently coordinating the statewide efforts of Spark NH to impact the quality, quantity, access and affordability of early childhood programming including, but not limited to child care, early learning programs, provider/educator workforce development, preschool, children's physical/mental health and intervention services through outreach, education, collaborative projects, taskforces, among others. As a result the stakeholder

community including providers, parents, children, educators, funders, public/private educational institutions and government, among many others, have made significant strides in creating and implementing a statewide strategic plan to address the challenges, issues, and solutions required to have a comprehensive support system for ensuring young children are in a nurturing, safe and supportive environment, at home and out of their home, to grow and development and build school readiness skills. This has and will continue to be accomplished through Spark initiatives, grant applications, research projects, and professional development opportunities.

This Amendment will allow the Contractor to continue the oversight and coordination of the Spark NH efforts as defined above.

This Amendment will serve all of the early childhood care and education providers across the state, numbering over 8,000; serve all New Hampshire families of young children and inform/advise and inform other stakeholders including businesses, legislators, funders, social service and health providers.

Should Governor and Executive Council not approve this request, the State will not be in compliance with Federal Law, "Head Start Collaboration; State Early Education and Care [42 U.S.C. 9837b] Sec. 642B(b)(1)(D) (i-iii)" and the State may not receive the funding needed for strategic planning, direction and strengthening of New Hampshire's early childhood infrastructure.

This 3<sup>rd</sup> Amendment to the Early Learning New Hampshire to Support Spark New Hampshire contract (hereinafter referred to as "Amendment #3"), is by and between the State of New Hampshire, Department of Health and Human Services (hereinafter referred to as the "State" or "Department") and Early Learning New Hampshire, (hereinafter referred to as "the Contractor"), a non-profit corporation with a place of business at 2 Delta Drive, Concord, NH 03301.

WHÉREAS, pursuant to an agreement (the "Contract") approved by the Governor and Executive Council on December 2, 2015, (Item #17), and subsequently amended on December 7, 2016, (Item #8A), and on December 20, 2017 (Item #11) the Contractor agreed to perform certain services based upon the terms and conditions specified in the Contract as amended and in consideration of certain sums specified; and

WHEREAS, the State and the Contractor have agreed to make changes to the scope of work, payment schedules and terms and conditions of the contract; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the General Provisions, Paragraph 18, and Exhibit C-1 Revisions to General Provisions, Paragraph 3, the State may extend the term of the contract, modify the scope of work and the payment schedule of the contract by written agreement of the parties; and

WHEREAS, the parties agree to extend the term of the agreement, increase the price limitation, and modify the scope of services to support continued delivery of these services, and

WHEREAS, all terms and conditions of the Contract and prior amendments not inconsistent with this Amendment #3 remain in full force and effect; and

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and the mutual covenants and conditions contained in the Contract and set forth herein, the parties hereto agree to amend as follows:



#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors of Early Learning New Hampshire Two Delta Drive Concord, New Hampshire 03301

#### Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Early Learning New Hampshire (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2018 and 2017, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

NOTE 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLES

Early Learning New Hampshire is a nonprofit organization whose mission is directed toward the furthering of quality, affordable child care services which are accessible to and for the benefit of, the broad public. The mission, goals and the work of Early Learning New Hampshire benefit the community at large and work toward enabling families to acquire and maintain employment. Without the benefits of the work of Early Learning New Hampshire, communities, along with the general public, would suffer a loss of needed services and support.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Early Learning New Hampshire considers all cash and highly liquid financial instruments with original maturities of three months or less, which are neither held for nor restricted by donors for long-term purposes, to be cash and cash equivalents. Cash and highly liquid financial instruments restricted to building projects, endowments that are perpetual in nature, or other long-term purposes are excluded from this definition.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires us to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates, and those differences could be material.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable consist primarily of amounts due for providing services under contracts. Early Learning of New Hampshire determines the allowance for uncollectable accounts receivable based on historical experience, an assessment of economic conditions, and a review of subsequent collections. Accounts receivable are written off when deemed uncollectable. At December 31, 2018 and 2017 the allowance for doubtful accounts was \$0.

#### Advertising

Advertising costs are charged to operations when incurred.

#### Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized when earned. Program service fees and payments under cost reimbursable contracts received in advance are deferred to the applicable period in which the related services are performed or expenditures are incurred, respectively. Contributions are recognized when cash, securities or other assets, an unconditional promise to give, or notification of a beneficial interest is received. Conditional promises to give are not recognized until the conditions on which they depend have been substantially met.

## NOTE 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLES CONTINUED

#### Donated Goods and Services

Contributions of donated noncash assets are recorded at their fair values in the period received. Contributions of donated services that create or enhance nonfinancial assets or that require specialized skills, are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased if not provided by donation, are recorded at their fair values in the period received.

#### Functional Expense Allocation

The costs of program and supporting services activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. The statement of functional expenses present the natural classification detail of expenses by function. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

#### Equipment

Early Learning New Hampshire follows the policy of capitalizing, at cost, all expenditures for equipment in excess of \$500. Equipment is carried at cost. Provision for depreciation is provided on the straight-line basis over five years.

Maintenance and repairs costs are charged to operations when incurred, while additions and improvements which extend the useful life of the assets are capitalized. Upon retirement or sale, the cost of the disposed asset together with related amounts of accumulated depreciation are removed from the books and any resulting gain or loss is credited or charged to income.

### Recent Accounting Guidance

During the year ended December 31, 2017 the organization implemented ASU 2016-14, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Entities. Accordingly, the beginning balances of the donor restricted net asset categories (temporarily and permanently restricted) have been retroactively adjusted to consolidate all donor restricted net assets into one classification, with donor restrictions. The ASU requires additional disclosures in the areas of liquidity and endowment funds and modifies the direct method presentation of the Statement of Cash Flows, requires reclassification of investment expenses which are netted in investment return to include internal investment expenses. In addition, it requires any underwater portion of the organization's endowment funds to be adjusted from net assets without donor restrictions to net assets with donor restrictions.

#### Net Assets

Net assets, revenues, gains, and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor or grantor imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions – Net assets available for use in general operations and not subject to donor (or certain grantor) restrictions. The governing board has designated, from net assets without donor restrictions, net assets for an operating reserve and board-designated endowment.

## NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLES (Continued)

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions – Net assets subject to donor- (or certain grantor-) imposed restrictions. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Other donor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity. Donor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time has elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, or both.

#### Income Tax Status

The organization is organized as a nonprofit corporation and has been recognized by the IRS as exempt from federal income taxes under IRC Section 501(c)(3). Thus it qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under IRC Sections 170(b)(1)(A)(vi). The organization is annually required to file a Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax (Form 990) with the IRS. In addition, the entities are subject to income tax on net income that is derived from business activities that are unrelated to their exempt purposes. Management has determined that the organization is not subject to unrelated business income tax and has not filed an Exempt Organization Business Income Tax Return (Form 990-T) with the IRS.

#### **NOTE 3 - LEASE COMMITMENTS**

Early Learning New Hampshire leases its office space under a 5- year lease agreement effective July 1, 2014 that expires June 30, 2019 for a monthly amount of \$2,325. The lease was amended in October 2017, the space rented was decreased and rent was lowered to \$700 per month. The lease was then extended in 2019 to expire June 30, 2022. The amount included as rent expense for the years ended December 31, 2018 and 2017 \$8,461 and \$26,743 respectively. This amount includes donated rent of \$0 and \$11,057, respectively. #### **NOTE 4 - CONCENTRATIONS**

Approximately 30% and 37% of the Organization's support was provided from a single State Grant for the year ended December 31, 2018 and December 31, 2017.

The Organization maintains multiple bank accounts at one bank. Accounts at an institution are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to \$250,000 for the years ended December 31, 2018 and 2017, respectively. Cash at this institution did not exceed Federally insured limits on December 31, 2018 and 2017 respectively.

Because a contact's or grant's restriction s requires resources to be used in a particular manner or in a future period Early Learning New Hampshire must maintain sufficient resources to meet those responsibilities. As part of Early Learning of New Hampshire's liquidity management, it has a policy to structure its financial assets to be available as its general expenditures, liabilities, and other obligations come due. As part of our liquidity management plan, we invest cash in excess of daily requirements in short-term investments, CDs, and money market funds.

#### NOTE 10 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Management has evaluated subsequent events through June 18, 2019, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued for events requiring recording or disclosure in the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2018. No additional disclosers were required.

#### NOTE 11 - FUNCTIONAL EXPENSES

The financial statements report certain categories of expenses that are attributed to more than one program or supporting function. Therefore, expenses require allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. The expenses that are allocated include occupancy, depreciation, and amortization, which are allocated on a square footage basis, as well as salaries and wages, benefits, payroll taxes, professional services, office expenses, information technology, interest, insurance, and other, which are allocated on the basis of estimates of time and effort.

#### Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered Early Learning New Hampshire's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Early Learning New Hampshire's internal control. 

#### **EXPLANATION**

This request to amend the contract is **sole source** because New Hampshire's Early Childhood Advisory Council, now known as Spark NH, was created by executive order September 7, 2011, by Governor John Lynch pursuant to federal mandate (Section 642B (b)(1) (A) stating, "The Governor of the State shall designate or establish a council to serve as the State Advisory Council on Early Childhood Education and Care for children". Governor Lynch appointed a Steering Committee which defined the Early Childhood Advisory Council's mission, secured two federal stimulus grants, established functioning committees and task forces, selected the membership, and hired a director and support staff.

The federal funding provided the start of a unique opportunity to firmly establish an early childhood advisory council with the authority, attention, and capacity to provide strategic direction and strengthen coordination and collaboration among a wide array of early childhood services and programs across the State.

Since the establishment of this program Early Learning New Hampshire has developed partnerships at local and State levels, which have made them instrumental in the coordination of the State's comprehensive strategic plan for early childhood services and programs.

The purpose of this amendment is to continue oversight, management, administrative and project support for Spark NH. In addition, Spark NH will maintain focus on the following goals:

- Promote access to, and build commitment for quality early childhood programs and services.
- Foster public awareness of the importance of early childhood.
- Coordinate the development of a system for the integration and use of meaningful information about young children and their families.
- Coordinate the implementation of an integrated and comprehensive strategic plan for early childhood in New Hampshire.

As referenced in Exhibit C-1 of this contract, this Agreement has the option to extend for up to four (4) years, contingent upon satisfactory delivery of services, available funding, agreement of the parties and approval of the Governor and Executive Council. The Division previously exercised one (1) year of this renewal option and is currently exercising two (2) years of the remaining three (3) year renewal option, after which there will be a one (1) year renewal option remaining.

Notwithstanding any other provision of the Contract to the contrary, no services shall continue after June 30, 2019, and the Department shall not be liable for any payments for services provided after June 30, 2019, unless and until an appropriation for these services has been received from the state legislature and funds encumbered for the SFY 2020-2021 biennia.

The federal funding provided the start of a unique opportunity to firmly establish an early childhood advisory council with the authority, attention, and capacity to provide strategic direction and strengthen coordination and collaboration among a wide array of early childhood services and programs across the State.

Since the establishment of this program Early Learning New Hampshire has developed partnerships at local and State levels, which have made them instrumental in the coordination of the State's comprehensive strategic plan for early childhood.

The purpose of the contract is so that Early Learning New Hampshire may continue to provide oversight, management, administrative and project support to Spark NH so that Spark NH can maintain its focus on the following goals: promote access to and build commitment for quality early childhood programs and services; foster public awareness of the importance of early childhood; coordinate the development of a system for the integration and use of meaningful information about young children and their families; coordinate the implementation of an integrated and comprehensive strategic plan for early childhood in New Hampshire and strengthen New Hampshire's early childhood infrastructure.

New Hampshire's Early Childhood Advisory Council, now known as Spark NH, was created by executive order September 7, 2011, by Governor John Lynch pursuant to federal mandate (Section 642B (b)(1) (A) stating "The Governor of the State shall designate or establish a council to serve as the State Advisory Council on Early Childhood Education and Care for children". Governor Lynch appointed a Steering Committee which defined the Early Childhood Advisory Council's mission, secured two federal stimulus grants, established functioning committees and task forces, selected the membership, and hired a director and support staff.

The federal funding provided the start of a unique opportunity to firmly establish an early childhood advisory council with the authority, attention, and capacity to provide strategic direction and strengthen coordination and collaboration among a wide array of early childhood services and programs across the State.

Since the establishment of this program, Spark NH, with the support of Early Learning New Hampshire has developed partnerships at local and State levels, which have made them instrumental in the coordination of the State's comprehensive strategic plan for early childhood.

This agreement includes language that reserves the Division's right to renew the contract for up to four additional years subject to the continued availability of funds, satisfactory performance of services and approval by the Governor and Executive Council.

Should Governor and Executive Council not approve this request the State would not be in compliance with Federal Law "Head Start Collaboration; State Early Education and Care [42 U.S.C. 9837b] Sec. 642B(b)(1)(D) (i-iii)" and the State would not receive the funding needed for strategic planning, direction and strengthening of New Hampshire's early childhood infrastructure.

2. EMPLOYMENT OF CONTRACTOR/SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED. The State of New Hampshire, acting through the agency identified in block 1.1 ("State"), engages contractor identified in block 1.3 ("Contractor") to perform, and the Contractor shall perform, the work or sale of goods, or both, identified and more particularly described in the attached EXHIBIT A which is incorporated herein by reference ("Services").

## 3. EFFECTIVE DATE/COMPLETION OF SERVICES.

- 3.1 Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, and subject to the approval of the Governor and Executive Council of the State of New Hampshire, if applicable, this Agreement, and all obligations of the parties hereunder, shall become effective on the date the Governor and Executive Council approve this Agreement as indicated in block 1.18, unless no such approval is required, in which case the Agreement shall become effective on the date the Agreement is signed by the State Agency as shown in block 1.14 ("Effective Date").
- 3.2 If the Contractor commences the Services prior to the Effective Date, all Services performed by the Contractor prior to the Effective Date shall be performed at the sole risk of the Contractor, and in the event that this Agreement does not become effective, the State shall have no liability to the Contractor, including without limitation, any obligation to pay the Contractor for any costs incurred or Services performed. Contractor must complete all Services by the Completion Date specified in block 1.7.
- 4. CONDITIONAL NATURE OF AGREEMENT.

  Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, all obligations of the State hereunder, including, without limitation, the continuance of payments hereunder, are contingent upon the availability and continued appropriation of funds, and in no event shall the State be liable for any payments hereunder in excess of such available appropriated funds. In the event of a reduction or termination of appropriated funds, the State shall have the right to withhold payment until such funds become available, if ever, and shall have the right to terminate this Agreement immediately upon giving the Contractor notice of such termination. The State shall not be required to transfer funds from any other account to the Account identified in block 1.6 in the event funds in that Account are reduced or unavailable.

## 5. CONTRACT PRICE/PRICE LIMITATION/PAYMENT.

5.1 The contract price, method of payment, and terms of payment are identified and more particularly described in EXHIBIT B which is incorporated herein by reference.
5.2 The payment by the State of the contract price shall be the only and the complete reimbursement to the Contractor for all expenses, of whatever nature incurred by the Contractor in the performance hereof, and shall be the only and the complete compensation to the Contractor for the Services. The State shall have no liability to the Contractor other than the contract price.

5.3 The State reserves the right to offset from any amounts otherwise payable to the Contractor under this Agreement those liquidated amounts required or permitted by N.H. RSA 80:7 through RSA 80:7-c or any other provision of law.
5.4 Notwithstanding any provision in this Agreement to the contrary, and notwithstanding unexpected circumstances, in no event shall the total of all payments authorized, or actually made hereunder, exceed the Price Limitation set forth in block 1.8

## 6. COMPLIANCE BY CONTRACTOR WITH LAWS AND REGULATIONS/ EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY.

6.1 In connection with the performance of the Services, the Contractor shall comply with all statutes, laws, regulations, and orders of federal, state, county or municipal authorities which impose any obligation or duty upon the Contractor, including, but not limited to, civil rights and equal opportunity laws. This may include the requirement to utilize auxiliary aids and services to ensure that persons with communication disabilities, including vision, hearing and speech, can communicate with, receive information from, and convey information to the Contractor. In addition, the Contractor shall comply with all applicable copyright laws. 6.2 During the term of this Agreement, the Contractor shall not discriminate against employees or applicants for employment because of race, color, religion, creed, age, sex, handicap, sexual orientation, or national origin and will take affirmative action to prevent such discrimination. 6.3 If this Agreement is funded in any part by monies of the United States, the Contractor shall comply with all the provisions of Executive Order No. 11246 ("Equal Employment Opportunity"), as supplemented by the regulations of the United States Department of Labor (41 C.F.R. Part 60), and with any rules, regulations and guidelines as the State of New Hampshire or the United States issue to implement these regulations: The Contractor further agrees to permit the State or United States access to any of the Contractor's books, records and accounts for the purpose of ascertaining compliance with all rules, regulations and orders, and the covenants, terms and conditions of this Agreement.

#### 7. PERSONNEL.

- 7.1 The Contractor shall at its own expense provide all personnel necessary to perform the Services. The Contractor warrants that all personnel engaged in the Services shall be qualified to perform the Services, and shall be properly licensed and otherwise authorized to do so under all applicable laws.
- 7.2 Unless otherwise authorized in writing, during the term of this Agreement, and for a period of six (6) months after the Completion Date in block 1.7, the Contractor shall not hire, and shall not permit any subcontractor or other person, firm or corporation with whom it is engaged in a combined effort to perform the Services to hire, any person who is a State employee or official, who is materially involved in the procurement, administration or performance of this

Agreement. This provision shall survive termination of this Agreement.

7.3 The Contracting Officer specified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, shall be the State's representative. In the event of any dispute concerning the interpretation of this Agreement, the Contracting Officer's decision shall be final for the State.

#### 8. EVENT OF DEFAULT/REMEDIES.

- 8.1 Any one or more of the following acts or omissions of the Contractor shall constitute an event of default hereunder ("Event of Default"):
- 8.1.1 failure to perform the Services satisfactorily or on schedule;
- 8.1.2 failure to submit any report required hereunder; and/or 8.1.3 failure to perform any other covenant, term or condition of this Agreement.
- 8.2 Upon the occurrence of any Event of Default, the State may take any one, or more, or all, of the following actions:
- 8.2.1 give the Contractor a written notice specifying the Event of Default and requiring it to be remedied within, in the absence of a greater or lesser specification of time, thirty (30) days from the date of the notice; and if the Event of Default is not timely remedied, terminate this Agreement, effective two
- (2) days after giving the Contractor notice of termination;
- 8.2.2 give the Contractor a written notice specifying the Event of Default and suspending all payments to be made under this Agreement and ordering that the portion of the contract price which would otherwise accrue to the Contractor during the period from the date of such notice until such time as the State determines that the Contractor has cured the Event of Default shall never be paid to the Contractor;
- 8.2.3 set off against any other obligations the State may owe to the Contractor any damages the State suffers by reason of any Event of Default; and/or
- 8.2.4 treat the Agreement as breached and pursue any of its remedies at law or in equity, or both.

## 9. DATA/ACCESS/CONFIDENTIALITY/PRESERVATION.

- 9.1 As used in this Agreement, the word "data" shall mean all information and things developed or obtained during the performance of, or acquired or developed by reason of, this Agreement, including, but not limited to, all studies, reports, files, formulae, surveys, maps, charts, sound recordings, video recordings, pictorial reproductions, drawings, analyses, graphic representations, computer programs, computer printouts, notes, letters, memoranda, papers, and documents, all whether finished or unfinished.
- 9.2 All data and any property which has been received from the State or purchased with funds provided for that purpose under this Agreement, shall be the property of the State, and shall be returned to the State upon demand or upon termination of this Agreement for any reason.
- 9.3 Confidentiality of data shall be governed by N.H. RSA chapter 91-A or other existing law. Disclosure of data requires prior written approval of the State.

- 10. TERMINATION. In the event of an early termination of this Agreement for any reason other than the completion of the Services, the Contractor shall deliver to the Contracting Officer, not later than fifteen (15) days after the date of termination, a report ("Termination Report") describing in detail all Services performed, and the contract price earned, to and including the date of termination. The form, subject matter, content, and number of copies of the Termination Report shall be identical to those of any Final Report described in the attached EXHIBIT A.
- 11. CONTRACTOR'S RELATION TO THE STATE. In the performance of this Agreement the Contractor is in all respects an independent contractor, and is neither an agent nor an employee of the State. Neither the Contractor nor any of its officers, employees, agents or members shall have authority to bind the State or receive any benefits, workers' compensation or other emoluments provided by the State to its employees.
- 12. ASSIGNMENT/DELEGATION/SUBCONTRACTS. The Contractor shall not assign, or otherwise transfer any interest in this Agreement without the prior written notice and consent of the State. None of the Services shall be subcontracted by the Contractor without the prior written notice and consent of the State.
- 13. INDEMNIFICATION. The Contractor shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the State, its officers and employees, from and against any and all losses suffered by the State, its officers and employees, and any and all claims, liabilities or penalties asserted against the State, its officers and employees, by or on behalf of any person, on account of, based or resulting from, arising out of (or which may be claimed to arise out of) the acts or omissions of the Contractor. Notwithstanding the foregoing, nothing herein contained shall be deemed to constitute a waiver of the sovereign immunity of the State, which immunity is hereby reserved to the State. This covenant in paragraph 13 shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

## 14. INSURANCE.

- 14.1 The Contractor shall, at its sole expense, obtain and maintain in force, and shall require any subcontractor or assignee to obtain and maintain in force, the following insurance:
- 14.1.1 comprehensive general liability insurance against all claims of bodily injury, death or property damage, in amounts of not less than \$1,000,000per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate; and
- 14.1.2 special cause of loss coverage form covering all property subject to subparagraph 9.2 herein, in an amount not less than 80% of the whole replacement value of the property. 14.2 The policies described in subparagraph 14.1 herein shall be on policy forms and endorsements approved for use in the State of New Hampshire by the N.H. Department of Insurance, and issued by insurers licensed in the State of New Hampshire.

14.3 The Contractor shall furnish to the Contracting Officer identified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, a certificate(s) of insurance for all insurance required under this Agreement. Contractor shall also furnish to the Contracting Officer identified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, certificate(s) of insurance for all renewal(s) of insurance required under this Agreement no later than thirty (30) days prior to the expiration date of each of the insurance policies. The certificate(s) of insurance and any renewals thereof shall be attached and are incorporated herein by reference. Each certificate(s) of insurance shall contain a clause requiring the insurer to provide the Contracting Officer identified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, no less than thirty (30) days prior written notice of cancellation or modification of the policy.

#### 15. WORKERS' COMPENSATION.

- 15.1 By signing this agreement, the Contractor agrees, certifies and warrants that the Contractor is in compliance with or exempt from, the requirements of N.H. RSA chapter 281-A ("Workers' Compensation").
- 15.2 To the extent the Contractor is subject to the requirements of N.H. RSA chapter 281-A, Contractor shall maintain, and require any subcontractor or assignee to secure and maintain, payment of Workers' Compensation in connection with activities which the person proposes to undertake pursuant to this Agreement. Contractor shall furnish the Contracting Officer identified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, proof of Workers' Compensation in the manner described in N.H. RSA chapter 281-A and any applicable renewal(s) thereof, which shall be attached and are incorporated herein by reference. The State shall not be responsible for payment of any Workers' Compensation premiums or for any other claim or benefit for Contractor, or any subcontractor or employee of Contractor, which might arise under applicable State of New Hampshire Workers' Compensation laws in connection with the performance of the Services under this Agreement.
- 16. WAIVER OF BREACH. No failure by the State to enforce any provisions hereof after any Event of Default shall be deemed a waiver of its rights with regard to that Event of Default, or any subsequent Event of Default. No express failure to enforce any Event of Default shall be deemed a waiver of the right of the State to enforce each and all of the provisions hereof upon any further or other Event of Default on the part of the Contractor.
- 17. NOTICE. Any notice by a party hereto to the other party shall be deemed to have been duly delivered or given at the time of mailing by certified mail, postage prepaid, in a United States Post Office addressed to the parties at the addresses given in blocks 1.2 and 1.4, herein.
- 18. AMENDMENT. This Agreement may be amended, waived or discharged only by an instrument in writing signed by the parties hereto and only after approval of such amendment, waiver or discharge by the Governor and. Executive Council of the State of New Hampshire unless no

such approval is required under the circumstances pursuant to State law, rule or policy.

- 19. CONSTRUCTION OF AGREEMENT AND TERMS. This Agreement shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire, and is binding upon and inures to the benefit of the parties and their respective successors and assigns. The wording used in this Agreement is the wording chosen by the parties to express their mutual intent, and no rule of construction shall be applied against or in favor of any party.
- 20. THIRD PARTIES. The parties hereto do not intend to benefit any third parties and this Agreement shall not be construed to confer any such benefit.
- 21. HEADINGS. The headings throughout the Agreement are for reference purposes only, and the words contained therein shall in no way be held to explain, modify, amplify or aid in the interpretation, construction or meaning of the provisions of this Agreement.
- 22. SPECIAL PROVISIONS. Additional provisions set forth in the attached EXHIBIT C are incorporated herein by reference.
- 23. SEVERABILITY. In the event any of the provisions of this Agreement are held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be contrary to any state or federal law, the remaining provisions of this Agreement will remain in full force and effect.
- 24. ENTIRE AGREEMENT. This Agreement, which may be executed in a number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, constitutes the entire Agreement and understanding between the parties, and supersedes all prior Agreements and understandings relating hereto.



## Scope of Services

## 1. Provision Applicable to all Services

- 1.1. The Contractor will submit a detailed description of the language assistance services they will provide to person with limited English proficiency to ensure meaningful access to their programs and/or services within ten (10) days of the contract effective date.
- 1.2. The Contractor agrees that, to the extent future legislative action by the New Hampshire General Court or federal or state court orders may have an impact on the Services described herein, the State Agency has the right to modify Service priorities and expenditure requirements under this Agreement so as to achieve compliance therewith.
- 1.3. For the purpose of this Contract, any reference to days shall mean consecutive calendar days.

## 2. Services to Be Provided

- 2.1. The Contractor shall provide all aspects of monitoring and implementation of the goals listed in Section 2.1.1 2.1.5; as well as provide oversight, management, administrative and project support to Spark NH, New Hampshire's Early Childhood Advisory Council (formed by Executive Order on September 7, 2011) so that Spark NH can maintain its focus on the following goals:
  - 2.1.1. Promote access to and build commitment for quality early childhood programs and services.
  - 2.1.2. Foster public awareness of the importance of early childhood.
  - 2.1.3. Coordinate the development of a system for the integration and use of meaningful information about young children and their families.
  - 2.1.4. Coordinate the implementation of an integrated and comprehensive strategic plan for early childhood in New Hampshire.
  - 2.1.5. Strengthen New Hampshire's early childhood infrastructure.
- 2.2. Contractor shall establish and/or maintain an administrative and fiscal capacity to plan, coordinate, monitor, and evaluate a multi-component initiative to ensure progress is made toward the goals listed in Section 2.1.1-2.1.5. This will include, but not be limited to the Contractor;
  - 2.2.1. Ensuring project staff shall be comprised of:
    - 2.2.1.1. 1 full-time (40 hours per week) Spark NH Director;
    - 2.2.1.2. 1 part-time (20 hours per week) Americorps VISTA; and
    - 2.2.1.3. 1 FTE (40 hours per week) in Administrative Assistance
  - 2.2.2. Providing adequate project administration to ensure staff oversight, the quality of services, and contract and fiscal accountability;

    - 2.4.1.2. Developing and implementing a plan for stakeholder engagement; and
    - 2.4.1.3. Coordinating and promoting cross-sector collaboration for timely identification of child and family needs.
  - 2.4.2. Foster public awareness of the importance of early childhood by:
    - 2.4.2.1. Developing and disseminating common messages to communicate the need for quality early childhood programs and services, and the need for a sustainable comprehensive early childhood system;
    - 2.4.2.2. Developing a communication plan and materials to promote the need for sustainable, comprehensive system; and
    - 2.4.2.3. Developing, disseminating and managing communication mechanisms such as:
      - 2.4.2.3.1. The website;
      - 2.4.2.3.2. Social media;

  - 2.4.5.1. Partnering with the Governor's Office, and the Commissioners of the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) and Department of Education (DOE) to implement and refine as needed a plan for strengthening the early childhood infrastructure.
- 2.4.6. The Contractor shall support Spark NH to work collaboratively with the Division for Children, Youth and Families to coordinate activities and processes that support common, identified efforts, including but not limited to improving the lives of young children and their families. This work will involve:
  - 2.4.6.1. Improving professionals' qualifications by maintaining the Professional Opportunities, Resources, Training and Links (PORTAL) web page on the Spark NH website;
  - 2.4.6.2. Effectively marketing trainings using the PORTAL; and
  - 2.4.6.3. Promoting high quality training, data collection and management for Spark NH events including:
    - 2.4.6.3.1. Registering and tracking all participants; and

  - 2.4.9.1. Pursuing other revenue sources to support workforce development efforts;
  - 2.4.9.2. Developing strategic partnerships with funders and businesses in NH.

## **SPECIAL PROVISIONS**

Contractors Obligations: The Contractor covenants and agrees that all funds received by the Contractor under the Contract shall be used only as payment to the Contractor for services provided to eligible individuals and, in the furtherance of the aforesaid covenants, the Contractor hereby covenants and agrees as follows:

- Compliance with Federal and State Laws: If the Contractor is permitted to determine the eligibility
  of individuals such eligibility determination shall be made in accordance with applicable federal and
  state laws, regulations, orders, guidelines, policies and procedures.
- Time and Manner of Determination: Eligibility determinations shall be made on forms provided by the Department for that purpose and shall be made and remade at such times as are prescribed by the Department.
- 3. Documentation: In addition to the determination forms required by the Department, the Contractor shall maintain a data file on each recipient of services hereunder, which file shall include all information necessary to support an eligibility determination and such other information as the Department requests. The Contractor shall furnish the Department with all forms and documentation regarding eligibility determinations that the Department may request or require.
- 4. Fair Hearings: The Contractor understands that all applicants for services hereunder, as well as individuals declared ineligible have a right to a fair hearing regarding that determination. The Contractor hereby covenants and agrees that all applicants for services shall be permitted to fill out an application form and that each applicant or re-applicant shall be informed of his/her right to a fair hearing in accordance with Department regulations.
- 5. Gratuities or Kickbacks: The Contractor agrees that it is a breach of this Contract to accept or make a payment, gratuity or offer of employment on behalf of the Contractor, any Sub-Contractor or the State in order to influence the performance of the Scope of Work detailed in Exhibit A of this Contract. The State may terminate this Contract and any sub-contract or sub-agreement if it is determined that payments, gratuities or offers of employment of any kind were offered or received by any officials, officers, employees or agents of the Contractor or Sub-Contractor.
- 6. Retroactive Payments: Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the Contract or in any other document, contract or understanding, it is expressly understood and agreed by the parties hereto, that no payments will be made hereunder to reimburse the Contractor for costs incurred for any purpose or for any services provided to any individual prior to the Effective Date of the Contract and no payments shall be made for expenses incurred by the Contractor for any services provided prior to the date on which the individual applies for services or (except as otherwise provided by the federal regulations) prior to a determination that the individual is eligible for such services.
- 7. Conditions of Purchase: Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the Contract, nothing herein contained shall be deemed to obligate or require the Department to purchase services hereunder at a rate which reimburses the Contractor in excess of the Contractors costs, at a rate which exceeds the amounts reasonable and necessary to assure the quality of such service, or at a rate which exceeds the rate charged by the Contractor to ineligible individuals or other third party funders for such service. If at any time during the term of this Contract or after receipt of the Final Expenditure Report hereunder, the Department shall determine that the Contractor has used payments hereunder to reimburse items of expense other than such costs, or has received payment in excess of such costs or in excess of such rates charged by the Contractor to ineligible individuals or other third party funders, the Department may elect to:
  - 7.1. Renegotiate the rates for payment hereunder, in which event new rates shall be established;
  - 7.2. Deduct from any future payment to the Contractor the amount of any prior reimbursement in excess of costs;

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7.3. Demand repayment of the excess payment by the Contractor in which event failure to make such repayment shall constitute an Event of Default hereunder. When the Contractor is permitted to determine the eligibility of individuals for services, the Contractor agrees to reimburse the Department for all funds paid by the Department to the Contractor for services provided to any individual who is found by the Department to be ineligible for such services at any time during the period of retention of records established herein.

### RECORDS: MAINTENANCE, RETENTION, AUDIT, DISCLOSURE AND CONFIDENTIALITY:

- 8. Maintenance of Records: In addition to the eligibility records specified above, the Contractor covenants and agrees to maintain the following records during the Contract Period:
  - 8.1. Fiscal Records; books, records, documents and other data evidencing and reflecting all costs and other expenses incurred by the Contractor in the performance of the Contract, and all income received or collected by the Contractor during the Contract Period, said records to be maintained in accordance with accounting procedures and practices which sufficiently and properly reflect all such costs and expenses, and which are acceptable to the Department, and to include, without limitation, all ledgers, books, records, and original evidence of costs such as purchase requisitions and orders, vouchers, requisitions for materials, inventories, valuations of in-kind contributions, labor time cards, payrolls, and other records requested or required by the Department.
  - Statistical Records: Statistical, enrollment, attendance or visit records for each recipient of services during the Contract Period, which records shall include all records of application and eligibility (including all forms required to determine eligibility for each such recipient), records regarding the provision of services and all invoices submitted to the Department to obtain payment for such services.
  - 8.3. Medical Records: Where appropriate and as prescribed by the Department regulations, the Contractor shall retain medical records on each patient/recipient of services.
- 9. Audit: Contractor shall submit an annual audit to the Department within 60 days after the close of the agency fiscal year. It is recommended that the report be prepared in accordance with the provision of Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, "Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non Profit Organizations" and the provisions of Standards for Audit of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions, issued by the US General Accounting Office (GAO standards) as they pertain to financial compliance audits.
  - 9.1. Audit and Review: During the term of this Contract and the period for retention hereunder, the Department, the United States Department of Health and Human Services, and any of their designated representatives shall have access to all reports and records maintained pursuant to the Contract for purposes of audit, examination, excerpts and transcripts.
  - 9.2. Audit Liabilities: In addition to and not in any way in limitation of obligations of the Contract, it is understood and agreed by the Contractor that the Contractor shall be held liable for any state or federal audit exceptions and shall return to the Department, all payments made under the Contract to which exception has been taken or which have been disallowed because of such an exception.
- 10. Confidentiality of Records: All information, reports, and records maintained hereunder or collected in connection with the performance of the services and the Contract shall be confidential and shall not be disclosed by the Contractor, provided however, that pursuant to state laws and the regulations of the Department regarding the use and disclosure of such information, disclosure may be made to public officials requiring such information in connection with their official duties and for purposes directly connected to the administration of the services and the Contract; and provided further, that the use or disclosure by any party of any information concerning a recipient for any purpose not directly connected with the administration of the Department or the Contractor's responsibilities with respect to purchased services hereunder is prohibited except on written consent of the recipient, his attorney or guardian.

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein the covenants and conditions contained in the Paragraph shall survive the termination of the Contract for any reason whatsoever.

- Reports: Fiscal and Statistical: The Contractor agrees to submit the following reports at the following times if requested by the Department.
  - 11.1. Interim Financial Reports: Written interim financial reports containing a detailed description of all costs and non-allowable expenses incurred by the Contractor to the date of the report and containing such other information as shall be deemed satisfactory by the Department to justify the rate of payment hereunder. Such Financial Reports shall be submitted on the form designated by the Department or deemed satisfactory by the Department.
  - 11.2. Final Report: A final report shall be submitted within thirty (30) days after the end of the term of this Contract. The Final Report shall be in a form satisfactory to the Department and shall contain a summary statement of progress toward goals and objectives stated in the Proposal and other information required by the Department.
- 12. Completion of Services: Disallowance of Costs: Upon the purchase by the Department of the maximum number of units provided for in the Contract and upon payment of the price limitation hereunder, the Contract and all the obligations of the parties hereunder (except such obligations as, by the terms of the Contract are to be performed after the end of the term of this Contract and/or survive the termination of the Contract) shall terminate, provided however, that if, upon review of the Final Expenditure Report the Department shall disallow any expenses claimed by the Contractor as costs hereunder the Department shall retain the right, at its discretion, to deduct the amount of such expenses as are disallowed or to recover such sums from the Contractor.
- 13. Credits: All documents, notices, press releases, research reports and other materials prepared during or resulting from the performance of the services of the Contract shall include the following statement:
  - 13.1. The preparation of this (report, document etc.) was financed under a Contract with the State of New Hampshire, Department of Health and Human Services, with funds provided in part by the State of New Hampshire and/or such other funding sources as were available or required, e.g., the United States Department of Health and Human Services.
- 14. Prior Approval and Copyright Ownership: All materials (written, video, audio) produced or purchased under the contract shall have prior approval from DHHS before printing, production, distribution or use. The DHHS will retain copyright ownership for any and all original materials produced, including, but not limited to, brochures, resource directories, protocols or guidelines, posters, or reports. Contractor shall not reproduce any materials produced under the contract without prior written approval from DHHS.
- 15. Operation of Facilities: Compliance with Laws and Regulations: In the operation of any facilities for providing services, the Contractor shall comply with all laws, orders and regulations of federal, state, county and municipal authorities and with any direction of any Public Officer or officers pursuant to laws which shall impose an order or duty upon the contractor with respect to the operation of the facility or the provision of the services at such facility. If any governmental license or permit shall be required for the operation of the said facility or the performance of the said services, the Contractor will procure said license or permit, and will at all times comply with the terms and conditions of each such license or permit. In connection with the foregoing requirements, the Contractor hereby covenants and agrees that, during the term of this Contract the facilities shall comply with all rules, orders, regulations, and requirements of the State Office of the Fire Marshal and the local fire protection agency, and shall be in conformance with local building and zoning codes, bylaws and regulations.
- 16. Equal Employment Opportunity Plan (EEOP): The Contractor will provide an Equal Employment Opportunity Plan (EEOP) to the Office for Civil Rights, Office of Justice Programs (OCR), if it has received a single award of \$500,000 or more. If the recipient receives \$25,000 or more and has 50 or

This is accomplished through a written agreement that specifies activities and reporting responsibilities of the subcontractor and provides for revoking the delegation or imposing sanctions if the subcontractor's performance is not adequate. Subcontractors are subject to the same contractual conditions as the Contractor and the Contractor is responsible to ensure subcontractor compliance with those conditions.

When the Contractor delegates a function to a subcontractor, the Contractor shall do the following:

- 19.1. Evaluate the prospective subcontractor's ability to perform the activities, before delegating the function
- 19.2. Have a written agreement with the subcontractor that specifies activities and reporting responsibilities and how sanctions/revocation will be managed if the subcontractor's performance is not adequate
- 19.3. Monitor the subcontractor's performance on an ongoing basis

- 19.4. Provide to DHHS an annual schedule identifying all subcontractors, delegated functions and responsibilities, and when the subcontractor's performance will be reviewed

#### **DEFINITIONS**

COSTS: Shall mean those direct and indirect items of expense determined by the Department to be allowable and reimbursable in accordance with cost and accounting principles established in accordance with state and federal laws, regulations, rules and orders.

DEPARTMENT: NH Department of Health and Human Services.

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT GUIDELINES: Shall mean that section of the Contractor Manual which is entitled "Financial Management Guidelines" and which contains the regulations governing the financial activities of contractor agencies which have contracted with the State of NH to receive funds.

PROPOSAL: If applicable, shall mean the document submitted by the Contractor on a form or forms required by the Department and containing a description of the Services to be provided to eligible individuals by the Contractor in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Contract and setting forth the total cost and sources of revenue for each service to be provided under the Contract.

UNIT: For each service that the Contractor is to provide to eligible individuals hereunder, shall mean that period of time or that specified activity determined by the Department and specified in Exhibit B of the Contract.

FEDERAL/STATE LAW: Wherever federal or state laws, regulations, rules, orders, and policies, etc. are referred to in the Contract, the said reference shall be deemed to mean all such laws, regulations, etc. as they may be amended or revised from the time to time.

CONTRACTOR MANUAL: Shall mean that document prepared by the NH Department of Administrative Services containing a compilation of all regulations promulgated pursuant to the New Hampshire Administrative Procedures Act. NH RSA Ch 541-A, for the purpose of implementing State of NH and federal regulations promulgated thereunder.

SUPPLANTING OTHER FEDERAL FUNDS: The Contractor guarantees that funds provided under this Contract will not supplant any existing federal funds available for these services.

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#### **REVISIONS TO GENERAL PROVISIONS**

- 1. Subparagraph 4 of the General Provisions of this contract, Conditional Nature of Agreement, is replaced as follows:
  - CONDITIONAL NATURE OF AGREEMENT. Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, all obligations of the State hereunder, including without limitation, the continuance of payments, in whole or in part, under this Agreement are contingent upon continued appropriation or availability of funds, including any subsequent changes to the appropriation or availability of funds affected by any state or federal legislative or executive action that reduces, eliminates, or otherwise modifies the appropriation or availability of funding for this Agreement and the Scope of Services provided in Exhibit A, Scope of Services, in whole or in part. In no event shall the State be liable for any payments hereunder in excess of appropriated or available funds. In the event of a reduction, termination or modification of appropriated or available funds, the State shall have the right to withhold payment until such funds become available, if ever. The State shall have the right to reduce, terminate or modify services under this Agreement immediately upon giving the Contractor notice of such reduction, termination or modification. The State shall not be required to transfer funds from any other source or account into the Account(s) identified in block 1.6 of the General Provisions, Account Number, or any other account, in the event funds are reduced or unavailable.
- 2. Subparagraph 10 of the General Provisions of this contract, Termination, is amended by adding the following language;
  - 10.1 The State may terminate the Agreement at any time for any reason, at the sole discretion of the State, 30 days after giving the Contractor written notice that the State is exercising its option to terminate the Agreement.
  - 10.2 In the event of early termination, the Contractor shall, within 15 days of notice of early termination, develop and submit to the State a Transition Plan for services under the Agreement, including but not limited to, identifying the present and future needs of clients receiving services under the Agreement and establishes a process to meet those needs.
  - 10.3 The Contractor shall fully cooperate with the State and shall promptly provide detailed information to support the Transition Plan including, but not limited to, any information or data requested by the State related to the termination of the Agreement and Transition Plan and shall provide ongoing communication and revisions of the Transition Plan to the State as requested.
  - 10.4 In the event that services under the Agreement, including but not limited to clients receiving services under the Agreement are transitioned to having services delivered by another entity including contracted providers or the State, the Contractor shall provide a process for uninterrupted delivery of services in the Transition Plan.
  - 10.5 The Contractor shall establish a method of notifying clients and other affected individuals about the transition. The Contractor shall include the proposed communications in its Transition Plan submitted to the State as described above.
- The Department reserves the right to renew the contract for up to four additional years, subject to the continued availability of funds, satisfactory performance of services and approval by the Governor and Executive Council.
