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Former NH governor lauded for WWII U.S.-Britain ties

◆ John Gilbert Winant: New book, "Citizens of London," highlights central role the then-ambassador to Great Britain played in fight for freedom.

CONCORD — The portrait of former New Hampshire Gov. John Gilbert Winant hangs on the second floor of the State House as do the portraits of all former governors, although most — like Winant's — are hardly noticed.

That could change, however, as a new book detailing the behind-the-scene events forging the alliance between the United States and Great Britain during World War II, prominently features Winant did not know who Winant was publican who served three

and his role. At the time, Winant served as United States ambassador to Great Britain, having replaced Joseph Kennedy and his appeasement approach to Hitler.

Yesterday, the author of the book, "Citizens of London," Lynne Olson, spoke to about 75 New Hampshire notables, including politicians past and present, history lovers, Winant's and his associates' surviving family members and several folks who met the man when he was alive.

understands the pivotal role he played in "creating the wartime alliance between Great Britain and America and nurturing it to keep it alive. It was a special relationship that won the war, preserved democracy and saved the world."

Introduced by Gov. John Lynch, Olson thanked many in attendance - particularly Secretary of State Bill Gardner and historian Dean Dexter for helping with her research on Winant, the least known but most talked about figure as she promotes her book, she noted.
