

Ride the World's First Mountain Climbing Train, the only Cog Railway East of the Rockies, to the Top of Mount Washington—the Highest Peak in New England!

Passengers will experience a sense of adventure and history on the Mount Washington Cog Railway's 3-hour guided train tour to the highest peak in the Northeast. With approximately one hour to spend at the 6,288-foot summit, you can take in the spectacular panoramic view, spanning the mountains and valleys of New Hampshire, Maine and Vermont, north into Canada, and east to the Atlantic Ocean.



The facility tour is of a 2011 5K gpd MLE treatment facility treating variable flows in extreme weather conditions. The tour also includes exploring the mountaintop community, which includes the Sherman Adams Visitors Center, Mount Washington Observatory's Weather Museum and 1853 Tip Top House. Visitors can send a postmarked stamp from the top of Mount Washington and get their photo taken at the summit marker.

Whether examining the history and memorabilia of The Cog at the Marshfield Station, where the original "Old Peppersass" engine is on display, or exploring the fascinating weather and ecosystem of the mountain at the summit of Mount Washington, visitors will find plenty to thrill and entertain at the Mount Washington Cog Railway.

About the Facility Upgrade

The goal of this project was to design an environmental research facility with an adequate fire protection system and to improve the wastewater treatment on the summit. As part of the upgrade, it was needed to assess building and wastewater treatment needs for the extreme weather conditions on the summit of Mount Washington in New Hampshire. Two separate structural frames using structural steel and concrete were designed, and the structural steel frame

was recommended as the best option. An INERGEN® fire protection system was selected for the proposed research facility. The current package wastewater treatment plant's influent and effluent characteristics were analyzed. Recommendations were made to modify the processes of the current wastewater treatment plant and to improve influent characteristics.

The Mount Washington summit in North Conway, NH is a popular attraction for hikers and tourists as well as a location for valuable research on the mountain's unique conditions and environment. While a large number of tourists visit the summit in the summer, extreme weather conditions prevent such visits during the winter. Providing a wastewater treatment system to accommodate variable visitor usage while meeting discharge requirements in the cold weather is a constant challenge for park staff. In addition, a new building to pursue the ongoing research on the mountain is much needed. A building on the summit must be able to withstand extreme precipitation and wind conditions. Fire protection systems are also important because there is no access for fire trucks on the Auto Road leading to the summit.

This project was divided into two distinct sections: the building of the two-story research facility at the summit of Mount Washington and the wastewater treatment plant to help meet the current discharge permits. The building design included the structural design of the beams, girders, floors, columns, and foundation along with a sprinkler system design. A variety of structural building materials were considered to combat the unique weather conditions of the summit, as well as the overall constructability of each design. The wastewater treatment plant design included an analysis of various package wastewater treatment plants taking into account the summit's unique weather, as well as large seasonal and daily changes in flow.
